

RICH COPPER MINE IN TILLER REGION TO BE REOPENED

MEDFORD, Sept. 25.—The reported sale and reopening of the Howley copper mine on the proposed Pacific highway cutoff between Tillamook and Medford, according to mining men, will open to Medford a copper district richer and more extensive than the famous Blue Ledge copper field tributary to Medford.

The new owner is the recently organized Miller-Young Copper company, with William L. Miller, Medford, at the head, and financed by Los Angeles and Calgary, Canada, investors. The former owners were Dr. J. F. Reddy of Medford and W. G. Hales, Chicago timberman, principal owner of the famous Liane de Oro placers down in Josephine county, considered the largest and richest producing placer mine in the world. The consideration was not given, but it is understood the Chicago man recently refused \$250,000 for his share-fourth interest in the mine. The new copper company was organized under the laws of Oregon with a capitalization of \$1,000,000 and head offices here. The property is 42 miles from here, it is highly developed, with more than 1,000,000 tons of high-grade copper ore developed ready to mill. More than \$50,000 was spent in building a road to the mine and mine development in 1928, and the new owner proposes to spend \$50,000 immediately reopening the property and installing a modern flotation capacity flotation reduction plant.

The history of the property starts during the early development of the famous Banfield copper mine 30 years ago, when the Howley was discovered and located by the Rev. R. A. Rowley, a local preacher. In 1907 Mr. Reddy acquired an interest in the mine, as well as De Witt Van Ostrand, a capitalist of Phillips, Wis. In 1914 they organized the Empire Copper company and spent \$30,000 reopening the mine. War stopped the work. Later the Chicago lumberman took over the Wisconsin man's interest, adding the Howley to his Southern Oregon mine holdings.

OREGON JERSEY IS WORLD CHAMPION

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 25.—State fair interest centered today on the scheduled coronation by Governor Norblad of "Golden Child's Lady May," only Jersey cow to hold two world's records simultaneously. "Golden Child's Lady May," in 305 days, produced 893.89 pounds of butterfat from 15,592 pounds of milk, beginning the test at six years, seven months. The per cent of fat was 4.49. The champion is a large cow, weighing approximately 1150 pounds, and possesses all the fine points of the perfect Jersey, plus the strength and vitality of a Shorthorn, experts state. The Hubbard herd of 23 animals, which includes the new champion, has been quality tested and bearing accidents in milking, will win three silver medals, two medals of merit, two world's records and the president's silver cup. 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U. S. GUNBOATS SILENCE ATTACKS OF CHINESE REDS

SHANGHAI, Sept. 26.—Two American gunboats fought their way through barrages of artillery fire laid down by Chinese reds along the middle Yangtze river last night and today, each silencing the heavy attacks and escaping undamaged.

As in previous cases the American vessels were subjected to fire from shore as they patrolled that section of the river which has been infested with pirates and other marauders for months.

The U. S. S. Guam fought an artillery duel with a battery of red field guns hidden along the shore 190 miles above Hankow. The Guam opened up with her three-inch guns amid a shower of red cannon fire and then brought machine guns into play. The red attack stopped and the Guam proceeded unscathed, probably due to the poor marksmanship of the attackers.

Proceeding down river the U. S. S. Cabu ran into a battery of red field guns a few miles above Kihkiang. The marauders raked the river with heavy fire. Speeding up her engines and bringing her machine guns into action the Cabu raced to safety. She peppered the shore line with bullets, silencing the shore battery.

MOTT HEADS NEW SPORTSMEN'S BODY IN CALIFORNIA

Major Lawrence Mott has been placed in charge of the publicity work of the California Conservationists, an organization being formed in California to remove politics from the activities of the game commission of that state, according to word received here. The sportsmen of California, it is reported, are preparing for a very intensive campaign to secure a complete change in the personnel of the present fish and game commission and are preparing to secure a vote of the people of the state at the November election. Because of his experience in radio work, Major Mott has been appointed to conduct the broadcast feature of the campaign and has secured the promise of cooperation from all of the leading stations of California and will spend the greater part of his time until the November election, speaking daily from the various stations on the issue.

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PHONE CO. OBJECTS TO RATE INQUIRY

PORTLAND, Sept. 25.—H. R. Risley, general commercial manager of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, told the city council today the company was willing to negotiate for a franchise but protested the council's decision to investigate rates.

Informed the council had appropriated \$25,000 for a rate investigation, Risley said the company had made numerous voluntary cuts in charges, improvements in service and additions to capital investments.

Mayor George Baker claimed telephone subscribers had complained of rates being established on war time conditions. "No one expected these war time rates would run on indefinitely," Baker told Risley.

CARDINALS WITHIN SINGLE GAME OF LEAGUE PENNANT

Only one game now stands between the St. Louis Cardinals and their third National league pennant in five seasons. They got back into action at home yesterday and beat Pittsburgh 9 to 0.

Chicago, managed by Rogers Hornsby, defeated Cincinnati 4 to 3. One more St. Louis victory or one defeat for the Cubs will settle the struggle. If Chicago wins its remaining games against the Reds and the Cards lose three to Pittsburgh, the season will end in a tie with a three-game playoff to decide the pennant winner.

As the veteran spitballer Burleigh Grimes held the Pirates to seven hits, the St. Louis batters collected a dozen effective blows.

Jim Bottomley hammered a home run over the right field pavilion to give the Cards a 4 to 0 lead. Home runs by English and Hartnett in the first two innings started the Cubs off ahead and a few more timely blows gave Chicago a 4-1 lead going into the ninth. Then Tony Cuccinella drove his second home run of the day over the left field wall. Harry Heilmann duplicated the wallop and Ford singled before Pat Malone was hurried in to save the game.

The American league champions, the Philadelphia Athletics, played six innings against the New York Yankees before rain halted the game. They piled up 17 hits off Ruffing and Johnson and a 13 to 3 score. Lou Gehrig's 41st home run, made in the first inning, accounted for all the Yankee runs.

The second place Washington Senators, directed by First Baseman Joe Judge, found the going somewhat tougher against the Boston Red Sox. They finally came out ahead, 3 to 2. The Chicago-etroit game was rained out.

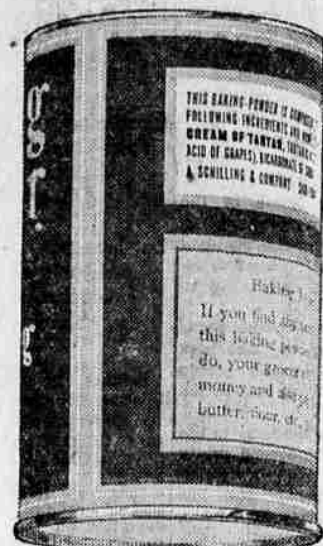
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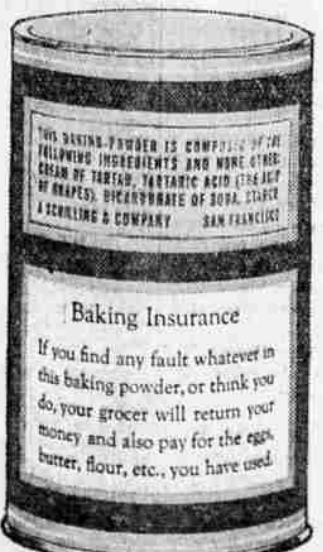
