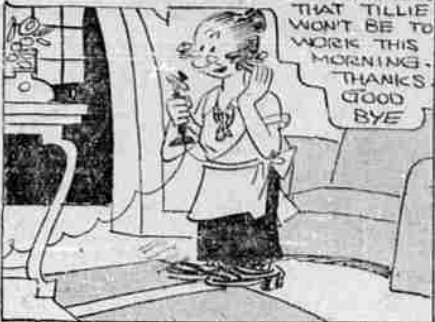

LIBERTY—Today, and Saturday, Betty Compson in "Inside the Lines."

DRY ACT REVISION BEFORE LABOR MEET

BOSTON, Oct. 10.—It appeared today that Charles P. Howard had persuaded his fellow committee members they should recommend to the convention of the American Federation of Labor modification of the Volstead law to permit manufacture and sale of 2½ per cent beer. He threat-

ened to fight the committee report from the convention floor if repeal of the eighteenth amendment were recommended. Howard, president of the International Typographical Union, is the only dry on the committee.

SAFE CRACKERS GET \$60 AT VERNONIA

VERNONIA, Ore., Oct. 10.—A hard night's work here netted safe-cracking prowlers \$60 and a sledge hammer. The \$60 came from the Spokane, Portland & Seattle depot where the loot was piled open the ticket window, got in and broke in to the safe. Checks totaling \$200 were strewn over the floor.

Cullerton's blacksmith shop yielded the sledge hammer, but nothing else.

ASYLUM PATIENT KILLED BY TRUCK

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 10.—Fred Miller, 80, patient at the state hospital for the insane was struck and instantly killed in the state hospital yards today when a truck driven by Sigfried Borenson backed against him. Miller, almost entirely deaf and with poor vision, stepped behind the truck unseen by the driver. Borenson was absolved of blame by Coroner Lloyd Higgins.

Miller was committed to the hospital from Lane county September 27, 1922.
