COUGARS ON WAY TO CHAMPIONSHIP OF COAST GRIDS

Prestige Boosted by 7 to 6 Triumph Over Trojans; Stanford Touted to Beat U. of O.

(Associated Press Special Wire) SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13.—Having triumphed over two of the Giants of Pacific coast conference on successive Saturdays, Washington State's Cougars will take a breathing spell this week-end while other members of the big ten-team circuit gamble for places in the win or lose column. The Cougars will meet Gonzaga's Bulldogs in a non-conference affair which figures to be more or less of an average workout. But their previous performances, in trouncing California 16-0, and beating Southern California, 7-6, has set football fandom on the coast figuratively on its "gridiron ear."

When Coach Hollingbery's proteges smashed out the impressive victory over California's Bears two weeks ago, those who find their football west of the Rockies asked "how come?" But when they conquered Howard Jones' great Trojan eleven Saturday, the feat revived fond memories to old grads of earlier years when Washington State teams were powerful in fact and not in theory.

The spectacular victory over Southern California, last Washington State in a strategic position so far as the conference championship is concerned. With any kind of "breaks" at least a tie for the States still have four conference games to play, namely with Montana, Oregon State, Idaho and Washington. But on the showing to date, close followers of the game believe they should come through with flying colors, the Washington game being the toughest.

Stanford and Oregon, not on Washington State's schedule this week, will make their first conference appearances next Saturday. The Stanford team returns from its tough nothing-nothing contest with Minnesota at Minneapolis for a brief practice before meeting Oregon State at Palo Alto.

Oregon State, however, has been downed by Southern California and Stanford rosters look forward to a victory.

Oregon has the week's hardest assignment—that of attempting to stop Coach Jimmy Phelan's Washington Huskies. Washington has won two conference contests, defeating Montana and Idaho, and has shown quick and favorable improvement.

So much so, in fact, Oregon probably will be a short-order when the two meet at Portland. The contest will open the gridiron strategy of two coaches, and the first game went to ten innings, with Rudy Kallio outlasting Ed Baechel and Jim Delaney. Carol Yerkes chalked a win in the second. Statz Homed, clinching the game, which lasted seven innings by agreement.

Both the San Francisco at Oakland, and the Portland vs. Missoula at San Francisco double-headers were postponed on account of wet grounds, and will be played off today.

ENROLLMENT OF ROSEBURG SCHOOLS SHOWS INCREASE

Enrollment in the Roseburg schools at the end of the first report month, shows an increase of 83 over the same period last year, according to W. M. Campbell, city superintendent. The increase by building is junior high, 34; Rose, 28; Benson, 11; Fullerton, 14. The senior high has 5 less students enrolled than last year. However, the enrollment for the four high school grades, which includes the 8th grade at the junior high school, is 428 as compared with 407 last year. The enrollment by buildings is, senior high, 293; junior high, 309; Rose, 273; Benson, 220; Fullerton 114. Total 1209. The total enrollment at the end of the first report month for the past

four years is, 1927, 1169; 1928, 1178; 1929, 1127; 1930, 1209.
