BENJAMIN FRANKLIN—AMERICAN PROPHET

"The appearance of Willie Scott's book, 'Benjamin Franklin in Paris,' will undoubtedly be hailed with equal delight on both sides of the Atlantic. The number of the Quaker ambassador's wit was such as to win French and Americans an understanding possibly deeper than might be brought about by many serious words. When people can laugh together all is apt to go well. Many of Benjamin Franklin's bon mots are in current use in France today. It would be interesting to know what vision of the future of aviation was entertained at that time by this far-seeing sage with the ready, kindly wit."

Ben Franklin was a great beginner; He gave the start to many a winner; He dreamed the Saturday Evening Post Which now rejoices such a host. Foresaw the age when printing type Would rule the world when it was ripe; 'Twas his to see the golden morn; 'Tis ours to see the ripened corn.

N. Y. CARING FOR DESTITUTE HOST IN BITTER COLD

(Associated Press Special Wire)

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Hundreds of homeless men shivered in the brisk wind whistling through the city today as the "flop houses" turned them loose after a sketchy breakfast. The first bitter cold of winter has crowded the city's lodging houses beyond capacity.

Since the first of the year, those in charge of the institution said, nearly 300,000 have been given shelter in the municipal lodging house, and indications are that advancing winter will carry the total far above last year's.

In New York City, where the temperature was mild in comparison to that in the northern part of the state, the thermometer yesterday registered a low of 35.5 degrees, making the day the coldest October 20 on record.

Caterpillar tractor plows forcing their way through snow three to four feet deep opened roads in the Buffalo area that had been snow-bound since Saturday, thus relieving threat of a food and milk shortage in nearby towns.

The cold spell was general throughout the east, with frost for the first time this season covering a wide area. Thousands of pheasants were facing starvation throughout western New York with grain and milk shortages in nearby towns. Appeals to help the birds have been sent out by the Izaak Walton league and other agencies. Efforts may be made to have the state conservation department postpone opening of the hunting season, set for Thursday, as the birds are huddling together in shelters and would be easy prey for unscrupulous hunters.
