

WIDOW AND LOVER PLEAD NOT GUILTY TO MURDER CHARGE

AKRON, O., Sept. 29.—The widow of Clarence R. Barnes, Akron roofing salesman killed by a dynamite explosion that wrecked his borrowed automobile, and her alleged paramour, pleaded not guilty today to charges of first degree murder.

Mrs. Barnes, 37, and the alleged lover, Marshall W. Cornell, 43,

a paper hanger who claims he formerly was a Chicago attorney, asked for a preliminary hearing, which was set for Friday.

Detective Chief Ed McConnell asserted Mrs. Barnes and Cornell planned the fatal blast to rid themselves of Barnes and collect his life insurance.

Barnes was killed Tuesday when the automobile Cornell is alleged to have loaned him exploded and hurled him 40 feet.

The blast, McConnell said, was caused by two sticks of dynamite placed underneath the gasoline

tank and so connected with the light wires they exploded when Barnes turned on the lights.

WAGNER RESIGNS AS RED SOX HEAD

BOSTON, Sept. 29.—Charles "Heinie" Wagner has resigned as manager of the Boston Red Sox, that baseball club announced today. Wagner served as manager this season. His successor had not been named. Wagner succeeded Bill Carrigan.

RACKETEERS' KIN BEING CAUGHT IN CHICAGO DRAG-NET

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—The "next of kin" of Chicago's "public enemies" today were ordered arrested, to be held as hostages for the "enemies" themselves.

Detective Chief Norton, ordering this action, told his men to arrest the wives of the "enemies" wherever possible. Failing in this, the nearest relative of the hunted men are to be taken.

Vagrancy warrants have been signed for the "public enemies" and the 26 most notorious figures of the city's gang life — and the relatives are to be held until such time as the enemies surrender or are found.

The state's attorney's fight against racketeers—the men who have taken control by force of a number of union treasuries—received a setback when a number of union leaders called on Col. A. A. Sprague, anti-crime leader, and protested against the campaign. Legitimate unions are being made the sufferers, the labor men charged. They asked the removal from the list of Assistant State's Attorney Charles J. Mueller.

Meanwhile the police department struggled with its own problem, which cropped out last Thursday when men raiding a hotel seized a police department memorandum containing a list of known hoodlums marked for possible arrest on vagrancy charges. The memorandum bore checkmarks before eight names, all of Al Capone men, and when the police copy was located these eight names had been omitted. Questioning revealed the original had been stolen from police files and re-typed "from memory" by a secretary.

Chief Norton yesterday completed his investigation of the affair and made out a list of police men's names, which he called a transfer list. It went to Police Commissioner John H. Alcock today for action. Alcock said he would make criminal charges against the traitor in his department, as well as arranging instant dismissal.

slightly below that of last year, and the receipts less than had been hoped for, the fair paid all expenses, and was successful from every standpoint." Mr. Marsters stated this morning. "The decrease in attendance was not due to any lack of interest, but was because of the inclement weather, which kept many people, particularly those residing at a distance, from making the trip to Salem. utely nothing to it.

Senator McNary, in advance, made plain to your chamber of commerce site committee that he was here at the request of the Washington, D. C., board to give the "once over" to what Roseburg is offering, in advance of their upcoming visitation, with the thought in mind that if, in the senator's estimation, our proposed sites could not measure up, there would be no use to their visiting this city.

I might add that Senator McNary gave it as his opinion, that at least three of the properties are suitable, and further, that all three looked good to him—each one having some peculiar advantage.

Please let me further add that neither the city nor site will be chosen until about the middle of November, and then not by any of us nor by Senator McNary, but by a special body of men in Washington, D. C. Meanwhile, full agitation over some special site should stop instantly.

What we want is the home—anywhere within two miles of our city. Your chamber of commerce site committee is composed of level-headed and unbiased business men, whose office it is to assemble lands suited to the plans of the national soldiers' home committee. This work your committee has done to the very best of its ability, and it is prepared, at the proper time, to submit these various properties to the investigating committee from Washington.

By a process of elimination the proposals have been narrowed down to about four or five prospective sites, all of which will be submitted when the time comes. Your chamber of commerce is passing its rightful claims for the home with all the force it has at its command, using tact, good judgment and diligence.

Our individual opinions as to the "best" site may all be very well, but they will cut little figure with the powers that be, when a final decision is made. Our business is to await with patience this decision, and deliver any close-in site that is chosen.

County Criticized

The county is receiving very unfavorable publicity throughout the state as a result of the present situation concerning the Roosevelt highway. The road has been practically completed with the exception of about 5 miles in the western part of Douglas county, south from the Lane county line. The state is ready to let the final contracts on this section as soon as the county agree to cooperate in its share of the cost. Douglas county, therefore, is said to be holding up the entire project.

The county court has required cooperation from road districts on all of its major roads in the past, and expects Gardiner to pay a share of the cost of the Roosevelt highway.
