HOOVER WARMS U. S. AGAINST ALIEN FOES

Editorials on the Day's News

BY long odds the most thrilling story in the news of the past two days has been the destruction of the great British dirigible, R-101, biggest of its kind in the world. Just barely off on a round trip from England to India, it crashes on a wooded hillside in France and burns.

HERE, apparently, is the sequence of events: The great ship runs into a rainstorm. The rain weights it down, causing it to lose buoyancy and settle to the ground. When it strikes the earth, the gas with which it is inflated escapes, takes fire and disaster ensues.

It is the same kind of disaster that has overtaken so many of its kind, during the war and after.

HELIUM gas, with which American dirigibles, such as the Los Angeles, are inflated, is non-inflammable. Helium, so far, is an American monopoly. So only American dirigibles can have the tremendously important safety feature.

This means that if dirigibles EVER AMOUNT TO MUCH, which hasn't yet been proved, this country will have the inside track on their development.

BUT don't pin your faith in this country's future on helium gas, or any other material resource, whether it is an American monopoly or not. In the long run AMERICAN BRAINS will decide the place of leadership this country is to hold in the world.

BUT let us get down from world affairs to our own state of Oregon. During September, 101 new families were induced by the state chamber of commerce to locate in this state.

These 101 families purchased 9,331 acres of Oregon land and invested a total of \$355,470.

In the past six years, in response to the efforts of the state chamber of commerce, total investments of \$20,351,132 have been made in Oregon by 4,894 new families brought to this state.

ALMOST NO MONEY. If the state of Oregon would spend REAL money, as California does, to advertise its attractions and opportunities to the rest of the world, we could do wonders in the way of added development in the next few years.

IN THIS column a few days ago, you read that a California concern has purchased a 750-acre ranch near Anaheim and will raise dairy cows to ship to southern California.

Here are some interesting figures, gathered by the state chamber of commerce: Los Angeles county ALONE requires 2,000 cows every month to replace and maintain its dairy herds.

We ought to be raising these 2,000 cows a month here in Oregon.

ANOTHER California concern, the San Diego Fruit & Vegetable company, came up to Oregon last spring and started growing green peas over in the Coos Bay country. So far, it has harvested and shipped out to eastern markets ELEVEN cars of this toothsome product. Next year, it expects to increase its output to SEVENTY-FIVE cars.

Here is another Oregon opportunity that is being developed by smart newcomers.

CRIME WAVE HITS AT HOME OF EXECUTIVE

Mrs. William H. Thompson, Chicago Mayor's Wife, Robbed of Jewels Worth \$20,000.

Chauffeur-Officer Stunned by Blow in Dark, Then Woman Is Ordered Out of Auto.

CHICAGO, Oct. 7.—The crime wave reached Bruzen Heights today with the robbery of the mayor's wife, Mrs. William Hale Thompson, in the very doorway of her Gold Coast home.

She was stripped of jewels valued at approximately \$20,000. She was so shaken by the experience as to become hysterical. Her policeman-chauffeur was robbed of his star and his revolver, and narrowly escaped a bullet death. The three thugs escaped.

Mrs. Thompson had attended the theatre with her sister, Mrs. William Burkhardt. Her chauffeur, Peter J. O'Malley, had picked them up and driven them north along the Lake Shore drive which at that hour—shortly before midnight—teemed with the traffic of limousines and cabs, homebound from an evening in the amusement places.

Mrs. Burkhardt had been dropped at her home. O'Malley continued north on Sheridan road, turning west into Barry avenue and drawing up at the Barry avenue entrance of the apartment hotel in which the mayor and Mrs. Thompson were staying.

ROBBERS WOUNDS AUTO TOURS HEAD

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—Louis Bush, 60, president of the Gray Line Motor Tours, Inc., lay severely wounded in a Washington hospital today after a man believed to be a robber had fired three bullets into his body late last night in the garage of his home.

Bush had driven into the garage, in a fashionable section, near the British embassy, before he discovered his assailant. During a scuffle the unidentified man fired one bullet into Bush's arm, another in his side and a third into his chest before escaping.

It was feared by hospital attendants the wounds might prove fatal.

NEWS BREVITIES OF OREGON

SALEM SEEKS WATER SITE
SALEM, Ore., Oct. 7.—At the November election the people of Salem will vote on the question whether they want the city to acquire water power rights on North Santiam river and Marlon lake. This will be done to show the good faith of the city when city officials go before the federal power commission and the state reclamation commission to ask for the permits, filings for which have already been made. An ordinance bill to place a charter amendment on the ballot authorizing a \$5,000,000 bond issue to acquire a municipal light and power plant was defeated.

BUFFALO HERD PLANNED
PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—H. L. Moreland, state game warden, announced tentative plans for establishing a herd of buffaloes on the eastern Oregon plains. He said 100 of the great ruminants were to be sold by the national park service at Yellowstone.

LULL IN FAMILY FEUD
PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—The assault and battery charge Mrs. Cora Brouillette, 62, lodged against her divorced husband, the Rev. Telesphore Brouillette, 89, was continued indefinitely in municipal court today. Mrs. Brouillette, who was granted a divorce recently, charged the cleric with rape and seduction. He was charged with her and her son, Eugene, following the divorce.

EUGENE, Oct. 7.—Peter Kline, 71, was in a hospital today injured seriously as the result of being struck by an automobile on the Lorane highway.

World's Series Scene Shifts Back to Home of Athletics

Manager Street "Positive" Cardinals Can Repeat Two-Game Victory Needed for Championship; Hallahan to Hurl Tomorrow Against Either Earnshaw or Grove; Mack Makes No Forecast.

ENROUTE TO PHILADELPHIA FROM ST. LOUIS, Oct. 7.—The Athletics of Philadelphia and Cardinals of St. Louis today were well on their way back to Philadelphia to resume their world's series battle tomorrow on the American league grounds.

Both teams had reason to be satisfied with their three-day stay in National league territory. The Cardinals won two games to get them back in the series, while the Athletics captured the final clash in Missouri in a thrilling battle of pitchers and started home a game ahead and only one decision away from another world's championship.

DEBATE ON CHAIN STORES PROTESTED
The directors of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce met last night with the community chest committee to outline plans for the annual community chest drive. It was decided to start the campaign for chest funds the last week in October and the workers will be named within a few days. It is very necessary, it is pointed out, to raise a larger fund this year than ever before, due to the demands that are certain to be made during the coming winter.

The directors also adopted a resolution directed to W. M. Campbell, city superintendent of schools, that the Roseburg high schools be withdrawn from the state debate this year unless the question is changed. The question proposed for debate among high school students is the affirmative and negative side of the chain store question. It was held that this problem is too deep for immature minds, and that it would be prejudicial to business to have it debated in the schools. Chambers of commerce all over the state are objecting to the question.

The secretary was instructed to write to the Oregon delegation in congress asking that a bill be introduced in congress setting aside a strip of timber one mile deep on each side of the North Umpqua highway to be preserved in its natural state. It is felt that the scenic beauty of this road should not be marred, and that the future of the scenic resources can best be served by having the lands reserved.

The skyrocketing mercury yesterday touched new high marks for the year in San Francisco and San Jose, and climbed to 100 at Molave and desert points; 94 in San Jose was one degree higher than the previous high of July 30. San Francisco recorded 92 in company with Los Angeles, Sacramento, Fresno and Red Bluff. The mark was phenomenal for October in San Francisco and far above other marks for the year except last Sunday.

Salinas reported 95. San Diego felt a dry hot wind while the thermometer recorded 88. Eugene, in the northern part of the state had a cool 62.

DOUGLAS BUDGET BOARD APPOINTED

The county budget committee was appointed today and a meeting date has been set for October 27. L. H. Smith of Glendale, Jos. Lasswell of Yoncalla, and C. E. Logsdon of Riddle will meet with County Judge W. S. Hamilton and Commissioners Clough and Busenbark to adopt a tentative budget. The various officers and departments have submitted their estimated needs for the coming year and these are to be submitted to the members of the committee prior to the meeting on the 27th, at which time the tentative budget will be adopted for publication. At a later meeting the residents of the county will have an opportunity to recommend any changes.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 7.—Gordon Taylor, Victor Crooks and Vernon Levy escaped from the state training school near Woodburn yesterday.

NEW BANK FOR ASTORIA
SELEEM, Ore., Oct. 7.—The state banking board yesterday reversed an action of last April by instructing A. A. Schram, state superintendent of banks, to issue a charter for establishment of the Bank of Astoria. The bank will have \$100,000 capital, \$15,000 surplus and \$17,000 undivided profits. C. O. Garlick, banker from the state of Washington, will be president. H. Burke vice president and H. F. Sprague cashier.

In April the proposed bank was turned down by the board on the grounds that the city was already sufficiently supplied with banking facilities.

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FORMER WATER CO. GETS TAX REFUND

The Douglas Light and Power company has won a decision in the U. S. circuit court at San Francisco, approving a reduction of \$18,000 asked on its 1923 income tax, according to word received here. The reduction is on the tax paid during the last year the company operated in Roseburg, the property being sold the following year to The California-Oregon Power company. The refund will go to the estate of the late John Kern of Portland, who was the owner of the power system. The case was filed in Portland several weeks ago.

COUNCIL TOLD OF AIRPORT'S MANY NEEDS

Engineers Present Report, Listing Requirements for Completion of Landing Field.

A. J. Lilburn Appointed to Fill Place Vacated by Kidder; Steps Taken to Form Budget.

Recommendations for final improvements at the American Legion municipal airport were submitted to the city council last night by Engineers H. L. Epstein and Ben Irving, who have had charge of the work done under the direction of the airport commission. The engineers suggest the completion of the permanent marker, installation of a boundary light system, arrangements for furnishing fuel and supplies for ships using the field, installation of a telephone, piping water to the field, providing a register to be used in keeping a record of ships using the field, providing a stretcher and first aid equipment for use in case of accident, and maintaining a chemical fire extinguisher at the field for use in case of fire.

In reporting on the work already completed the engineers stated that one runway, 100 feet wide and 2150 feet long has been gravelled, using a total of 2,760 cubic yards of gravel which was delivered by the county at cost. The runway was dragged before the gravel was placed, and has been rolled four times. A driveway into the field has also been provided and a warming up apron, 75 feet by 150 feet constructed. The total cost of this improvement is \$2,580.65.

Four dirt runways have also been designed for summer use.

Lights Promised Soon
The council was informed that plans for lighting the field are being worked out, and that installation will probably be started in the very near future. A representative of the government lighthouse service is expected to meet with the commission this week to outline the requirements for lighting, and to assist in drawing up the specifications. CARGOES OF PRUNES START FOR EUROPE

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—Movement of the 1930 Oregon prune crop to domestic markets and to England, Germany and the Scandinavian countries was launched this week. It is generally believed, however, that Europe is holding aloof from the present market in expectation of getting prunes at lower prices.

The Journal here today estimated the 1930 prune crop at not more than twenty million pounds. This estimate takes in the Clark county, Washington, crop, included in Oregon territory. If this estimate is correct, this year's was the smallest crop of prunes produced in Oregon in many years, with the exception of the near-failure crop of 1928 when around nine million pounds were produced.

The Journal survey indicates that perhaps 40 per cent of the crop consists of 20-40s and an equal amount of 40-50s, with the remaining 20 per cent made up of 50s and 25-35s.

The sugar content this season will be perhaps the greatest known. The tasting quality of the fruit is said to be unusually good. California is said to be sacrificing its small stuff while holding up its values on the larger fruit fairly well. The trade there is reported slaughtering prices on small stuff in order to get money to buy the larger fruit on which orders were previously confirmed.

Ralph S. Kelley, chief of the general land office, at Denver, Colo., has been asked by Senator Gerald P. Nye, of North Dakota, to appear at the capitol prepared to disclose information to the senate committee. He says \$10,000,000 oil fields were sold for \$2,000,000.

AGED HUNTER LOST ON FOREST DIVIDE

J. B. Hills, aged 60 years, an experienced mountaineer, a resident of Jasper, near Oakridge, Lane county, is lost on the divide between the Cascade and Umpqua national forests in the Bain mountain district, according to word telephoned to Roseburg from Eugene this afternoon. Forest employees and officials in the Umpqua forest were asked to assist in the search for the aged man.

Little fear is felt for his safety, if he is uninjured, because of his familiarity with the forest and mountains, and it is believed that he will eventually find his way out, but probably in an exhausted condition.

Hills went hunting Saturday with Charles Neet, a neighbor. The two men separated after departing from their camp about 7 miles from Oakridge. Neet returned to the camp at night, expecting Hills to return, but the latter did not arrive Sunday morning as expected, and Neet notified Harold McKenzie, Hills' grandson. McKenzie took up his grandfather's trail, but as the hunter was wearing soft-soled shoes it was impossible to follow him any great distance. The tracks, however, indicated that he had crossed the divide and was apparently heading down the Umpqua slope. It was believed that he had become confused in directions. Being an experienced woodsman, he is expected to follow downstream after discovering his mistake, and will probably come out down the Umpqua river.

A searching party was organized at Oakridge Sunday night and spent Monday in the hills, but found no further trace of the missing man. He was born at Jasper, and has resided in that district practically all of his life. He is the father-in-law of Sly Huntington, a well known athlete who was a star of the University of Oregon football and basketball teams for several years.

LABOR TOLD SLUMP DUE TO MACHINERY

MEDFORD, Oct. 7.—A sharp factional battle over endorsement of an Oregon gubernatorial candidate loomed at the Oregon State Labor federation convention today. A resolution pertaining to the endorsement was laid aside until later.

E. T. Marsh, deputy United States labor commissioner, department conciliation, Washington, D. C., addressed the convention on "Unemployment." He held the recent "cycle of depression" was due to machinery taking the place of human hands.

"It is the Unions' problem to find work for craftsmen," he said. He suggested restricted immigration and a five day week for relief.

Marsh forecast dangers in excluding married women entirely from the employment field. A resolution was introduced to prohibit married women teaching in public schools.

MENACE SEEN IN BOLSHEVIST PROPAGANDA

Speech at Kings Mountain Battle Field Strikes at Effort to Ruin Nation's Ideals.

Class Government Rapped and Opportunity Said Still Open to All in America.

KINGS MOUNTAIN BATTLEFIELD, S. C., Oct. 7.—A warning that the constitution and American institutions must be protected from foreign influences which would mean "destruction of the driving forces of equal opportunity" was voiced today by President Hoover.

At the same time the chief executive, standing within view of the Kings Mountain battle field of the Revolutionary war, asserted that any practices of business which would lead to domination of the country by selfish interests also would mean a destruction of equality of opportunity.

"It is the first duty of those who believe in the American system," he said, "to maintain a knowledge of and a pride in it, not particularly because we need fear those foreign systems, but because we have need to sustain ours in purity and strength."

"The American system, through free and universal education, we train the runners, we strive to give them an equal start, our government is the umpire of its fairness. The winner is he who shows the most consistent training, the greatest ability, the strongest character."

Bolshevism Scored
"Socialism or its violent brother, Bolshevism, would compel all the runners to end the race equally; it would hold the swiftest to the speed of the most backward. Anarchy would provide neither training nor umpire. Despotism or class government picks those who run and also those who win."

"Whatever the merits or demerits of these other systems may be, they all mean the destruction of the driving force of equal opportunity, and they mean the destruction of the American system."

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SEAL SALE CONFAB SET FOR THURSDAY

The annual district seal sale conference for Coos, Curry, Lane and Douglas counties, will be held in Roseburg, Thursday, starting at 10 a. m., at the parlors of the Roseburg Woman's club building. The conference is expected to attract 30 or more Christmas seal sale workers from the four counties and the program will be given over to a discussion of the program for this year's sales.

Mrs. Sadie Orr-Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon State Tuberculosis association, and Mrs. J. Bishop Tingle and Miss Beth Conckle of the Lane county health association, are to be the principal speakers.

The conference will start at 10 a. m., continuing until noon, when a luncheon program will be held at the Palace of Sweets.

At 2 p. m. the Douglas County Public Health association will hold its annual meeting and election of officers.

FOREIGN FLASHES

AVIATRIX CRASHES
KARACHI, India, Oct. 7.—Mrs. Victor Bruce, British woman aviator who had been engaged in a flight from England to Tokyo, crashed this morning on a range of hills called Kohimbarok, about twenty miles north of Jask, Persia, and sent out a call for help.

THEATER FIRE KILLS 14
ASTRAKHAN, U. S. S. R., Oct. 7.—Seventeen persons, including several children, were burned to death when an upset kerosene lamp caused a fire in a workers' club near here during a motion picture performance.

TRAGEDY STALKS PICNIC
GUADALAJARA, Mexico, Oct. 7.—Out of 21 persons who went picnicking to Tizapan on Lake Chapala here yesterday only six returned today.

The party boarded a launch for the trip across the lake. When about mid-way to the destination a storm came up and the boat foundered. Two occupants were drowned and five are missing.
