Excellent progress is being made with the construction of sidewalks at the county courthouse. The construction of the walks is being done simultaneously with the installation of the underground sprinkling system. The walks are being built by county crews on force account, under the direction of County Engineer Fear, assisted by expert concrete workers employed by the county. Part of the work is being done by prisoners.

As soon as the walks are finished and the sprinkling system completed, the county court plans to invite A. L. Peck of the state agricultural college to take charge of the final landscaping. Shrubs will be planted and lawns seeded.
