

FRANK HILLS NEW HEAD OF UMPQUA POST OF LEGION

Other Officers Also Named
With Fitness to Handle
State Convention,
If Obtained.

Membership Gain Record
Maintained; No Action
Taken on Power
Site Issue.

Frank Hills, who for the past nine years has been one of the most active members of Umpqua Post of the American Legion, was last night unanimously elected commander of the local post, and was installed into office, succeeding J. A. Soules, who has been serving for the past year. Mr. Hills, who served as first vice-commander last year, has been one of the leaders in the post's membership campaign, and is in a very large measure responsible for the great success the Roseburg post has had in its outstanding record for membership. His election to the chief office of the organization this year is most opportune, the veterans believe, as the Legion post is working for the state convention in 1932 and it will be necessary to place particular emphasis upon membership this year and to strengthen every department of the post in preparation for the convention. As Mr. Hills has had much experience in that line of work, the members of the post are looking forward to a very successful year.

Other Officers Chosen
Ted Post was elected first vice-commander, putting him in line for the office of commander during the convention year. This also is expected to work out most satisfactorily, as Mr. Post has had much experience in handling the post's affairs and through his work as assistant of the Oregon Soldiers' Home is equipped in every way to direct the convention activities. Other members elected last night were Ralph Smith, second vice-commander; Willard Johnson, finance officer; James Soules, secretary; John H. Hays, historian; Harry Smith, chaplain; George Trepoll, sergeant at arms; and Dr. E. B. Stewart, James Soules and Ned Dixon, executive committee.

Following the election, the new officers were sworn in by Doctor Stewart, who is post department commander, and were conducted to their chairs. James Soules, retiring commander, summarized the work for the past year, showing very marked success in the post's activities, particularly the membership campaign, which resulted in an enrollment of 554. Umpqua post holds the record of having shown an increase in membership for every year since its organization.

Short talks were made by each of the new officers, and visiting delegations were also called upon for introduction speeches. There was considerable discussion regarding the matter of providing larger and better equipped quarters for a meeting place, and this proposition was referred to the executive committee for action.

Political Move Avoided
At the last previous meeting a motion was passed that the post take action with regard to a resolution opposing the construction of power site dams in the North Umpqua river, and it had been announced that this proposition would be discussed at last night's meeting. It was decided, however, to table the proposition permanently. The American Legion is a non-political organization, and as the power issue is becoming one of the principal issues of the state political campaign, it was feared that any action the post might take would be construed as being a political move.

Following the business meeting the post joined with the auxiliary for a joint social hour.

STATUS OF MARKET HIGHWAYS CHANGED; RULES IN EFFECT

Because of the great amount of traffic on Roseburg-Melrose market road, the Edenbow-Melrose road and the Drain Road, the county court has designated the chief travelled section of those thoroughfares as through roads, and an order has been issued requiring vehicles entering the highways from side streets or roads to come to a full stop and give right of way to vehicles travelling the main road.

On the Melrose road the stop order applies to vehicles entering from Umpqua avenue, Harrison street, Maple street, Oak street, Wharton street, soldier's home entrance, Brown's road, Lookingglass road and Broccoli lane. The regulation regarding the Edenbow-Melrose road applies to Walnut street, Riverside avenue, cemetery road and Oakdale road. The order on the Drain Road applies to the Loon Lake road.

IDENTIFICATION SHIELDS FOR PRO- HIBITION AGENTS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—The American Automobile association declared today that the decision of Col. Amos W. Woodcock, director of prohibition, to equip enforcement agents with identification shields, is the most important step taken to protect the rights of motorists since the enactment of the eighteenth amendment.

The statement of the national motorist body was issued after a conference between Col. Woodcock, Ernest N. Smith, executive vice-president of the A. A. A., and H. M. Lucius, secretary of the Automobile club of Maryland, at which the design for the new shields was formally approved by the director of prohibition.

The method of identification selected is a shield of black letters on a white background. It is 17 inches wide and 20 inches long. At the top, in large letters, will be the word "STOP". Under this will be "U. S. Official, Bureau of Prohibition." At the bottom will be the seal of the department of justice.

The A. A. A. said the shield will be placed on the right front door of the agent's car and at night time will be illuminated by a flashlight. The agent will drive up on the left side of the car he is stopping, at the same time displaying the shield so that it may be readily recognized by the driver being halted.

Col. Woodcock said that he intends that prohibition agents "shall be the best trained group of officers in the world, and that they will keep on a parity with their duty to detect the guilty and their obligation to protect the innocent."

The A. A. A. statement said: "The prompt action of the director of prohibition in adopting a method for agents to identify themselves when halting cars on the highway will be accepted by motorists as an assurance that their rights are to be protected. It is in contrast to the half-trusted methods allowed to creep into the enforcement program in the past."

"Identification shields will be manufactured and distributed to prohibition agents within the next 30 days. Responsibility for invading the rights of innocent users of the highway will then be squarely on the shoulders of individual officers. It should solve the problem that has been most troublesome, especially for those who drive at night."

ST. LOUIS DEFEATS ROBINS AND GOES INTO FIRST PLACE

Only Tally of Ten-Inning
Game Ends Great Mound
Duel Between Vance
and Hallahan.

St. Louis was a shade ahead in the National league race today.

With Dizzy Vance and Bill Hallahan on the mound, St. Louis and Brooklyn battled ten innings yesterday and the Cards won, 1 to 0, to take first place by the margin of a point.

Brooklyn's winning streak of 11 games ended in perhaps the most exciting game of the season. Dizzy lanned eleven Cards and gave them only seven hits but a double by Pinch-Hitter Andy High and a single by Taylor Douthett came in the tenth with Hallahan's sacrifice in between and produced the only run of the game. The St. Louis youngster beamed his nickname of "Wild Bill" by giving only two walks and not allowing a Roblin to reach first base until the seventh inning. He allowed only five hits.

Carl Hubbell, Giant southpaw, gave New York a 7 to 0 victory over the Chicago Cubs. Hubbell yielded only three hits and lanned ten.

After ten innings of slugfests Philadelphia defeated Pittsburgh, 15 to 14. A triple play, Chuck Klein's 34th home run and the nine-run tenth stood out from the mass of hits.

Mackmen Nearer Flag
In the American league, the Philadelphia Athletics continued to move pennant-ward by taking a doubleheader from the Chicago White Sox. With Moose Grove turning in his 25th victory of the season, the A's won the first game, 6 to 4, then they bunched their hits in two big innings behind Bill Shires to take the second, 10 to 2.

The Athletics now need but two victories to reach the total of 100, which is the highest Washington, their only rivals, possibly can attain.

The New York Yankees and St. Louis started out after the scoring mark made by the Phillies and Pittsburgh and after nearly 23 hours of slugfests, the Yankees victory to reach the end of a 19 to 10 score. New York made all its runs and 29 of its 23 hits in the first five innings.

With big Dale Alexander heading the attack, the Detroit Tigers scored early against Milton Gaston and defeated the Boston Red Sox, 7 to 5, in the day's remaining game. Alexander drove in four of the runs with two well-timed singles.

TWO BIDS MADE ON SPRINKLER SYSTEM

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GLENDAL MAN GIVEN FINE FOR BURNING SLASHING

GLENDAL, Sept. 17.—M. Kitzmiller, prospector and rancher residing near Keuben, and W. A. Elder, rancher residing near Tunnel 5, were brought before A. G. Clarke, justice of peace, Tuesday afternoon, charged with burning brush and slashing without permit.

Kitzmiller plead guilty and was given the minimum fine of \$25. The charges against Elder were withdrawn by U. F. McLaughlin, law enforcement officer for the Douglas Fire Patrol association, when it was shown Elder had applied for a permit and through a misunderstanding with a fire warden had failed to get the necessary permit.

McLaughlin said there is considerable misunderstanding existing in the county regarding burning permits. Because of early fall rains many persons seem to think fire permits are no longer required. This is a mistaken idea. The law requires all persons who wish to burn brush and slashing to secure permits up until October 1. The fire season requiring the use of permits may be extended after October 1 by proclamation by the governor if seasonal conditions and fire hazards warrant.

McLaughlin was accompanied by E. E. Lewis and Fred Southwick, also connected with the Douglas Fire Patrol association.

JURY ACQUITS MAN ACCUSED OF LEAVING CAMPFIRE

GLENDAL, Sept. 17.—George F. Olinghouse, charged with leaving a campfire burning, was acquitted by a jury of six after they had heard the testimony given in a justice court held by A. G. Clarke, justice of peace, in the city hall here Tuesday afternoon.

A fishing party of eighteen, of which Olinghouse was a member camped at Devil's flat on upper Cow creek, June 15. A campfire used by this party was alleged by officials of the U. S. forestry service to have been left burning.

The case for the government was presented by Hugh A. Ritter, forest ranger, with headquarters at Tiller. Olinghouse acted as his own attorney. The jurors were Charles T. Nall, Oliver G. Sether, N. E. Sturdevant, William P. Totten, M. C. McFarland and H. Lysul.

FALLING CHIMNEY KILLS MAN AT FIRE

SEATTLE, Sept. 16.—The toppling chimney of his home took the life today of Charles B. Hall, 23, who lived south of here near Des Moines. He was alone, standing guard to prevent flames which had destroyed the house from spreading to other buildings, when pinned beneath the falling chimney bricks.

His mother, Mrs. Fred Hall, had gone to a neighbor's home to sleep after the fire was brought under control. The neighbor, carrying breakfast to the youth, found his body beneath the bricks.
