

### HEALTHY GROWTH SHOWN BY SCHOOLS AT MYRTLE CREEK

Schools at Myrtle Creek show a very healthy growth this year as compared with last year, the attendance being larger than ever before, according to Henry F. English, principal, who is greatly pleased with the prospects for this year. Attendance in the high school, at the end of the first two weeks of school, was 195 as compared with 82 at the same time last year. Other students, now engaged in orchard or other farm work, are expected to enroll this week, materially increasing attendance. There are 100 pupils in the lower schools, slightly more than last year.

The freshman class in the high school has 19 girls and 13 boys enrolled. The officers elected are Donald Whitton, president; Doris Wilder, vice-president; Frances Conlter, secretary and Dorothy Bates, treasurer.

The sophomore class has 17 boys and 15 girls and Norman Iyer is president; Clair Heronson, vice-president, and Minor Freed, secretary-treasurer.

The junior class is composed of 14 boys and 7 girls with Frank Leighton, president; Sheldon Heronson, vice-president, and Esther Hunsbittel, secretary-treasurer.

The graduating class numbers 21 with 12 boys and 9 girls. Francis Cooper is president; Raymond Wilder, vice-president, and Owen Lodgegood, secretary-treasurer.

The school has a very fine corps of teachers, under the direction of Mr. English, and the work for the year is already well under way.

### CUBS DEFEAT SOX FOR CHICAGO TITLE

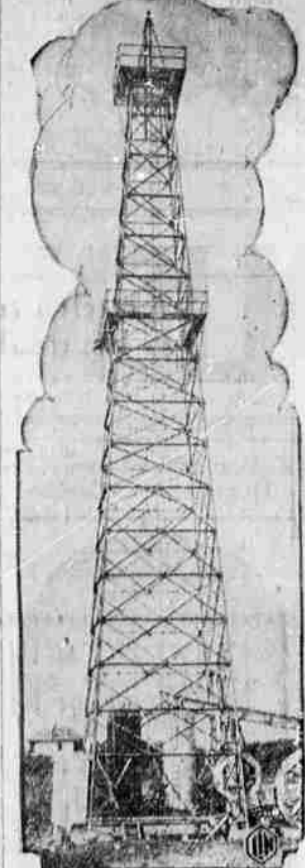
CHICAGO, Oct. 7.—On the flagpole at Wrigley field where the 1929 National league championship floated during the recent season, the 1930 Chicago city title banner will fly next year.

The Cubs yesterday finished the task of retaining the title, they won from the White Sox in 1929, winning their fourth victory in six games, 4 to 4, by an old-fashioned ninth-inning rally.

After taking a two-run lead in the fifth, the Cubs saw the Sox tie it up and got out in front in the sixth. Rogers Hornsby's men tied it again in the eighth, but the stubborn Sox again took the lead in the ninth inning. The Cubs finally got organized and crashed Garland Braxton for three runs in the ninth to win game and series. It was the Cubs' sixth championship out of 17 series.

The series drew a total attendance of 162,918 paid, with receipts of \$187,647. Elmer Club and several others connected with the club.

### ROSEBURG SENIOR GRIDDERS DATED AGAINST LEBANON

The Roseburg senior high school football team will meet Lebanon school on Finlay field Saturday. Lebanon played at Roseburg two years ago and won by a score of 12 to 9, and this year Roseburg hopes to be able to even the honors. The visiting team, however, is astute and experienced, so that the local team is not looking for an easy contest.

The Roseburg team has gained valuable experience in the last two games, defeating Junction City in the first contest and losing to Coquille last week. The Coquille game gave the local boys some valuable experience in several ways, and exposed weaknesses that are being corrected this week.

Coquille was unable to make any yardage through the strong Roseburg line, and finally devoted its entire attack to sweeping end runs, with brilliant interference. Roseburg was unable to break up those plays, which gave the Coquille team two touchdowns.

The third touchdown, which gave Coquille the victory, was vigorously protested by Roseburg. Coquille had been driven back to her own 25 yard line and was held for downs. The Coquille half-back got away a long punt to Roseburg's 35-yard line where the ball took a wild bounce after striking the ground directly in front of Dan Entler, Roseburg safety. The ball rolled wild towards Roseburg's goal line, and as he saw that it would cross the 20-yard line, Entler made no effort to pick it up, merely running beside the ball to seize it in case it changed direction.

A Coquille player ran and fell on the ball and claimed that it had hit Entler's foot. The play had been screened from the officials by the bodies of several players, and despite Roseburg's protest that the ball had not touched Entler, the ball was given to Coquille on Roseburg's 7-yard line, from which place it was not difficult to score a touchdown.

Entler emphatically denied that

the ball had touched him, and the fact that he failed to pick it up would indicate the truth of his statement, as he is a very heady player and would have realized the necessity of running with the ball if it had hit him. If this decision had not been made as it was, Roseburg would undoubtedly have defeated Coquille 13 to 12. The score, however, was 18 to 13 in Coquille's favor as a result of the decision.

(Associated Press Local Wire) CHICAGO, Oct. 7.—While his teammates dispersed to their several homes today, Johnny Watwood, White Sox centerfielder, settled down for a three-week stay in a hospital to recover from the effects of having been struck on the head by one of Pat Malone's fast balls Sunday.

It was not believed Watwood was seriously injured when he was carried from Wrigley field. An X-ray examination, however, revealed a three-inch fracture of the skull, on the right side just above the ear.

Watwood said he was certain Malone had not intentionally "dusted" him, saying he had "lost" the ball against the moving background of fans in the centerfield overflow crowd.
