Baby Bunting's Modern Mamma Finds Rabbit Fur Is Nice for Her

Bye Baby Bunting, Daddy's gone a-hunting, Gode to get a rabbit skin—But it's to wrap your mother in.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 18.—Baby Bunting's modern mamma has been edging Young Bunting out of the picture again.

First it was rabbit skins and now it's rabbit wool.

An Oregon woolen mill has turned out something new in lady's fashions, with scarcely more than a lick and a promise for B. Bunting.

It's a new yarn, said to be the first of its kind produced in the United States, spun from a superior quality of Angora rabbit wool into yarns for hand knitting.

C. M. and R. T. Bishop, woolen mill operators, improved systems employed by France and England to produce the yarn and say that one Angora rabbit will produce about 12 ounces of wool each year.

Cost of the material is high, growers receiving from \$3.50 to \$7 a pound, depending on grade and condition.

The Bishops say that the new wool is eight times warmer than ordinary wool, with a possibility of providing garments giving the maximum protection against changes in temperature.

Although the yarn is primarily in the luxury class a few garments, such as berets, blankets, caps, scarfs and baby hoods (for young Mr. Bunting) have been produced and displayed.

More will be produced, it is expected, as the supply of wool increases.

Paris Revives Beau Brummel in New Coat Made for Debs

PARIS, Oct. 16.—Beau Brummell, dead since 1840, is a force in 1930 fashion making.

The London dandy's name has been given to a new type of coat very popular here with the debutantes and those with debauche figures.

Wide revers, on a double breast of coat fitted to the waistline are the Beau Brummell model.

Dressmakers here make the revers in short haired fur like seal skin, heavier or lighter. Or they use velvet revers and understating collar on coats and coat dresses of plain colored wool.

The revival of wide revers and double breasted jackets is only a phase of a general revival of interest in 100 years ago. The centenary of 1830 started out by being a celebration of the hundredth birthday.
