Editorials on the Day's News

GEORGE M. REYNOLDS, chairman of the executive committee of the Continental Illinois Bank and Trust company, offers this optimistic prophecy:
"I predict that within a few months we will discover we are doing a volume of business comparable to any other period of prosperity, a volume of business that will startle the nation."

If you are immersed in gloom, firmly determined to look on the dark side of things, you will say: "Oh shucks! He's just another of these boob optimists talking big to make us feel good."

But if you have a little common sense left, you will check back to see what has happened in the past. If you will do that, here is what you will find:

EVERY depression we have EVER had in this country—and we have had plenty of them—has been followed by a period of renewed activity that has carried the country forward to new records of achievement.

If you can remember that far, look back to '26, when Bryan sought to capitalize economic discontent with his "free silver" slogan, just as a crowd of opportunistic politicians in Oregon is seeking to capitalize discontent with the "free power" slogan.

The great surge of activity that followed the depression of the middle nineties broke all previous records.

LOOK back to the days of 1921—which EVERYBODY can remember. Prices of everything were falling. Farm products were a drug on the market. Nobody was buying anything at all, if he could help it. Things looked black indeed.

But the depression of 1921 was followed by the greatest period of prosperity this country, or any other country, has ever known.

If you want to get a good, clear understanding of what is happening now, go down to the beach and watch the waves.

You will note that for a while every wave is stronger than the last one and goes a little farther up on the sand. Then a CHANGE COMES. All of a sudden, every wave becomes a LITTLE WEAKER than the one before, and for a time it looks as if all the surge and power had gone out of the ocean. You wonder if the waves EVER WILL come back.

Here is the point: THEY DO. They always do. After a little, they gain strength and start booming up on the sand again, each one going farther than the previous one.

SO IT is with business. It advances and recedes. But it ALWAYS comes back.

In this country, which is a great and growing country, with its real development hardly started as yet, there is this fundamental difference: Whereas the waves at the beach, when they come back, reach only at their peak the highest point they reached before, business, when it comes back after receding during a depression, reaches a HIGHER POINT than it ever reached before.

It will keep on doing that for generations.

SO DON'T be discouraged. Judge the future by the past. Listen to your own common sense when it tells you that what has happened in the past will happen again. It is just as certain as the succession of day and night that when business recovers from the present depression, as it will, times will

50 DIE WHEN BRITISH SHIP 101 CRASHES

Tragedy, Occurring Over
France, Ends Projected
8,000-Mile Flight
to India.

Only Eight on Board Saved
From Flames That Take
Dirigible After It
Hits Hillside.

BEAUVAIS, France, Oct. 6.—A Franco-British commission of inquiry met secretly here today to investigate the crash and destruction of the British airship, R-101, south of here Sunday morning in one of the greatest air catastrophes of all time.

Gendarmes guarded the doors of the meeting place and kept their deliberations strictly private. Meanwhile, controversy raged as to how many persons were aboard the ship at the time of the disaster and as to how many lives were lost.

Beauvais police asserted they had accounted for 48 dead, of whom one possibly was a woman, out of 55 aboard the craft. The air ministry at London reiterated in reply there were 54 persons aboard of whom 46 died within the dirigible, one died afterwards, and seven were saved. The air ministry denied there was a woman aboard.

Citizenship Duties and Adequate Defense Without Threat Stressed by Hoover in Talk to Legionnaires

BOSTON, Oct. 6.—(A.P.)—President Hoover told the 12th annual convention of the American Legion here today that the "peace of our country has never stood more assured than at this moment" and the realization of the Legionnaires' ideal to promote peace and good will through active citizenship is the greatest guaranty of its continuance.

Facing hundreds of World war veterans at the Boston arena, Mr. Hoover urged the Legion to "renew and expand" its mission of citizenship through the teaching in every community of the essentials of good-will toward foreign peoples, that the foundation of government is respect for law, and the road to self-government is through "discharge of our obligations at the ballot box."

"We need," he said, "the teaching of the essentials of good-will toward other nations in every community—that the foundations of peace arise from the sense of justice within the citizenry of a nation, in the good-will which they individually evince toward other peoples."

RUPTURED FRAME WORK FOUND AS DISASTER CAUSE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

PARIS, Oct. 6.—Air Commander A. V. Holt, chief British investigator, is stated by the newspaper El Temps tonight to have advised the British government that the cause of the disaster to the R-101 was a rupture of the metallic frame work and not a derangement of the engine. The British expert based his view on the finding of the metal parts of the dirigible five miles from where she crashed.

The presence of one stowaway and possibility of two aboard the wrecked dirigible was admitted earlier by Holt. This strengthens belief that the total number of dead in the disaster will reach at least 50.

FIRES OF REVOLT BLAZE IN BRAZIL

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

RIO DE JANEIRO, Oct. 6.—Owing to the gravity of the situation brought about by the revolt to the southward, President Washington Luis today decreed martial law throughout Brazil until Dec. 31.

Saturday the government proclaimed a state of siege in two states where the revolution originated.

All banks were closed today by government order until further notice.

In addition, the government has suspended air mail service out of the country.

News filtering through Brazilian border points into Uruguay indicated that eight of the 21 states in Brazil are driving forward to unseat the federal government of President Luis and prevent the inauguration of the president-elect, Dr. Julio Prestes, Nov. 15.

The leader of the movement asserted today that seven states were backing his campaign, with the federal troops and thousands of civilians joining the revolting forces.

Meanwhile, the federal government has appropriated \$10,000,000 to put down the rebellion. The government also is said to have offered to make peace, with the insurgents refusing all such overtures.

Mrs. Ida Anthia Staggs, 69 years of age, passed away at her home on Chadwick street early Sunday morning after an illness that has extended over a period of more than a year. She was born April 23, 1861, at Van Port, Penn., moving to Roseburg about 19 years ago, when her husband, who passed away 14 years ago, purchased a flour mill in this city. Prior to coming to Roseburg the family spent four years in China, where Mr. Staggs was engaged in the construction and operation of flour mills.

Mrs. Staggs is survived by one son and three daughters, E. B. Mace, Springfield, Montana; Mrs. C. C. Mace, Neosho, Montana; R. L. Staggs of Chicago and Miss Edith Staggs of Roseburg. Mrs. E. B. Mace has been spending the past two months in this city.

Mrs. Staggs was a member of the First Christian church and of the Women's Relief Corps. Funeral services will be held at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel at 2 p. m. Wednesday, Rev. W. R. Baird officiating. Interment will take place at the Masonic cemetery, the W. R. C. conducting the burial service. Mr. E. Ritter is in charge of arrangements.

TRAMP SUSPECTED OF SLAYING YOUTH

DUBUQUE, Ia., Oct. 6.—A meticulous combing of the Mississippi river bottoms today yielded no clues to the identity of the slayer of 12-year-old Earl Fuller, Jr. Earl's mutilated body was found in a clump of willows on the river flats yesterday by Henry Waltz of Dubuque. The lad had been strangled to death by a tightly drawn wire and the clothes were torn from his body, indicating he had been mistreated.

The boy left his home about 7:30 p. m. Saturday to play football on a field near the "bottoms" and was last seen by companions on the scrimmage ended at 9:30. When he failed to return home before 10 o'clock his parents started a search.

Waltz, neighbor of the Fullers, continued the search yesterday and discovered the body near a rendezvous of transients. Police believe the slayer was a tramp who abducted Earl as the lad was on his way home, which is eight blocks from the "flats."

SOLDIERS HOME'S FORMER HEAD DIES

Samuel W. Taylor, 80, Passes Away
in Portland While Asleep
at Daughter's Home

Samuel W. Taylor, former commandant of the Oregon State Soldiers' home, died yesterday morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Blanche M. Thurston, in Portland, according to word received here. Mr. Taylor has been spending his winters as a resident of the state home, and has been visiting in Portland during the spring and summer months. He was on furlough when his death occurred, and had planned to return to Roseburg in a few more weeks.

His death occurred suddenly, his daughter finding him dead in his bed when she went to call him Sunday morning. He had passed away while asleep.

Mr. Taylor, 80 years of age, was a native of Pennsylvania. He served during the Civil war as a sergeant in Company B, 3rd Pennsylvania cavalry. He served for two years as commandant of the state home, prior to the appointment of George W. Riddle.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Thurston of Portland and Mrs. R. B. Starr of Gold Beach. A son died about a year ago. The body is to be brought to Roseburg and burial will take place at the soldiers' home cemetery Tuesday at 2 p. m. The burial service to be conducted by the local Masonic lodge.

HARVEY Q. BROWN DIES IN 38TH YEAR

Harvey Q. Brown, 38, supervising warden of the Douglas Fire Patrol association died this morning at Mercy hospital following a long illness. Mr. Brown had been suffering from heart trouble for several years, and for the past year he had suffered several attacks that left him invalided, although he insisted upon continuing his work through the fire season just past.

He was born at Riddle, July 17, 1892, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Will Q. Brown, pioneers of that valley. He was employed driving stage for several years while still quite young, between Riddle and Perouse, and later worked for the Gardner Mill company, served as a packer for the U. S. forest service and was also engaged in mining work in Nevada.

He became supervising warden of the Douglas Fire Patrol ten years ago, and under his direction the work of fire protection was very efficiently organized. His work proved extremely difficult, but he maintained an organization that has operated most efficiently and successfully in the task of protection for the private and state owned lands of the county. He took a great interest in his work, and despite the condition of his health, insisted on carrying out his duties, well knowing that he was endangering his life by so doing. He suffered another attack about four weeks ago and was taken to the hospital where his condition gradually became worse until his death this morning.

He is survived by a widow and two children, a son, Will, and daughter, Edna. He also leaves his father Will Q. Brown, a sister, Mrs. Otto Weaver, and a brother, Gideon Brown, all residing at Gardiner. He also leaves a host of other relatives and friends.

The body has been removed to the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors. Arrangements for the funeral services have not yet been completed.

WORLD WAR VETS RALLY IN BOSTON

THE ARENA, Boston, Oct. 6.—The 12th annual convention of the American Legion was called to order here today by National Commander G. L. Boudinhardt.

National Vice-Commander Frank Shoble, Jr., who lost both eyes in action in France, made an eloquent plea for the legion to rededicate itself to liberty, justice and democracy.

Just prior to his address the convention accorded former President and Mrs. Coolidge and General Henri Gouraud, French war hero, a vociferous welcome. General Pershing won another ovation.

Governor Frank G. Allen, on behalf of Massachusetts, welcomed the legionnaires to the state. He made a plea against sectionalism. He saw the legion as a great instrument for leveling geographic barriers of sectional prejudices and of provincialism. He labelled it as a league of mutual understanding.

SOCIALISTIC DRIFT FEARED BY METSCHAN

State Menaced by Radical
Plans, G. O. P. Aspirant
for Governor Says
on Visit Here.

Advocates Development of
Water Power to Give
Labor to Oregon's
Idle Thousands.

Phil Metschan, republican candidate for governor, was a visitor in Roseburg yesterday, meeting with members of the county central committee at a luncheon at the Unqua hotel at noon. Plans for the closing weeks of the political campaign were discussed, and work outlined. The local committee plans to make an aggressive campaign, and will adopt Mr. Metschan's suggestion that the campaign be made for the republican party as a whole rather than any particular candidate or candidates.

"Oregon," Mr. Metschan said, "is facing a rather dangerous tendency, a tendency toward state socialism or non-partisan control. The past few years have seen a great breaking down of party organizations, and the introduction of many radical ideas in suggested plans for state government."

"I have been branded as an 'old-line' politician. This is not true. I have worked for the progressive cause at all times and was a supporter of Cummings and also managed Hiram Johnson's campaign in this state. However, I do believe that our party lines should be preserved and that this is true particularly this year, when there seems to be such a pronounced drift towards state socialism."

Power-Choice Issue
The hydro-electric power question Mr. Metschan declares seems to be the chief issue of the present gubernatorial campaign. He states that he has been branded as the power candidate, but that he has not received any word of encouragement from any power companies or their officers, and has had no financial help of any kind. On the other hand, he declares, some of the largest holders of power securities are backing opposing candidates.

Mr. Metschan declares that he has no objection to public power development, where such power can be developed without the host of taxes resulting therefrom out weighing the advantages of the project. He states, however, that

ENGLAND INVITES ECKENER TO PROBE

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, Oct. 6.—Dr. Hugo Eckener, the Graf Zeppelin commander, has been invited by the British government to give expert testimony in London in connection with the R-101 disaster but has not yet been able to decide whether he will accept.

Regarding a proposal the United States congress be asked to withdraw the ban on exporting helium, the non-inflammable and non-explosive lifting gas, Dr. Eckener said today he knew such a plan was afoot, but that it was nowise sure his new Zeppelin, the L-128, would use helium. This gas is produced principally in the United States.

SPORTSMANS PARK, St. Louis, Oct. 6.—A terrific home run drive by Jimmy Foxx high into the left field bleachers in the ninth inning, with Cochrane on base, broke up a sensational pitching duel, gave the Athletics a two to nothing victory over the Cardinals and put the Mackmen back in the lead for the world's championship today. The series now stands three games to two in their favor.

The sixth game of the series, also the seventh, if necessary, will be played in Philadelphia. No game will be played tomorrow. The sixth game is scheduled for Wednesday, weather permitting.

CARDINALS WIN FOURTH GAME ON DYKES' ERROR

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 6.—Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics and Gabby Street's St. Louis Cardinals today were right back where they started the world's series at Sportsman's Park, last Wednesday. With four games behind them, the champions of the American and National league stood all even, with two victories each, the home team winning every contest played.

The two St. Louis victories made a new National league "high" since 1926 when the same Cardinals won the series.

After the fifth game today, the battlefield will again be transferred, the players moving in a body back to Philadelphia for at least one contest, and possibly two.

Dykes' Error Fatal
The Cardinals leveled the series by giving 37-year-old Jesse Haines, their knuckle-ball expert, support in keeping with his masterly pitching. The score was 3 to 1 and Lefty Grove, Connie Mack's left-handed ace, was the victim, although the defeat was not entirely the fault of the ball southpaw.

Grove held the Cardinals to five hits, only one more than the total allowed by his team, but all the safeties were scored in two innings, two in the third and three in the fourth. With perfect support, however, Grove would have escaped with one run scored against him, a bad throw by the usually reliable Jimmy Dykes, per-
