

COUNTIES ORGANIZE TO FIGHT FOR TAX ON INDIAN LANDS

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
YAKIMA, Wash., Oct. 7.—With the object of obtaining passage of national legislation to alleviate burdensome school taxation resulting from non-payment by Indians of school taxes in certain western counties, an organization was formed here today by representatives of counties affected.
Judge Fred H. Goddard of Klamath Falls, Ore., was elected president; E. J. Flanagan of Yakima and Judge J. M. Schnipf of Umatilla, vice presidents; and R. E. Dean of Umatilla, treasurer. They complained many school districts in western counties are in difficulty because of lack of payment of taxes by the Indians. "We send their children to public schools supported by a small number of white land owners in the reservation districts. It was planned to name a permanent secretary to represent the organization at Washington, D. C., when all the western counties affected by the problem have joined the organization."

COPCO PLANS MINOR DAM IN KLAMATH

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 8.—Plans for the construction of a dam in Klamath river, a short distance below Keno, have been submitted to State Engineer Stricklin by the California-Oregon Power company for approval. The dam is to be a small one, eight feet high, and is to be built for the purpose of holding the water surface above at a uniform height to protect adjacent lands from damage that has occurred in the past. The construction of the dam does not involve the storage or diversion of water, and is not connected with the major developments proposed on Klamath river, and which are to be the subject of a hearing in the office of Governor Norblad Friday.

Earnshaw Inevitable
Earnshaw, meanwhile, allowed only 3 hits in the first eight innings and only five altogether. He struck out six. He was inevitable with only two Cardinals getting so far as second base until the ninth. In the final inning High opened with a long single against the right field wall. Watkins walked but Frisch's drive to Fox was converted into a double play, Watkins retired at first, by Fox, unassisted. Hayley's second straight two-bagger scored High and Bottomley walked, but Wilson ended the game and the series by tying to Miller. The official paid attendance was 22,295 and the gate receipts \$152,735, exactly duplicating the figures for the first two games here. It made the totals for the six games 211,619 cash customers and \$950,772 in gate receipts, the nearest thing to a million dollar series since 1926.

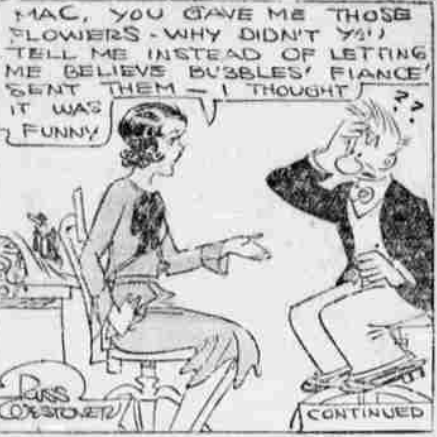

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SOVIET STUDENTS HELD AT N. Y. FOR CRITICISM OF U. S.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—Twenty students from Soviet Russia, two of them young women, were removed from the liner Majestic on its arrival today and taken to Ellis Island on complaint of fellow passengers that they had expressed ill will toward the United States. Immigration officers who boarded the Majestic at quarantine were told by several American engineers traveling with the Soviet students in second class quarters the students had directed remarks against the government during the voyage and boasted that revolution in China, India and other countries were inspired by the Soviet government.

ors and bring more expense than to feed them. Old people should not be ejected from their homes. "The small home owner should be exempted from taxation, and old people should be given a pension, paid to them in their homes and not in almshouses.

"A governor has many discretionary powers. These powers are delegated to that office by the people themselves. These powers are backed by the highest authorities in our land and as governor, if I am elected, I will use those powers to relieve the hunger, and no one can stop me. And I propose to use that power to also relieve the unemployment situation in Oregon.

"It is not necessary that a governor be a lawyer, or a politician. He may call to his assistance a group of advisers on any subject he is not familiar with, and if I am governor of this state I will call such a board—people of experience, from all over the state—because of their qualifications for the positions they are to fill, and not because they happened to be my friends or acquaintances."

through the crowd to rescue them. Legion police, or "co-ops," held a lane open while the agents and their prisoners were brought to the comparative safety of a nearby street.

Those four were the only arrests during the sporadic outbreaks that marked the post-parade celebration. Police who attempted to round-up the detached mobs of hoodlums were hindered in making arrests by the crowds that milled through the streets all night and during the early morning.

Officers Handicapped
The best that the authorities could do was guard the packed wooden grandstands along the parade route from flames that spread from bonfires on the street and the common. Hotel entrances were guarded by officers, who refused admittance to any but the legionnaires and guests.

Coffetti, ticker tape, crates and boxes that had been used as seats by parade spectators made excellent fuel. Fires burned everywhere there was a few feet of vacant space.

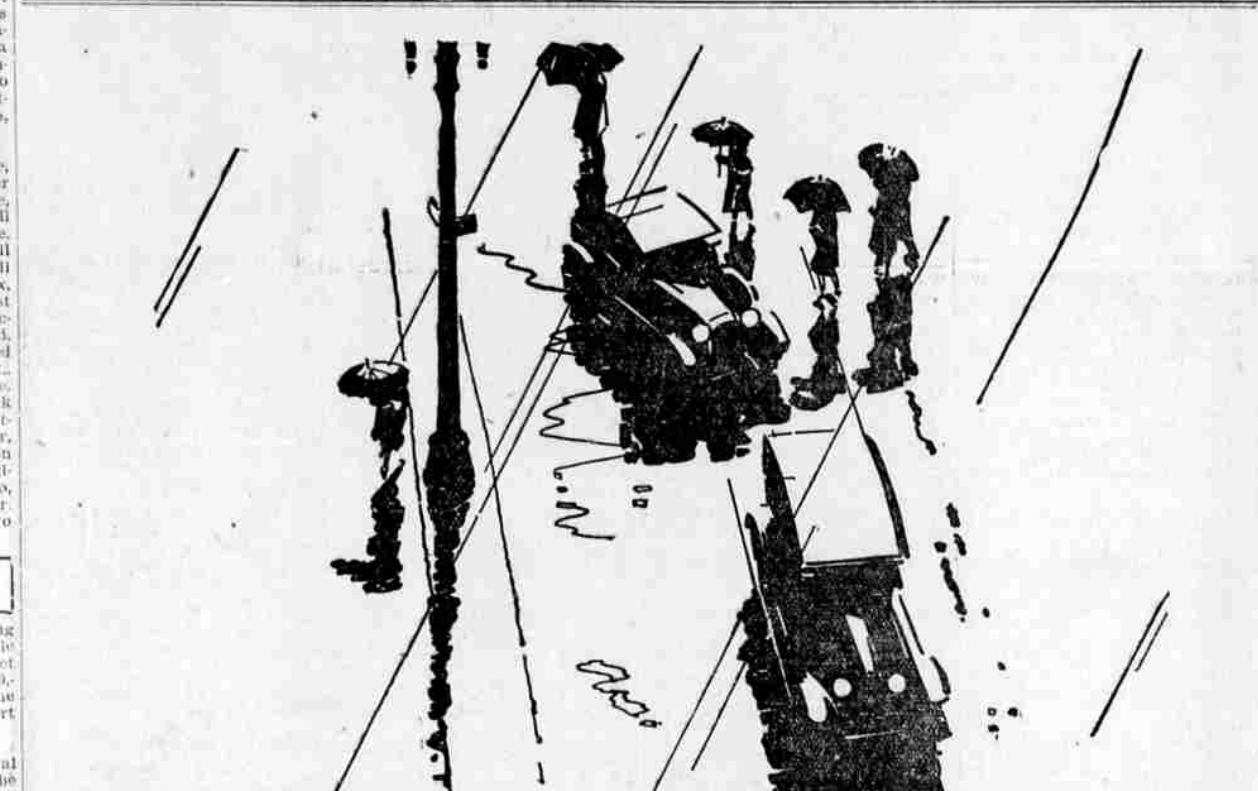
At the corner of Stuart and Tremont streets a decrepit automobile caught fire. One of its ten occupants was rescued by pedestrians. One had his trousers burned. None of the automobilists was a legionnaire.

Autos Bombed
Those boxes and crates that were not burned and tin cans that would not burn were flung at passing automobiles by the toughs. Tops of the machines were dented, and torn and in one or two cases crushed. Automobiles were seized and jounced until their springs gave way. Now and then an automobile was overturned. A few missiles were thrown from hotel windows.

Always it seemed the hoodlums were behind the bolshoiuism, and legionnaires were having too good time but confined his celebration to a parade, a quartet or an impromptu song and dance.

Incensed veterans took matters into their own hands several times when ruffians were found sporting legion uniforms they had no right to wear. The pretenders were quickly divested of their uniforms and sent on their way.

Several hundred persons were treated for minor injuries during the night. None of the injuries was serious.
