1920 and early 1921 found their economic level after falling and falling, they first became stable and then began to rise slowly in response to demand. A long period of profitable business followed.

Prices of stocks, and prices of commodities, which have been going down steadily since last fall, will AGAIN find their economic level and first will stabilize and then start slowly back up again in response to growing demand.

That always HAS happened in the past, and it will happen again this time.

WHAT caused all this process of up and down that has so disturbed the business condition and has brought so much trouble all over the world?

Why, the WAR, of course. War

ALWAYS does that. It causes first inflation and then depression. It causes tremendous WASTE, and then we have to suffer while this waste is being made good.

Business throughout the world will never be really stable until people come to see that war is the greatest piece of foolishness that could be conceived, and decide sensibly to DO AWAY WITH IT.
