BEHALF OF MEIER

Mrs. Alexander Thompson, well known to club women of Oregon, will be a visitor in Roseburg, Tuesday, October 11, and will speak at an open meeting in the interest of Julius L. Meier, governor. Foster Butler of this city arranged for Mrs. Thompson's appearance here, as he is Douglas county chairman for the Meier campaign committee.

While the national political campaign was under way in 1928, Mrs. Thompson spoke under the auspices of the republican national committee in six states, Texas, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Missouri, New Mexico and Kentucky. For eleven years Mrs. Thompson served on the board of the Federation of Women's clubs; she was president of the Portland City Federation of Women's clubs, and is a director in the Portland Women's Research club.

At the August 7th meeting of 5,000 voters in the Portland municipal auditorium, Mrs. Thompson made the first speech seconding the nomination of Mr. Meier as an independent candidate for governor, and declaring her belief that the state should have a new deal in politics.
