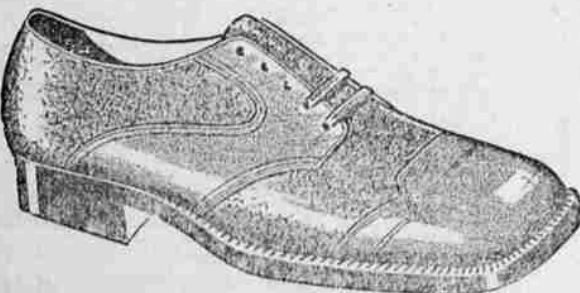

WASHINGTON STATE GRIDDERS DEFEAT CALIFORNIA, 16-0

Victory Completely Upsets Pre-Season Prophecies; O. S. C. Beaten by Trojans, 27-7.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—Whether or not Washington State is destined to be the team that will put the feet back in football for northern members of the Pacific coast conference may be one of the things settled in games this weekend.

"Surprise team" of the conference, the staters invaded Berkeley Saturday and took California's Bears down the line to the tune of 16-0. It was an upset of the first water but the impressive manner in which Coach Hellingberg's Cougars battered the blue and gold eleven down to defeat won the commendations of hardened critics. The question of "how good is Washington State?" will be answered, however, when it stacks up against Southern California at Pullman, Wash., next Saturday.

Trojans Beat O. S. C.
Southern California has given early indications of being nearly, if not as powerful, as last season when it was the class of the coast. It has two conference wins to its credit so far, 52-0 over the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins, and 27-7 over Oregon State.

Coach Howard Jones of the Trojans sent in half a hundred of his reserves to wear down the Orangemen from Corvallis, which combined with the warm weather was too much for the visitors. The staters scored on the strong Trojan forward wall on a well-nerved lateral pass in the third quarter to cut in half a 14-point Southern California lead. Up to this point it was a football game.

Work For Prophets
Those who try to peer into the future can see Washington State in at least a tie for the conference championship, that coveted gridiron station of course, being contingent to the showing against Southern California.

The long distance observers argue that W. S. C.'s play last Saturday stamps it as probably the leading team in the north and that if Southern California can be conquered, it should dispose of its other conference opponents, Montana, Oregon State, Idaho and Washington in that order.

Washington, victor over Montana, 27-0 last week-end, will entertain Idaho in a game that should be a walkaway for the former.

Oregon State will take on the California Aggies in a non-conference night game Friday, at Corvallis.

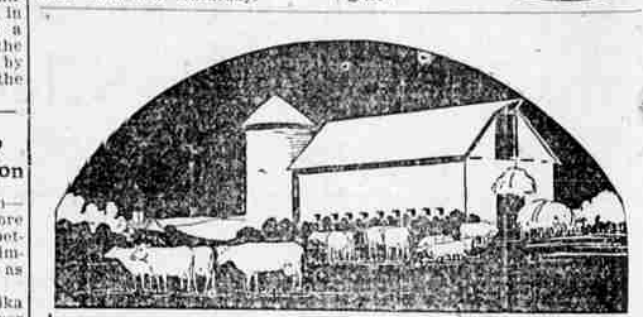

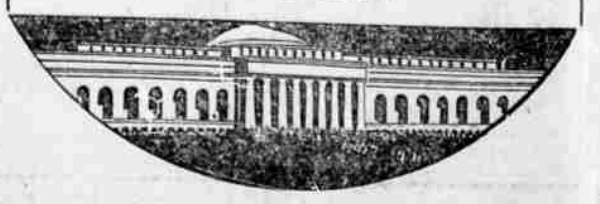

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK BRINGS PLEA FOR NATIONAL CARE

"Fire losses are in effect a tax on every man, woman and child in the United States. This is one case where the 'taxpayers,' entirely by their own efforts, can reduce the rate.

"I hope we shall have no slackers in this campaign,"—Herbert Hoover.

Fire Prevention week is a week of education; it is the period in which the effort is made to focus the attention of every man, woman and child on the danger to life and property which lurks in fires, and the methods by which most fires can be prevented. But Fire Prevention week is more than just this. It is also a rallying point from which the people of America, completely aroused to fire-consciousness, should sustain their interest throughout the year in the campaign against fire.

On October 9, 1871, Mrs. O'Leary's cow kicked over a lantern in a barn and thus started the great Chicago fire. The cow has become the symbol for the every day carelessness which must be curbed if the country's disastrous fire losses are to be reduced. The anniversary of that date is therefore set aside as Fire Prevention week.

Last year nearly 500 million dollars' worth of property was destroyed by fire in the United States. Does this fact interest you? Can you see how this loss affects either your freedom or your pocketbook? It does both. You are taxed to cure this loss. The portion of it you individually pay is part of the cost of every loaf of bread, every pound of meat, every pair of shoes you buy. If you buy these things you pay the tax. You cannot avoid it. You are taxed in this way because the insurance companies to which you pay premiums distribute your money and that of other prudent men among the careless people who have fires. If the carelessness of these people could be curbed you would pay less money to the insurance companies. Your baker, your butcher and your tobacco man also pay insurance premiums and include them in the price of their goods, so that you pay their tax, too.

But more important than these financial matters is the fact that fire kills thousands of people each year in America—a human being burned to death about every half hour, usually a woman or child. Have you any right to tolerate conditions which promote such wholesale death and suffering? Can you morally refuse to devote your energy to spreading the message of Fire Prevention week?

he looks upon municipal ownership as an economic problem and not a political one.

"No public improvement was ever carried forward without money," Mr. Metcahan said, "and that money is always derived from the taxpayers. In the form of bond issues or direct tax levies made for a specific purpose. I believe municipalities should have preferential rights in every instance to power developments, either in private or public projects, but I am unalterably opposed to state socialism because it invariably leads to confiscation of property through taxation, destroys individual initiative and paralyzes industry."

Idle Men Need Work
Mr. Metcahan states that there are ten thousand men idle in the state of Oregon, and that these men are urgently in need of work, and that the immediate construction of power projects would furnish employment to thousands of men during the winter and would provide an immediate payroll of more than \$6,000 weekly, which would be increased by early spring.

"On the Umpqua," he declared, "there are a number of splendid power sites would bring a new era of prosperity to Roseburg. Some people have protested that the development would interfere with road plans. I have no patience with such views. Engineers can build roads anywhere and get almost any grade the builders are willing to pay for. Rights of way should not be permitted to interfere with development of natural resources, but it should be a fixed policy of the state government that corporations usurping these rights of way must pay the cost of the highway construction made necessary by reason of such development.

Epitome of Principles
"Throughout the state are thousands of people who believe that this talk of power has been raised as a smoke screen to hide other issues, and to make it unnecessary for the independent candidate for governor to discuss certain other subjects. I agree with them.

"Prosperity of Oregon people should command our first attention. To that end we should: Provide work for unemployed through development of our power resources; Rehabilitate the lumber industry by finding new uses and new markets for lumber; Develop the Columbia and Willamette rivers with federal aid for power, navigation and transportation purposes; Relieve the burden of taxation by taking the burden from the shoulders of those less able to bear it and place it on the shoulders of those who are more able to pay it; Develop the state by attracting tourists, home-seekers and producers to Oregon through national advertising; And above all we should not fight among those whom we would have come among us to establish industries and homes by launching into a program of state socialism.

Too little attention is being given to moral and economic problems. We hear nothing about the child labor amendment to the federal constitution. I believe the state legislature should ratify this amendment without further delay.

Would Aid Workers
"Nothing is being said about old

age pensions, either. To me it is inconceivable that we cannot create a workable law which will take care of our aged without a hardship on our taxpayers.

"I believe, too, that injunctions should be prohibited in labor disputes, that the 'yellow dog contract' should be outlawed, and that compensation for workmen injured in industry should be increased to a level where they are on a parity with wages paid, and that occupational diseases should be recognized as injuries subject to compensation.

"The state prohibition law should be enforced with firmness, free text books should be provided by the state for its children and a high standard of education should be maintained in our common schools and our institutions of higher learning. Money spent on education is money well spent.

"With our President, Herbert Hoover, I believe the farmers should be given every aid in carrying on cooperative marketing of their products, that the state should interest itself in helping small growers, poultry growers, dairymen and other classes of producers open up and develop new markets."
