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The Value of Fish

PROBABLY the matter before the people at this election which has aroused the most violent partisanship in western Oregon is the matter of closing the Rogue river to net fishing.

We are interested in this measure here in Douglas county because it so happens that there is a great similarity between the problems of the Rogue river folks and those of us on the Umpqua. The major difference, of course, is the fact that the fishing industries at Reedsport are probably much larger and more important than are those at the mouth of the Rogue.

Some time we shall be facing the problem of whether or not the Umpqua should be closed to commercial fishing and we shall want to decide that question fairly and sensibly. That is one excellent reason why we should give more than ordinary study to the Rogue closing amendment which is submitted to the vote of the people at this election.

Commercial fishing interests everywhere in Oregon are opposing the closing amendment. They say that the commercial fishers do less damage to the annual crop of sport-fishing than is done by other things such as the dumping of sewage in the river, taking out water for irrigation, etc. They also contend that the run of salmon in the Rogue is not being depleted. The Maclean estate owns the fisheries at the mouth of the Rogue. It is stated that these properties acquired in 1910 when the river was closed to net fishing by act of the legislature. The river was opened again by the legislature about 1913. If this is true, the Maclean interests will be no worse off if the present amendment passes than it was when it purchased the properties.

If commercial net fishing seriously depletes the supply of fish in the streams, and a large amount of evidence seems to prove that it does, then this amendment should pass. Fish in Oregon streams are worth money. They are worth money whether they are caught and canned by commercial fishers or whether they are caught and marketed by anglers. Reducing the problem to a strictly commercial basis the sportmen's association declares that the monetary return per pound of game fish is approximately \$2.00. It is known also that fish at the canneries are worth about 15 cents per pound. The money return from the sportmen is in the form of supply purchases, licenses, packers and guides, etc. The money return from the commercial fish is, of course, in the form of cash paid to the fishermen who in turn buy food and supplies. In other words the money return from fishing goes eventually into about the same channels whether it comes into the community in the pockets of sportmen or whether it comes in the form of cash from the canneries. The difference is that the per pound return from game fish is reasonably figured out to be \$2.00 and the per pound return from canned fish is said to be 15 cents.

On this basis if the net fishermen in the Rogue are depleting that stream, if the stream will have more and bigger game fish when the nets are banished it looks like a good business proposition to stop selling fish at 15 cents per pound and make a concerted effort to sell more fish to anglers who enjoy paying \$2.00 a pound.

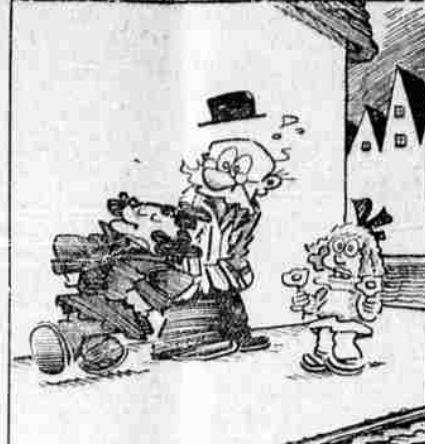

Talks on Health

HEALTH comes first of all in importance. The child who has a good start in life has an immense advantage over those who have been handicapped by ill health.

I wish every kiddie could be well nourished and possessed of good health. So many children go about listlessly, behind in their school work and burdened more than they should be by long hours of study and home work. How about your child? Does he seem tired, pale and irritable?

There is a real reason back of all this. The question of underweight children is a good many contributing factors. Perhaps the first thing to consider is whether the child has any physical defects. It is well to have your doctor look him over and give his opinion on the subject.

Sometimes a child with defective eyesight or poor hearing will develop a nervous physical condition. Very often a nervous, listless child who is behind in his school work will be found to have defective eyesight. If allowed to go on a haphazard and underweight child, it is a mistake.

In the case of underweight or listless children, parents are carried by the blood stream to all parts of the body. Such a condition should be attended to at the earliest possible moment. If the child seems to be underweight from this sort of thing it may be that the diet is not good. It will help him back to normal health.

It may be that your child is not getting the proper nourishment. Every child until he becomes of adult age should have at least a quart of milk every day, taken as a drink, or in his cooked food and with cereals. Milk should be the foundation of every child's diet and nothing but the very best milk is good enough for your child.

A growing child should have fresh fruits and vegetables. These furnish those wonderful vitamins, minerals and other substances which promote growth and energy.

Every mother has a real task before her in looking after her growing boy or girl. She must be careful about their food and how they eat it, their sleep, their everyday fresh air and sunshine, and good news knows how many other things. The hours of eating, rest and sleep should be on schedule time

THERE is much talk of beautifying Oregon highways, said Henry Richardson, Oakland druggist and business man, and there is universal need of such a work. "But," continued Mr. Richardson, "why allow one class the privilege of obstructing the vision and deny the other class? Going out on the highways where one wills, the only thing that can be seen above all natural attractions is the network of wires and poles belonging to power companies. These poles are unsightly things at best. The power lines stretching between are the principal objects that are visioned by tourists and local motorists." Mr. Richardson proposed that if the companies are allowed to use public property to carry their lines, that they be required by legislative enactment to light the highways at night, this service being given as a partial remuneration to the public for use of its thoroughfares.

He further stated that if the companies do not care to do this, or to modify present methods of carrying lines on poles set on public roads, that they be required to place all wires in conduits and remove the network now said to be obstructing the vision of all who travel the roads of county and state.

Production this year of oats crop, 7,110,761,000 bushels, compared with 12,043,320,000 bushels indicated a month ago, and 1,234,600,000 bushels produced last year.

It is thought this fox may have escaped from some fox farm. The animal was hungry, dirty and very ragged in appearance. Because of its condition the pelt on this fox is practically worthless. Silver tipped black fox prime pelts are worth from \$150 and up, mostly up.
