As man was created a social being, it is inevitable that he should have instincts which compel the living in organized groups. Wherever there is a group, authority and law must be established. The basis of authority in the United States is the constitution.

A great number of serious problems faced the makers of the constitution. A few of the more serious were that they had no model on which to base their document, as no other true democracy had existed up to that time; whatever they did was more or less of an experiment, sure to be criticized and opposed by the other nations of the world, and equally sure to be of great influence to those nations, in their struggles toward democracy. The colonies themselves were not in perfect accord with each other, especially since they had no longer the driving necessity of banding themselves against a common enemy; jealousies and bickerings were constantly hindering the law makers at their task. In addition to these two great problems, the statesmen realized that they were building for future generations, and their form of government must stand the test of time.

It is interesting to note that the fathers of our government feared the strength, the fickleness and the indifference of the common masses. It was not their intention, strange as it may seem, that the people should have direct power over the government. To check this power and to prevent any spirit of mob rule, three very wise checks were placed upon the people. Briefly stated these were: The system of amendment, which makes the changing of the constitution a very slow and difficult process; the two houses of lawmakers, the senate and the house, which automatically check each other; the final check, the supreme court, has been the safeguard in many cases, for in conditions under which the masses of the people have been influenced by some great crisis or disturbance, the judges of the supreme court have been able to clearly point the way through the difficulty.

The spirit of the great men who formed the constitution can best be expressed in the message of George Washington in his farewell address. He said that the happiness and success of the commonwealth could be secured by the practice of four great principles: Harmony, the spirit, which is unselfish of the good will to others; honesty, which is against any betrayal of public trust; industry, faithful work for its own sake; and frugality, the spirit which outlaws waste.
