Irish Poet-Economist to Tell U. S. Farmers of Cooperative Plan

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Better times are ahead for the farmers, that agricultural cooperation will restore agricultural communities to the stature of their pioneer ancestors is the belief of a distinguished group of citizens who have invited George Russell, Irish poet and economist, to give a series of lectures which they hope will lead American farmers to a new era of prosperity.

Russell contends that cooperative marketing makes a contribution over and above the economic advantage which it offers the individual farmer and pays great dividends in increased contentment and general well being.

He deprecates any capacity for advising the American people on the farm problem and agreed to the lecture series only when the subject was limited to his philosophy of rural civilization, which is blending of poetry and economics and their practical application to everyday life.

Mr. Russell's visit to America has been arranged in the belief that he will be able to give a striking insight into the larger applications of the economics of cooperation and help American farmers to set a new goal in contentment and prosperity.
