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The Extremes Suffer Most

GEORGE M. REYNOLDS, head of one of the biggest banks in the country, celebrated his fiftieth year of activity in the banking business yesterday. By way of celebrating he issued a statement to the press in which he said: "Depression does not kill people."

What a fine bit of philosophy that is—and how perfectly true. People go right on living and they go right on eating and consuming farm products and manufactured goods. As soon as surpluses are reduced by consumption the wheels will begin to revolve faster and we will have learned something about what makes dull business and why it ceases to be dull.

This depression, like others of the past, have had their most serious effect upon the two extreme ends of our social setup. The very wealthy men have suffered heavy losses and great reduction of income. The very poor have suffered and are suffering from unemployment. Proportionately, of course, the latter class is most seriously hurt.

"As soon as the business cycle gets well started on its upward turn big business will begin to make more money and men who are out of work will again be employed. Labor has a very great deal in common with large business interests."

"The Longview bridge company failed to take in enough money during the first five months to meet the interest on its securities. That does not mean, of course, that the project is doomed to failure. It is a new convenience and people have to get used to its existence. Viewed from a publicity angle, the bridge now has but one end—it is the 'Longview Bridge.' Why not rename it the 'Rainier-Longview' bridge?"

"Douglas county assumes an air of political importance with the appointment of Foster Butler as county campaign manager for Meier. Mr. Butler has opened an office, has a banner out over the street—and everything. Begins to look more like an interesting election year."

Douglas County Redeems Itself

IT is most gratifying to learn that prominent citizens of Roseburg have moved to save their community from being branded as a narrow selfish one and have succeeded in changing the attitude of the Douglas county commission relative to the Roosevelt highway. Aroused by the letter of Governor Norblad, the complaints of the highway commission and telegrams of protest from this and other cities, these business and professional men mobilized at once to convince the rest of the state that the majority sentiment of Douglas county is not in sympathy with the obstructionist attitude of the members of the official county commission. The result of their activity is assurance that the county commission will give the necessary cooperation to insure the early building of the coast highway through Douglas county.

"Douglas county people are not any different from those of other counties in their attitude toward highway construction. The fault seems to have been that no one has heretofore appealed directly to them and that the members of their official commission have left to themselves, misrepresented the attitude of the majority of their constituents."

"We congratulate those who acted so quickly to prove that Roseburg and Douglas county in the conduct of their affairs do not use the yardstick of narrow provincialism."

"We were glad to have the information brought to us over the

wire yesterday that the Douglas county court was preparing to pledge itself to an immediate program of completion of the coast highway. Only a few days ago they had stated before the state highway commission that they would have no funds available for such work for at least five years. Now in a few short days their "discovery" of funds has been made. They intimate that the money obtained from the annual motor registration will be diverted to such a purpose.

We note the amount to be a small one, fifty thousand dollars approximately, and its allocation, without additional state aid, would take five years to complete the highway. The most promising part of the announcement is the apparent change of heart on the part of the court members so that they are willing to cooperate, and not take advantage of the fact that the road now nearly completed will probably be completed regardless of their aid or assistance.

Their attitude was a narrow one and promptly received the condemnation of the people of the state, both those directly concerned and those generally interested. In statewide development. Again we say, we are glad to hear of the change of heart.

HOW are we recovering from the depression? Why, by cutting down expenses and paying up our debts, of course. That is the way people ALWAYS recover from depressions.

Just as soon as we get our debts all paid off and a little money ahead, good times will return.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 2.—During the month of August a total of 31 persons were killed and 453 injured by traffic accidents in Oregon, says the monthly report of the state traffic division. The total number of accidents was 2510. Fines for the month amounted to \$6159 and the total value of stolen cars recovered was \$7550.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 2.—The Edward Hines Western Pine company of Burns, which a few weeks ago was given authority by the public service commission to operate an electric utility business, has relinquished this right to the West Coast Power company, subject to approval by the service commission.

PORTLAND, Oct. 2.—The body of James Boyd, 24, bond salesman, missing since March 15, found near Estacada, has been identified by his brother. Four youthful deer hunters found the body in the woods.

The Oregon City coroner said Boyd shot himself through the head. No motive was advanced.

PORTLAND, Oct. 2.—Homer T. Bone, general counsel for the Port of Tacoma, has opened headquarters for Oregon and southern Washington here to carry on the united fight by granges in Oregon and Washington for their power measures.

Speakers for both measures sponsored by the granges will work out of Portland.

PENDLETON, Oct. 2.—Joe Gayle, 45, prominent railroad engineer, died yesterday from a shotgun wound. The gun apparently discharged as it fell against a bed.

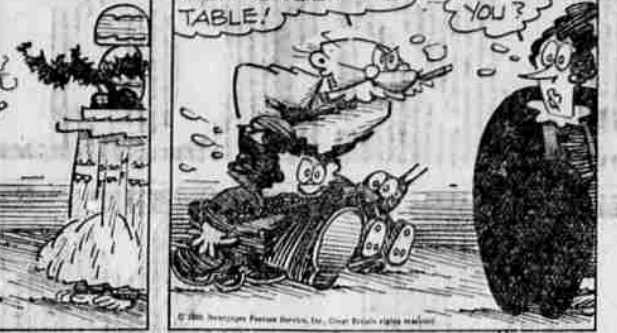
The coroner was undetermined whether the death was accidental or suicide.
