siated throughout that there were 58 persons aboard, of whom only eight persons were saved, one of these to die at dawn today of his wounds. Police said that 47 bodies had been recovered, to which had been added that of W. G. Radcliffe, rigger in the dirigible crew, who died today.

Radcliffe, who despite a broken hip and very bad burns found strength to drag himself from the flaming airship and crawl a hundred feet to safety, died at dawn. The condition of others injured in the accident were reported satisfactory with the exception of Engineers Cook and Savory, whose burns are still grave.

Rescue squads found enough arms and legs in the debris of the dirigible to make as many as two or three more bodies than the 47 which lay in the chapel at Alloune, it was said.

Possibility of a woman having been aboard the airship was advanced by the police after a soldier of the 1st Infantry, guarding the scene of the disaster, found a woman's shoe with a buckle still attached. A typewriter was found also, and it was believed one of the officials who died aboard the ship may have taken a stenographer with him. The shoe and buckle will be handed over to British experts.

Notables Among Dead
At home, Great Britain planned a ceremonial befitting the rank of the victims and greatness of the disaster which robbed the nation of some of its most brilliant minds, and of the cream of its airship talent. Lord Thomson, air minister, and Sir Sefton Brancker, director of civil aviation were among those who perished.

An eye-witness of the airship disaster said:
“First intimation of the disaster was a formidable report which I first took for a thunderclap. A few minutes later I and some neighbors were on the scene. The airship had fallen into an orchard on top of some apple trees. Oh, what a terrible sight met my eyes. The flames were rising skyward and in vain firemen played hoses on the blazing ship.”

“We could see bodies in the cabins which seemed to be isolated like chunks of burned cheese. We were able to save one man who was alone in the forward cabin. At the present moment he is walking about Beavertown with three others of whom were slightly injured. Later we drew frightfully burned bodies out of the wreckage. It was an appalling sight.”

Enland to Investigate
LONDON, Oct. 6.—All Britain today mourned the tragic end of the R-101, and 47 of the 54 men who Saturday night left aboard her on what was to have been a trip to India.

Undersecretary for Air F. Montague announced that a court of inquiry would be appointed.
The council members had no definite news of how the tragedy occurred. The fact that all had been found at some distance from the airship they said, proved nothing. They said it might have been dropped in order to lighten the dirigible in last minute endeavors to raise her to a higher altitude.
Among the victims of the air tragedy none was more widely lamented today than Lord Thomson.

air minister, who was an extremely popular figure. Many stories are told of his enthusiasm over airships, especially for the R-101.

“With a good skipper and a good crew I would travel in the R-101 in any weather,” he recently told friends. Speaking at a dinner in London on the night of the departure of the R-101, Lord Thomson told his hearers he was going to Cardington for the flight, adding: “The only fear I have is tonight's motor journey to Cardington.”

World's Largest Dirigible
LONDON, Oct. 6.—The great dirigible R-101 which sailed proudly away from Cardington Saturday evening on an experimental flight to India, only to meet disaster a few hours later, embodied the most advanced ideas of British airship construction.

She was the largest dirigible in the world with a bulk of 5,000,000 cubic feet and a length of 775 feet. A radical step in her construction was the introduction of crude oil burning engines in place of gasoline engines heretofore in general use, a reform which greatly reduced the fire risk. On gasoline-driven airships smoking is not permissible because of the danger of fire causing an explosion but there was no order against smoking on the R-101.

There were five motors on the R-101 as compared with six on the R-100. Four of the units were in pairs located some distance behind the passenger accommodation while the fifth hung from the center line near the rear end of the ship.

The engines were of the Beardmore type with a continuous rating of 585 horsepower and a maximum rating of 650 h. p. each. They had eight cylinders each arranged up right and in line, the bore being 8 1/2 inches and the strokes 12 inches.

An originally designed the R-101 was 732 feet long with an estimated lift of 150 tons. An extra bay was later inserted to take care of the extra lift required for the heavier oil engines decided upon.

have an exceptional interest and an exceptional opportunity in the front line of citizenship to cooperate and preserve the fundamentals of our republic.”

The president took as his text many of the ideals embraced in the preamble of the Legion's constitution which he personally saw written in France in 1919.

Defense Without Threat
Discussing the ideal, “To promote peace and good will,” he said:

“Real peace in the world requires something more than documents which we sign to terminate wars. Peace requires unrelenting, courageous campaigns, laid with strategy and carried on successfully on a hundred fronts and sustained in spirit and from the heart of every individual in every town and village of our country.”

He said the United States had safeguarded its defense by “parity with the greatest naval power in the world” under the London naval treaty, but by limiting its strength “we have given demonstration to the world that we seek no domination but only adequate defense.”

The American people, he added, have always been opposed to a large standing army.

“We have always relied on our citizen army, and never relied in vain,” he asserted, “but its maintenance is again the voluntary service of good citizenship.”

Post-War Aid Cited
Referring to the Legion's “mutual help” ideal, the president said a “grateful nation” was now spending \$900,000,000 a year for veterans' rehabilitation, adjusted compensation, and insurance, two thirds of this going to veterans of the World War.

“The nation assumes an obligation when it sends its sons to war,” he added. “The nation is proud to require this obligation within its full resources.”

Declaring he was glad to extend the government veterans' relief program by signing the disability pension bill of the last session, the president said the Legion could perform a great public service by seeing to it that pension applications do not “go unheeded” and that justice requires and self help can provide.

“If we shall overlook the burden of taxation,” he added, “we shall stagnate our economic progress and we shall by the slackening of his progress place penalties upon every citizen.”

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF ROSEBURG

That Section 33 of the existing Municipal Charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, as enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, and as heretofore amended by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, and as heretofore amended by a vote of the people under the Initiative and Referendum, shall be and the same hereby is amended by adding to Section 33, a Subdivision to be known as Subdivision 61, which shall read as follows:

61. If any bonds of the City of Roseburg shall have matured and become payable or are about to mature and become payable and there shall not be sufficient funds of the City available for the payment of said bonds, the Common Council of the City of Roseburg is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and dispose of negotiable interest bearing bonds of the City of Roseburg for the purpose of obtaining funds to pay such bonds as shall have matured or are about to mature and become payable. The total amount of such bonds shall not exceed the face or par value of the bonds to be refunded.

SECTION 2. Said proposed Charter Amendment is hereby referred and submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Roseburg for their approval or rejection at the regular general election to be held in said City on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1930. The form in which said proposed Amendment shall be submitted on the official ballot at said election shall be as follows:

PROPOSED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL
Shall Section 33 of the existing Municipal Charter of the City of Roseburg, be amended by adding Subdivision 61 as provided by Ordinance No. 933 passed by the

Common Council and approved by the Mayor on the 15th day of September, 1930, authorizing and empowering the Common Council to issue and dispose of negotiable interest bearing bonds for purpose of obtaining funds to pay bonds that have matured and become payable, or are about to mature and become payable, if sufficient funds are not available for payment thereof?
