ROSEBURG SENIORS DEFEAT GRIDDERS OF COTTAGE GROVE

Hard Battle Ends in 8 to 0
Score; Visitors Get as
Close as One-Yard
Line of Locals.

Outplaying Cottage Grove in every department of the game, the Roseburg senior high school football team yesterday won a hard-fought contest, 8 to 0, before a large crowd on Finlay field. Unending a fast and furious attack on the first play of the game, the Roseburg team carried the fight to Cottage Grove during the entire contest, and had the ball in the opposing territory practically the full time.

Roseburg opened a vigorous passing attack, which proved very successful and kept the Cottage Grove team on defensive throughout the game.

The visitors found it impossible to break through the Roseburg line, and made only five first downs, two of these resulting from completed passes. Roseburg's goal was in danger only once, but the Roseburg defense proved airtight in the crisis, holding the invaders for four downs on the 1-yard line.
