MRS. O'LOUGHLIN WILL FACE CHARGE OF CHILD MURDER

DENVER, Oct. 22.—Murder charges will be filed against Mrs. Pearl O'Loughlin, held in the death of her stepchild, Leona, ten years old, Friday, Captain of Detectives Bert Clark announced today.

He said the charge would be filed before the formal hearing on an application for writ of habeas corpus which Mrs. O'Loughlin's attorneys filed yesterday.

"Only a confession by some one at present unsuspected by us or a like development, which I believe almost impossible, will save Mrs. O'Loughlin from murder charges Friday," Captain Clark said.

During the night Mrs. O'Loughlin also was led to the dimly lighted bier of her stepdaughter in a mortuary and there she also was accused of the murder by Captain Clark and District Attorney Earl Wettenfel. Her denials rang through the corridors of the morgue.

Captain Clark said he would ask Detective Leo O'Loughlin, father of the dead child and husband of Mrs. O'Loughlin, to question the woman with him tonight. O'Loughlin returned from a hospital yesterday where he was suffering from the effects of ground glass which laboratory tests indicated was fed to him and his daughter.

Impetus to a police investigation of a plot to exterminate the entire family of the detective, was added last night with the report of the death of two pet animals from the effects of ground glass. A cat and dog had been fed scraps from the O'Loughlin table.

Police last night questioned John S. Allen, a tramway motor-man, behind closed doors. He was not detained. Allen is a roomer at the home of Mrs. Ethel Sparr, beauty operator, where Mrs. O'Loughlin went for a market the night Leona disappeared. The result of this questioning was not made known.

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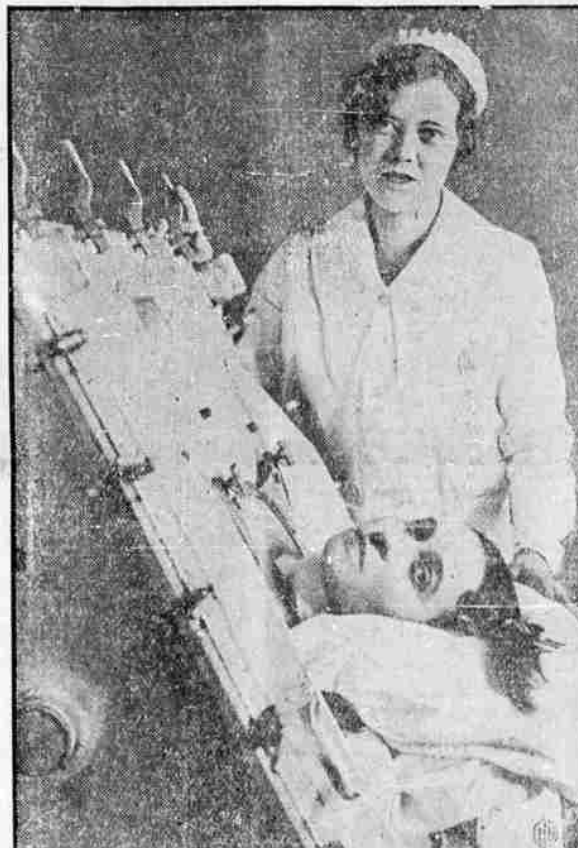

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FIRE NEGLIGENCE CHARGE FAILS IN LLOYD CAIN CASE

Lloyd Cain, of the Rice Hill district, tried in the justice court yesterday of permitting a fire to burn on government land, and being negligent in controlling a fire on his own property, was found not guilty by Justice of the Peace Hopkins at the conclusion of the case yesterday evening.

A complaint was brought against Cain by the Douglas County Fire patrol as a result of two fires that burned on property owned and leased by Cain during the latter part of September. It was charged that he had burned a slashing and that the fire had been allowed to spread to O. and C. revealed land and that very little had been done towards controlling it.

Cain claimed that he had secured a permit to burn the slashing, but at the time designated for the fire there was a heavy rain. The fire warden, he claimed, gave him permission to burn later at his own convenience, and that the fire was set on the morning of the 20th of September. It was so foggy, he stated, that the fire would not burn, and did not commence spreading until in the afternoon. He had employed a man to assist him and when the fire started to spread up the hillside, they began to "peak" it, working the trenches in a common point. The fire extended a short distance into government land in a fern patch, he declared, doing no damage.

The fire on his own land, he said, was started by hunters, and he did not have anything to do with it. It stopped of its own accord without spreading from his property and doing no damage.

The fire patrol, according to the state, was called to the fire by reports of lookouts, arriving in the evening and being unable to work because of fog. The next morning they found that the fire had been poorly trenched, and it was necessary to widen the trenches and leave two men for patrol duty.

Judge Hopkins held that the state had not proved a sufficient case to constitute the commission of a crime, and a decision of not guilty was returned.
