Situation Gloomy

PORTLAND, Oct. 12.—"The dried prune situation is discouraging," in the words of F. L. Kent, regional statistician for the U. S. department of agriculture.

Reviewing the crop, the bureau has this to say:

"Most of the dryer men (in the Willamette valley) report a time run of half-normal or less. One operator with a five-day run and a total of 228,000 pounds of fresh fruit reports a dry-out of 1 to 3.53, or 28.3 per cent.

"The mid-September rains appear to have caused an unusually rapid ripening of the fruit, and later rains caused much cracking and brown rot resulting in much fruit not being harvested.

"In the Roseburg district weather conditions were less unfavorable and it is estimated that 60 to 75 per cent of the fruit was saved.

"Trade estimates of the total northwest crop vary from twenty to thirty million pounds, with an average of around 25,000,000 pounds." California state food and marketing service reports the California dried prune crop at 468,000,000 pounds."

Mac Is on the War Path

BULLETS LAY LOW ONE OF KING PINS OF CRIME WORLD

Jack Diamond, Former Aide of Rothstein, Shot 5 Times in New York Hotel Room.

Still Alive, Declares His Assaults Unknown to Him—Girl Neighbor Figures in Case.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—Jack "Legs" Diamond, gangster and racketeer, rallied today in Poly-clinic hospital from five bullet wounds inflicted yesterday by would-be assassins who burst into his room in a west-side hotel, fired on him and fled.

Doctors who believed the gangster chief to be dying, reported when he awoke this morning from four hours' sleep, that he had a fair chance to recover, and they regarded his condition as so much improved that they held in abeyance plans for a blood transfusion.

Fevered and weak from loss of blood, his frame already weakened by tuberculosis and stomach ulcers and bearing the scars of five other bullet wounds received several years ago when "Little Augie" Orren was shot down by his side, Diamond awoke today, glanced wanly at the headlines about the shooting in the morning papers, and murmured to the patrolman on guard at his hospital door, "Oh, are you still there?"

Before sinking into a coma, he told police he did not know his assailants or why they shot him.

Show Girl Talks

Discovery of some of Diamond's clothing in a room adjoining his, occupied by Miss Marion Roberts, a show girl, sent police on a search for her.

She was found hiding in a clothes closet in the apartment of Miss Agnes O'Langhin, another show girl, on Eighth avenue. Miss O'Langhin recently brought a breach of promise suit against Rudy Vallee, radio crooner.

Miss Roberts, who real name is Marion Straarick, and who said her home was Boston, told police Diamond was in her room when the telephone operator called to say two men downstairs wanted to see Diamond.

She said they came up and Diamond took them into his own room. She said she ran down to the fourth floor and did not hear the shots.

Mrs. Diamond, who came by plane from their summer home at Acra, N. Y., told police her husband had been in New York since last Thursday.

Aide of Rothstein

Diamond, who has been arrested 21 times on charges ranging from first degree murder to suspicion, arrived from Europe by way of
