## PLANES COLLIDE IN RACE, BRINGING DEATH TO 2 MEN

TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 20.—George Zinn, 25 years old, wealthy sportsman of Tydal, Pa., and R. K. Kackie, 35, a professional pilot, were killed at the Mercer airport yesterday when their planes collided during the free-for-all race in the eastern states air meet.

A crowd of 25,000 was watching the planes round the home point at a speed of more than 120 miles an hour, when Zinn tore into the tail of Kackie's plane in a spurt to avoid hitting another machine. Zinn's propeller cut away the tail surfaces of Kackie's plane. Kackie attempted to land his plane but it dived nose foremost, falling less than 200 feet and buried the pilot under the wreckage. Zinn's plane crashed a moment later, bursting into flames as it struck.

Zinn was the son of the late Captain George Zinn who demonstrated the construction and operation of Brownie airplane runs to the American forces during the world war. His grandfather was Brigadier General George Zinn, an officer in the Union army during the Civil war. He had been flying about two years. His mother lives at Gordonville, Va.

Kackie began flying in 1916. During the World war he was an instructor at various army flying schools. Since the war he was engaged in commercial flying.

## CHINESE CHURCH WORKER TALKS TO AUDIENCE HERE

A capacity house greeted Dr. James L. Ding, Chinese missionary, at the Methodist Episcopal church Sunday morning. Dr. Ding, a forceful speaker, gave a graphic description of conditions in China as they exist today. He emphasized the importance of the church pushing forward in the critical, formative days of the new republic and vigorously attacked the activities of English and American tobacco companies in flooding China with cigarettes. He showed the danger of bolshevism from Russia, stating that millions of dollars are being expended to turn China to the doctrines of bolshevism. He related several touching incidents connected with his own work in China and closed with a strong appeal to the churches to take advantage of the opportunity China now offers for Christianization.

## W. C. HAWLEY DUE IN ROSEBURG TODAY

Congressman W. C. Hawley, republican candidate for reelection was scheduled to arrive in Roseburg this afternoon, to remain until Tuesday afternoon, meeting local citizens in connection with any public matters they may desire to present. Tuesday noon he will be the guest of the city at the public luncheon arranged by the chamber of commerce at the Umpqua hotel. The Kiwanis club is cooperating with the chamber of commerce in this event, by giving up its regular weekly luncheon date to the chamber. Congressman Hawley, who introduced the bill providing for the national soldiers' home at Roseburg, will speak regarding that project.

THERE are two Ramon Novarro's, apparently. One is a whimsical comedian, full of the joy of life, love and music. The other is a tragic, dominant figure, compelling in its intensity.

One sees both these Novarras in a single picture in "Call of the Flesh," the star's latest picture, which plays today and Tuesday at Hunt's Indian theatre. Novarro starts as a care-free youth in the powerful story, and winds up as a character Roeb, Barrett or Mussfield might well have played. And they could not have played it much better.

It is the story of a Spanish opera singer who sacrifices love and happiness on the altar of fame only to find that love is, after all, far more powerful than the lure of the opera. Charles Brabin directed the story, in which Novarro sings operatic as well as popular songs and gives a performance that is a notable milestone in his artistic career.

Dorothy Jordan is a delightful heroine as the convent girl he loves, and Renee Adoree a story actress as Lola, the dancer whose jealousy does the trick. Ernest Torrence is delightful as the old stinging tutor and Mathilde Comont injects comedy touches as the old nurse. Nancy O'Neill is a delightful and compelling Mother Superior and Russell Hopton convincingly as the heroine's brother.

## 650 LIVES TAKEN BY FIRE IN CHINA
