A Citizen is Insulted

COMRADE J. A. Banks called our own W. C. Harding a liar and the fight was on—or would have been on but for the timely and athletic assistance of Banks' young companion. Banks' slurring insult hurled at so highly a respected member of our community as Mr. Harding is sort of typical of Comrade Banks' whole attitude and his whole campaign. He is stamping the state blaspheming, tearing down, destroying but offering nothing constructive. He wants votes. He will not realize until after election, if ever, that votes are not gained by calling people names.

Since W. C. Harding has been mentioned here it might just as well be pointed out that his record of accomplishment for his city and for his state is one that any man could be proud of. Mr. Harding is a leading and a guiding spirit here. He is working hard and working seriously to build a better city, a better county, and a better state. He has accomplished a great deal. For instance, Mr. Harding represented and fought for a group of pear growers who were entitled to an additional payment on their last year's crop. He got the money for them—nearly \$15,000. Mr. Harding conceived the idea that a branch of the national soldiers home should be established in the northwest, felt that it should be established in Roseburg and he went to work. We are about to witness the beginning of construction on this home. These two things he has done within the last year—they were just two of many events in his most active career as our champion of commerce security.

Mr. Banks does not deserve any support in Douglas county. Senator McNary has worked for us and is working for us. He is an able man and has a good record. Independent campaigns of the Banks type should be discouraged. They do no good. They tear down and destroy. This country can be better governed and better men be secured to hold office by means of strong opposing parties than by self-starting, irresponsible one man campaigns.

ROSEBLOOM BEATS BAIN WITH EASE

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—The first experiment with championship fights at "popular" prices in Madison Square garden, has shown that the innovation is far from popular unless the contenders can show more than Able Bain.

Bain, a Newark, N. J., youngster who has had little experience in the light heavyweight, proved only a cheapening block for Maxie Rosenbloom, the light heavyweight champion, last night and Maxie "defended" his title by scoring a technical knockout in the eleventh round of a dull match.

Even with the prices scaled down to where the best seats cost less than six dollars, only 1,400 of the fight faithful turned out and contributed some \$12,000 to the gate. And many of them left the arena before the bout wound to its certain finish.

Rosenbloom, apparently not in very good condition, weighed 174 pounds, Bain 171.

STRIBLING TO TEST FIST ON CHRISTNER

NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 23 Young Stribling starts another campaign directed towards a heavyweight title bout tonight when he tests his newly discovered knockout punch on the durable chin of Meyer K. O. Christner of Akron, O. It is Stribling's first bout since his return from England, where he scored a sensational knockout victory over Phil Scott.

Stribling has displayed a real

wallop in his recent battles, knocking out Otto Von Porat in Chicago and then Scotty Atkinson in St. Louis. Although Stribling has slipped back some what since he leaped into the limelight a few years ago, he still has considerable ability to take punishment and a dangerous right hand wallop in the bargain.

HOLLYWOOD TAKES OPENER OF SERIES

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 23.—The local feud between Los Angeles and Hollywood for the Pacific coast league baseball pennant, moved to the second tilt of the playoff series today with the defending champions, the Stars, clinging to a one game advantage.

A ten-inning struggle which was marked by seven home runs, featured Hollywood's victory yesterday 9 to 8 after the Angels had gone into the lead in the eighth and then came back to tie the score in the last half of the ninth.

Ray Jacobs 28-year old first baseman for Los Angeles, for whom the Stars' hurlers decided they safely could pass Wes Schulmerich, proved the hitting king of the contest with two homers and a pair of doubles in five chances.

Over at Oakland late in the past week a group of old timers were discussing roads, farming activities, politics and other matters of common interest.

Then pioneer reminiscence came in for brief discussion. One of these men, Ed Stearns, remarked that he was a native of Douglas county, his birth place being near Elkton, and that his father was one of the first settlers at Scottsburg.

Ed Stearns planted the old orchard that still stands on the hill slope above the street and highway. John Hedden's name was mentioned as one of those old timers, and he was remembered as postmaster at that place since the time any of the present residents could recall. All pioneers recall John Hedden, they said, and he was one of those men who always briefly spoke to the point when anything like an opinion was called for. In this connection Mr. Stearns said that a good story was told about Hedden that had caused him a laugh, and it would bear repeating.

It seems that John Hedden was postmaster in the days when a good deal of gold dust was being taken from placer diggings in the up-river country, and since Scottsburg was the "port of entry" for the whole inland section from the southern part of the Willamette valley clear on through the big territory to Yreka, all this gold eventually found its way to the lower Willamette, and from there to San Francisco. Hedden had a wide acquaintance with most of the miners, buying their gold and selling them merchandise. The post office was located in a corner of the store. One day a fellow whose appearance indicated that he was from the "effete east" strolled into town, located the postoffice and informed the postmaster that he was an inspector and would look over the records of the office. "All right, get to work," was the laconic reply. The inspector got busy, delved into all the affairs of the office, counted the stamps and the cash, and after a laborious effort came out to where Hedden was weighing out stuff to customers, remarking that he had found a defect and it would have to be made good.

Looking the eastern "bird" over a moment, Hedden reached in his hand some goods on his shelves, pulled out a tobacco box filled with "dust," and picking up a handful of the gold, asked, "How much?" Somewhat bewildered, the official examiner, somewhat abashed at the shortage being in the neighborhood of a shilling, Hedden scratched his head. A two-bit piece was the smallest coin usually handled, so he ventured to question, "You mean two bits?" The inspector was not going to be caught, so he replied, "Well, 25c is the amount." Hedden took the box of dust toward the federal agent, Hedden said, "There is about \$2000 worth of gold in there. Take out enough to make up that shortage, because I don't want Uncle Sam to go broke on my account. And say, mister, old timers looked on and admired you. If you don't like the way I run this postoffice just fetch in somebody you think can do it to suit you. So long as nobody in these dignified old kids, what's the fuss all about?"

That was back before the rail road was built through southern Oregon, and the old timers, and Hedden is still doing business at the old stand at Scottsburg, although the bustle and activities of the days of gold have departed. The oldest pioneer of the lower river continues to greet an occasional miner with a lot of ranchers and once in a while an inspector, who can usually explain the postoffice affairs at Scottsburg, while Hedden continues to hand out mail every week day to the town.

Cleanliness

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Talks on Health

GOD couldn't be everywhere so He made mothers. They have the hardest but the best of jobs. They are ever eager to give proper care to their babies.

Every month in the year is a difficult one for every mother. It is particularly difficult for the mother of very young children.

Today I want to talk to the new mothers. Every year thousands of babies are born in homes where there are no other children. It is an entirely new experience for the young mother. Naturally it is greater than that of the experienced mother.

It occurs to me I might outline some of the important things which will help to keep your baby well and happy. Suppose I give these suggestions under seven heads.

Air and Sunshine
A baby is a beautiful flower in God's garden. Treat it as such, but not quite as you would a flower. Fortunately it is less tender than a flower.

During certain hours every day in the year, except in the raw time of a terrible storm, the baby should be taken out-of-doors. Fresh air and sunshine is absolutely necessary.

Food
The feeding must be accurately and carefully made in their preparation. Clean hands and clean utensils are essential.

The baby must be fed at regular times. You must be regular as clockwork in this matter.

Water
Thousands of the weight of the human body is water. All the functions are carried on by organs and tissues which must be kept moist. To this end lots of water must be given the baby.

Don't wait until the infant suffers from thirst and cries in protest. Give bottled and cooled water at regular intervals.

Sleep
A normal infant sleeps from twenty to twenty-two hours from every twenty-four. All the surroundings must be arranged with
