ALICE BRADY AND CO-STAR NAMED IN SUIT FOR DIVORCE

ATLANTA, Oct. 16.—Alice Brady, stage and screen actress, appearing here today maintained that she was not the slightest foundation for her being named correspondent in a Detroit divorce suit brought by Mrs. Bernice McClelland, wife of Miss Brady's leading man.

Donald Cameron McClelland, defendant in the divorce case, issued a statement saying: "I think it a shame that anybody as fine as Miss Brady should be dragged all over the front page of the newspapers. My only connection with her has been a purely business nature. I might have left on any train, but it is natural for a company to travel together."

The divorce bill charged Miss Brady made trips with McClelland and entertained him at her New York home and that he made the Brady home in New York his mailing address.

The daughter of William A. Brady, theatrical producer, said her relations with McClelland had been professional only and described him as "a charming gentleman and a good actor."

"I do not know Mrs. McClelland. Either Mrs. McClelland is mistaken in naming me in her divorce action or the charge is an outrage upon me. There is not the slightest foundation for any charge."

THREE COLORADO CONVICTS ESCAPE

CANYON CITY, Colo., Oct. 16.—Threatening Andrew Hemmerle, a prison guard, and holding him at bay with a knife, three convicts in the state penitentiary today escaped with a coal truck in which they were riding near the prison.

The escaped men are Peter Shoen, craft, serving a term for aggravated robbery; Raymond England, serving a term for burglary; and John Klinger, serving term for aggravated robbery and previous escape.

None of the men had more than 19 months to serve.

Hemmerle was forced from the truck, along with two other convicts, who refused to make their getaway. Harle Boyd, Denver, serving a term for robbery, and Victor Abrahamson, Adams county, liquor law violator, decided to walk back to the penitentiary with Hemmerle.

The escaped men drove the coal truck 12 miles and abandoned it. An organized search was being conducted for the convicts today.

GOAT INDUSTRY OF OREGON SURVEYED

Making a hurried survey of the Angora goat industry in Oregon, A. C. Gage, editor of the Angora Journal, Portland, and George S. Workman, secretary of the Lincoln county chamber of commerce, were in Roseburg a short time yesterday, in addition to being interested in the goat industry. Mr. Workman is endeavoring to promote all the interest possible in the completion of the Roosevelt highway. Douglas county has an Angora goat population of 70,000. Mr. Gage said it was his stated opinion that this country has excellent possibilities for increased revenue from mohair growing.

WHEAT TO PAY FOR FARMER'S HAIR CUT

SPARTA, Mich., Oct. 16.—The barbers of Sparta have agreed to cut hair for wheat. For one bushel of wheat any farmer living in these parts can obtain an artistic hair cut and 25 cents cash farm relief. The decision to accept wheat in lieu of money was reached at a meeting of all Spartan barber artists at which the present plight of the agricultural industry was discussed. Wheat is selling here for 67 cents a bushel and a trim is valued at 45 cents. Chickens belonging to Sparta barbers will benefit by the offer.

AMERICAN HELD BY CHINESE FOR \$85,000

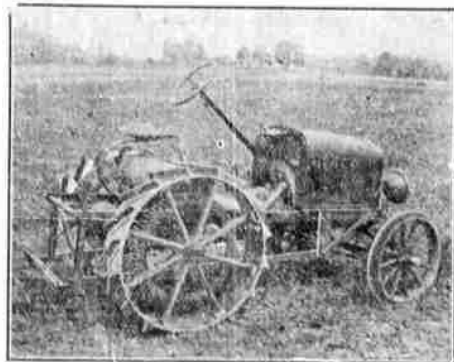

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—The state department was notified today that Bert N. Nelson of Minneapolis, held captive by Chinese brigands, has been instructed to ask \$85,000 in silver (about \$5,000 American dollars) as ransom.

The American consulate at Hankow reported it received a letter from Nelson saying he had been instructed to demand the money from Chiang Kai-Shek through the consulate. The report added

all possible steps have been taken to secure his release.

The announcement by the state department recalled at length the numerous American consular officials in China in recent months have issued numerous warnings to Americans in the interior urging them to withdraw to places of safety.
