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LETTER RECEIVED HERE RECITES RAID ON PERUVIAN MINE

Mrs. James Soules of this city has received a letter from her sister, Mrs. V. L. McCutchan, at Oroya, Peru, describing the recent mine strike and acts of mob violence which occurred recently near that place. Mr. McCutchan has been employed as an official at the mines, which are owned and directed by a New York company.

"Sunday (Sept. 7) was payday, and at nine in the evening the mob came down from the town with guns, and broke every window in the office building and in the hotel and then came on to our houses," Mrs. McCutchan says in her letter. "The police made no attempt to stop them," she continues, "and when they arrived at the hotel we left the camp in two cars—all of the women and children and some of the men. McQueen was caught by the mob and beaten until he was left for dead and until yesterday (Sept. 11) no hope was held out for him. Now they think he will recover if no complications set in."

McCutchan Home: Raided. Mr. McCutchan had a very narrow escape. He had stopped to try to start a neighbor's car but was unable to get the machine started, and finally had to run with the mob at his heels. The auto he left behind was burned.

Mr. and Mrs. McCutchan's home was broken into and everything destroyed: the dishes were broken, the furniture smashed, clothing and jewelry stolen, bedding and silver taken and, in fact, the entire place ruined. The loss, she states, amounted to several thousands of dollars.

The refugees were cared for at neighboring mines, and the women then went to the nearby town of Oroya. The strike was quieted by soldiers sent out on the 10th. Mrs. McCutchan expects to return to the states for a visit in the near future.
