NEW CHINESE AREAS RAVAGED BY REDS; ONE CITY BURNED

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
KIUKIANG, China, Oct. 20.—A renewal of communist pillaging along the Yangtze river east of here was reported in scattered dispatches tonight.

Advices said red marauders had captured Hukow and Pengtze, northern Kiangsi province towns on the south bank of the Yangtze. Reports caused renewed fears that Nanchang, capital of Kiangsi, and Kichang were destined for invasion.

Reds also captured, looted and burned Yimling, in northwestern Kiangsi and were reported to have killed many of the populace. Outlaws were said to be pillaging towns and killing without restraint in towns about Poyang lake.

En route to Nanchang, 8,000 nationalist troops passed through here yesterday to join the little garrison which has been holding out there in the face of a formidable communist menace.

The government has not yet launched its large-scale offensive against outlaws south of the Yangtze. Marauders along the Yangtze above Hankow continue active. They attacked an American steamer, killing two Chinese passengers aboard but the vessel escaped.

FOOTBALL TEAMS OF COAST PREPARE FOR NEW BATTLES

Southern California Will Clash With Stanford; Cougars to Take on Montana.

Oregon, Following Victory Over Washington, 7-0, Will Play Idaho; "Kitz" Lauded.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20.—The main battleground of far western football will be shifted to a southern sector next week end with Stanford and Southern California meeting at Palo Alto in one of the most important clashes of the season.

Some 30,000 persons are expected to crowd into the Stanford bowl for the annual classic to watch Southern California's Trojans try to cut the Cardinals down to a team of defeated status.

Three other conference contests will pit the other undefeated teams, Washington State and Oregon, against inferior foes while California will meet its old time gridiron enemy, Washington.

Washington State, the giant killer of the circuit with victories over California and Southern California, will take on Montana in what should be an easy conquest. Oregon, winner over Washington, 7-0, last Saturday, will play Idaho this weekend and will be a strong favorite.

California lost a non-conference game to the San Francisco Olympic club, 13-7, but Coach "Nibs" Price used substitutes most of the time, the idea being to save the regulars for the tilt with Washington.

PORTLAND, Oct. 20.—Johnny Kitzmiller of Oregon is an all-American halfback if Ed (Ship) Madigan, St. Mary's coach, ever saw one.

He made this whole-souled declaration here after the Oregon-Washington game Saturday after flying from Los Angeles to watch Kitz in action. Oregon won, 7 to 0.

"Take it from me as something of a football expert, that Kitzmiller is better even than you think he is," Madigan declared. "He not only won the game by catching that pass, but I can point out at least three times when he saved the game by great defensive tackles."

"Without Kitzmiller, Oregon not only would not have defeated Washington, but Washington very likely would have beaten Oregon."

Madigan's St. Mary's team meets Oregon in San Francisco Thanksgiving day.

More than a thousand persons were out to greet the team. All members of the squad appear in good condition to start the two weeks' training period for the Washington State college shrine classic in Portland, Nov. 1.

BEYERS LEAVES TO START NEW WORK FOR TURKEY CO-OP

Herbert Beyers, recently appointed assistant manager of the Northwest Turkey Growers' association, is leaving tomorrow morning for Salt Lake, where he will reside while serving in his new office. Mr. Beyers has served for several years as manager of the local turkey growers' association and prior to that time was engaged with the Umpqua Broccoli exchange. He was also engaged in the farm equipment business in Roseburg for several years. His exceptional work in connection with the organization and management of the Oregon Turkey Growers attracted the attention of the federal farm board in its efforts to unite the turkey growers of the western part of the country, and he was recently called to Salt Lake to participate in the discussion of plans for the proposed organization. He was made one of the officers of the association, and was later selected by the farm board to assist in organization work. Following the definite formation of the Northwest Turkey Growers, he was named assistant general manager, and will have his headquarters in Salt Lake City where he will direct the work for the states of the western part of the country.

POWER OF CIRCUIT JUDGE ISSUE IN PORTLAND CASE

PORTLAND, Oct. 20.—A suit to determine the power of a circuit judge was to be filed here today by Multnomah county against three clerks in circuit Judge Tazewell's court. Apparently the case is to recover approximately \$2,000 collected by the clerks as fees in probate court cases, but it is regarded as having a great significance.

The clerks to be named defendants are L. J. Stack, E. W. Knowles and Merle Hotchkiss.

The suit follows refusal of the three men to comply with the demand of county commissioners that they return fee money collected and retained. The county holds the money was retained by the clerks unlawfully, while they declare they were within their rights in keeping it.

The action follows a long argument between the county board and Probate Judge Tazewell in which the latter held the law allowed the clerks to keep the fee money.

The county contends it has deputies who are supposed to serve the papers, collect a one dollar fee, and turn it over to the county. On the other hand, it is said, the clerks in the court are charging \$2.50 for handling the same papers, and are keeping the fees.

FORMER CHILOQUIN LEADER DRAWS 13 MONTHS IN PRISON

PORTLAND, Oct. 20.—Chester Balfour, former president of the Chiloquin chamber of commerce, today was sentenced to thirteen months at McNeil island federal prison for sale and possession of liquor and maintenance of a nuisance. He was sentenced by Federal Judge Bean.

The charges were contained in an indictment returned last June, based on alleged liquor sales at the Balfour hotel. John Wilson and George Phillips, jointly charged, pleaded guilty several months ago and served sentences of 90 days each.

Counsel for Balfour asked that leniency be shown on account of his good record as a citizen. George Neuner, United States attorney, appeared personally for the government and formed the hotel a nuisance of "the worst kind."

BIRTHDAY AUTO'S RECIPIENT KILLED

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 20.—At the wheel of a shining new automobile, a birthday gift he was receiving for the first time, Thomas Marshall, 18, of Baldwin park, met death yesterday on his natal day.

Proudly driving along to show his present to friends, Marshall died when his car collided with another machine, driven by M. J. Monroy, of Walnut park. William Ayron, a chum, who had joined the birthday party, was seriously injured.

EARTHQUAKE ROCKS LOUISIANA AREAS; SILT EASES SHOCK

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 20.—Southeastern Louisiana, including New Orleans and Baton Rouge, reported the first known earth tremors in the state's history Sunday but no serious damage resulted.

A resilient cradle of alluvial silt and moist loam, 2,300 feet deep, underlying the region affected, was credited by scientific authorities with softening the tremors, which nevertheless were sufficiently strong to throw scores into a panic.

The only injuries reported were at Morgan City, where worshippers in a Catholic church became frightened at apparently sear—the walls of the church away and were bruised in a dash for exits.

The quake occurred between 6:15 and 6:30 a. m., at Pilot Town, at the mouth of the Mississippi river. Steadily residents said they were shaken out of bed.

Professor J. Adair Lyon, head of the physics department at Newcomb college, said the gradual fading out of the tremors in northern, easterly and westerly directions probably indicated the vibrations came from a disturbance beneath the Gulf of Mexico several hundred miles from land.
