

PRIMARY RESULTS GIVE PLEASURE TO DRY LAW'S FOES

Wet Tide Still Coming In, Leader Declares, While Opponents Vow to Keep Fighting.

W. J. Donovan Comes Out for Repeal; Brookhart Assails Attitude of Roosevelt.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—The completion last Tuesday of the year's primary elections drew expressions of distinct pleasure at the results from wet leaders while the generals of the prohibition forces refrained from direct comment but took occasion to pledge themselves to resist every effort towards repeal of the dry laws.
"The dry declaration was adopted yesterday, on the 14th anniversary of the signing of the constitution. It was issued by the national conference of organizations supporting the eighteenth amendment, which is composed of representatives from thirty national prohibition groups."
"The wet view was voiced by Henry H. Curran, president of the Association against the Prohibition Amendment, who noted that "the wet tide is still coming in."
Curran claimed wet gains in the house of representatives of 27 seats with "more to come on election day." He asserted the drys had not won a single seat in the primaries. The enthusiasm expressed at this result was tempered with the observation that "we will have a long way to go before congress catches up with the people on this question, but we are on our way and we cannot be stopped."
"Dry Side to Resist"
The pledge of the prohibitionists said:
"Believing in the success of national prohibition, so completely proved by the blessings it has brought to the American people, that our most bitter opponents dare not advocate the restoration of the saloon, we declare our purpose to resist to the last every effort to repeal the amendment by which the liquor traffic is outlawed—the sure bulwark that blocks the way to the return of the saloon."
"Protesting against nullification of the constitution by repeal of the prohibition, state and national, which supports the amendment, and denouncing law violation as a means of restoring the drink traffic, we call upon the patriotic citizens to join with us in our refusal to surrender to those enemies of the constitution who, by these means, seek its destruction."
"Thanks Butler to Lose"
In addition to straight-out wet victories he counted in the primaries of Tuesday, Curran said the narrow margin by which the dry, William M. Butler, defeated a wet opponent for the republican senatorial nomination in Massachusetts convinced "everybody but Butler" that the former chairman of the republican national committee would be defeated in the November election by his wet democrat opponent, Marcus A. Coolidge.
Donovan for Repeal
NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Col. William J. Donovan, former assistant attorney general of the United States and once prominently mentioned for the attorney generalship in the cabinet of President Hoover, declared for repeal of the eighteenth amendment in an address yesterday before the young republican club.
"The eighteenth amendment has failed and nullification has 'not proved practicable,' he urged the republican party in New York take a position on prohibition which 'has the dignity, integrity and appeal of an honest conviction.'"
"It should continue," he said, of the party in the state, for and to aid actively in its attainment through effectual liquor regulation. The eighteenth amendment has failed to accomplish this purpose and should be repealed."
Sees Peril to G. O. P.
He likened the position of the republican party today to the plight of the Whig party before the Civil war.
"The disintegration of the Whig party in the slavery controversy is illustrative," he said.
"Today the republican party is confronted with a crisis not unlike that which the Whig party failed to meet. It is faced with the issue of prohibition. Although primarily a social and economic problem, it must now be dealt with by governmental action."
Roosevelt Assailed
WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—Senator Smith W. Brookhart, republican, Iowa, issued a statement yesterday assailing Franklin D. Roosevelt, democratic governor of New York, in connection with his recent advocacy of repeal of federal control of liquor.
The senator said the governor had failed to give prohibition a fair trial in his state. He added that

under the circumstances no fair minded person could say that prohibition had been a failure "even in New York."
"It is Governor Roosevelt who has been a failure," Brookhart said.
Brookhart advocated a union of the west and south for political action on economic grounds.

ARTHUR WALKER OF REEDSPORT DIES AT AGE 73 YEARS

REEDSPORT, Sept. 18.—Arthur Walker, aged 73 years, died at his home at Schofield Monday after an illness that extended over a period of more than two years. He was born at Goldsborough, England, June 14, 1857, and came to Oregon in 1880. Five years later he purchased the farm at Schofield and was married in 1887 to Miss Horstense E. Oar. He is survived by his widow, two sons, B. O. and Walter Walker, and a daughter, Mrs. Paul Bandes. He also leaves four grand children and one great grand child.
He became affiliated with the Church of England at the age of 14 and fraternally was a member of the Masonic lodge, which he joined at Gardiner in 1896. He was at one time a candidate for county commissioner. Funeral services were held in the Masonic hall at Gardiner, with interment in the Gardiner cemetery.

LEONA MAN IS RECOVERING FROM BULLET WOUNDS

The accident occurred while Wiley, Roy Ball and Jeff Stevens were sighting their rifles preparatory to a deer hunt. A bullet fired by Roy Ball glanced from the target and was shattered about a half dozen pieces of lead striking Wiley in the thigh and hand. He was taken to Eugene at once and placed in the hospital, where it was found that the injuries were not of a serious nature.

NEW SCHOLARSHIP LISTED AT U. OF O.

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 19.—The Ion Lewis scholarship in architecture is established at the University of Oregon by action of the state board of higher education in accepting from Ion Lewis, attorney of Portland, a deed to several valuable lots in the Albina district of that city. The income from the property will go towards providing students in architecture advantages in travel and education. The property of which the state board of higher education becomes trustee by the conveyance consists of lots 3, 4, 15, 16, 17 and 18 of block 39, of the original townsite of Albina.
A managing committee provided by the articles will be Morris H. Whitehouse and Harrison A. Whitney, representing the Oregon chapter of the American Institute of Architects, and Ellis P. Lawrence, dean of the school of architecture at the state university.
The value of the traveling scholarship, one of the provisions of the gift, will be at least \$1000 a year.

ATHLETICS GRAB AMERICAN LEAGUE PENNYANT 8TH TIME

Probable Rivals in World Series Cardinals, Who Defeat Brooklyn 3rd Straight.

Once more Connie Mack, the 65-year-old Philadelphia manager, has led the Athletics to the point where they have nothing to do but look forward to a new world series in which to conquer—or to be conquered, and from current indications in the race for the National league flag, it appears that the St. Louis Cardinals will be their rivals in the struggle for the world's championship.

The Athletics made a formal settlement of the American league pennant race yesterday, clinching the title beyond the last shadow of doubt by downing the Chicago White Sox, 14 to 10, for their 19th victory of the season while Cleveland ended Washington's chances with a 2 to 2 triumph over the Senators. At the same time, the Cards were drawing farther ahead of their rivals in the senior circuit, defeating Brooklyn for the third straight time, 4 to 2, to gain a two game lead over the Robins.

A third string triumph in many games, placed the Cardinals in a fairly safe position as they left to start a five-game series in Philadelphia. Brooklyn and Chicago, their only remaining rivals of importance, have three more games in the last column and little hope that the Phillies and Pittsburgh will upset the Cards.

The New York Giants are out of the race for all practical purposes being 1 1/2 games behind despite yesterday's 6 to 2 triumph over Chicago. The principal figure again was Connie Mack, who reached his eighth championship and his seventh world series since he took charge of the Athletics. Four times the Athletics have won the world's title.

Other Results
Mark Koenig, Detroit shortstop, made an appearance on the pitcher's mound against Boston, and although the Tigers lost 4 to 3, the white could not be held at his door. The Red Sox had completed their scoring against Bridges in the earlier innings.

Charley Ruffing, New York Yankee hurler, proved more successful as a batter than on the mound. He did not get credit for the Yankees' 7 to 6 teninning victory over the St. Louis Browns although he contributed two home runs to ward R. Chuck Klein, youthful slinger of the Phillies also hit two homers, but they were not enough to beat Pittsburgh's Pirates, who slammed out five runs in the fourth inning for a 6 to 5 victory. The Boston Braves and Cincinnati were not scheduled.

FRENCH FLYERS TO VISIT OREGON FAIR

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 19.—An attraction at the state fair one day next week, probably on Friday, will be the appearance of Diendonne Coste and Maurice Bellonte, French trans-Atlantic fliers, who will circle over the fair grounds at a low altitude, also over the city and drop messages to the spectators.
Negotiations are under way to get the fliers to land at the Salem municipal airport, but a message from Julius Meier, president of the Portland Aeronautical society, said today that time limitations

probably would not permit the fliers to stop here.
Announcement is to be made later as to the exact time the fliers are expected to arrive.

WOMEN DEFEAT MEN IN CONTEST OF BULLFIGHTING

ALGIERS, Sept. 19.—At a bullfight held here a group of women bullfighters for the first time were pitted against a strong team of men "torreadors" in a test of pluck and skill.
After the "dartsmen" had finished with the bull, a group of "torreadors" (pitchforkers) entered the arena, and while one seized the bleeding bull by the horns, the others held it fast by sheer weight. This is called a "paga" or catch. The secret of the "paga" lies in good team work, and the women torreadors so far outdid the men in this contest that they were awarded the honors.

Bullfighters recently have suffered an eclipse. All kinds of improvements and side-shows failed to stimulate interest in a game which the majority of the Portuguese condemn as cruel and unsportsmanlike. The appearance of women bullfighters drew crowds and has added a new lease on life to the national game of the peninsula.

"WILDCAT" PETE TARGET FOR FIVE SHOTS IN FOREST

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 18.—George (Wildcat) Pete Eugene wrestler, went deer hunting Wednesday and was himself apparently mistaken for a deer or some other animal.

Pete was walking along a side canyon in the upper Willamette valley when a bullet whistled past him and clipped a small limb from a tree a foot above his head. Pete dropped to the ground and lay prone while four more bullets screamed past him.

When the shooting stopped Pete called out, "Are you out of ammunition, stranger?"
He received no response and was unable to find the person who had fired the shots.

DAIRY PRODUCTS ADVANCE FORECAST

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—Expectation prices for dairy products including butter, will advance moderately during the autumn but remain at a lower level than for several years past was expressed yesterday by the department of agriculture.
This view was predicated upon a trend toward expansion in the dairy industry.

In a report describing the dairy outlook the department said while the drought caused heavy damage to production during the past season supplies of roughage and hay are ample in the most important dairy sections and the decrease in fall production is not expected to be as heavy as the decrease during the summer months.

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BRYAN MEMORIAL UNIVERSITY OPEN AT DAYTON, TENN.

DAYTON, Tenn., Sept. 19.—A fundamentalist university that grew out of the famous anti-evolution trial of John T. Scopes here five years ago opened yesterday, a memorial to William Jennings Bryan.

While here fighting to uphold the Tennessee statute forbidding the teaching of the theory of evolution in public schools, Bryan suggested the establishment of a school in Dayton. He died July 26, 1925, two days after the trial ended, but his idea took root and grew into the William Jennings Bryan university, a co-educational school. It will have intercollegiate athletic teams, but will not have military training, at least for the present.

Only freshmen classes started today, the plan being to add courses gradually until the university is a four-year institution. Nearly \$1,000,000 had been subscribed to the fundamentalist school, which has acquired an 81-acre site.

William Jennings Bryan university, it is set forth in its charter of incorporation, is for the purpose of "conducting and perpetuating a university for the higher education of men and women under auspices distinctly Christian and spiritual, as a testimony to the supreme glory of the Lord Jesus Christ and to the divine inspiration and infallibility of the Bible."

The president, Dr. George E. Guile, was for 15 years extension Bible teacher for the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago and is a staunch fundamentalist.
