Washington, Columbia, Clatsop and Tillamook.

The three Washington counties named are King, with Seattle its metropolis; Yakima and Mason.

Indicted Month Ago

The conspiracy was asserted to have continued from Oct. 12, 1927, to Sept. 15, 1930.

Most of the men named in the indictment have been arrested since it was returned. A few were already in jail under sentence or awaiting trial on other liquor charges.

Eighteen counts are alleged in the indictment, returned secretly by a federal grand jury a month ago.

Ball on those arrested ranged from \$1500 to \$5000. Bail for Toozie was set at \$2,500.

When arraigned in court today Toozie was given further time to enter his plea. Pleas of not guilty were entered by Keene, Gilliland, and Maras. Schatz, also arraigned, entered no plea.

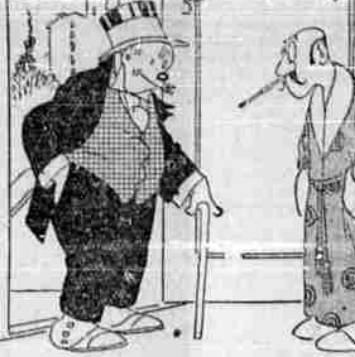

### AIRPORT LIGHTING EQUIPMENT ORDERED

Purchase of material for the boundary lights at the Roseburg Municipal Airport was authorized at a meeting of the commission held yesterday afternoon. The underground cable and lighting fixtures were ordered today, through the California-Oregon Power company, which is buying the equipment at cost for the city. The materials are expected to cost approximately \$1,500, while labor will bring the total expense to about \$2,000, it is estimated. The commission also authorized the extension of a water main to the field to supply water for the planes and the office building, construction of which was ordered. The building will provide a waiting room, rest rooms, telephone booth and registration office. Plans for the building are to be drawn at once by the engineers.
