

PROHIBITIONISTS LAUNCH NATIONAL EDUCATIONAL PLAN

(Associated Press United Wire)
CHICAGO, Oct. 24.—A nationwide program of education in behalf of prohibition was announced yesterday by the American Business Men's Prohibition Foundation. Charles R. Jones, chairman, said a budget of \$10,000,000 would be raised for newspaper and other advertising.

"More than 100 years of tireless education preceded the adoption of the eighteenth amendment," Jones said, "but with the ratification of the amendment by 46 of 48 states, practically all educational effort ceased."

"People forget quickly; they must be told over and over again. Moreover, during these past ten years following the advent of prohibition, something like twelve or thirteen million young voters have come of age who were children when the amendment was enacted; this younger generation has been given very little serious instruction in the meaning and possibilities of the eighteenth amendment."

The foundation lists as members of its advisory board nationally known men from all sections of the country, including James C. Penney, chain store executive; S. S. McClure, magazine publisher; Louis J. Faber, master of the national grange; Dr. William Lowe Bryan, president of Indiana university; Dr. Charles C. Sealeman, president of Methodist university; Dr. John Timothy Stone, president of McCormick seminary; and Amos Alonzo Stagg, director of athletics, University of Chicago.

Poling Defends Youth
WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—Questioning the fairness of general criticism of young people for lack of sobriety because of a few reports of flag carriers, Dr. Daniel A. Poling of New York told the international convention of Disciples of Christ here today that the youth of the country is fundamentally decent.

Dr. Poling, who is editor of the Christian Herald and president of said criticism would not help the young people solve their problems. "Intrinsically, the young people are as fine as they ever were and as responsive to all appeals to decency," he said.

Come Into the Kitchen

Simplicity! How beautiful! Waan't it? Socrates or some long-dead gentleness who remarked with much satisfaction, "There are so many things in this world that I do not want!" As I look about me more and more I come to his conclusion—worthless hieabrac cluttering up living(?) rooms—"dust catchers," I call them, overtrimmed hats, pseudo-seal coats, fish-net stockings, and above all—food!

Cakes weighed down with funeral flowers of ornamental frostings, frillings and flutings instead of good wholesome vittles, tables piled deep with indigestible delicacies(?)—tired heels and flushed cheeks for an over-ambitious hostess. Alas—alas—if we only could see the beauty in simplicity.

It isn't the ten-course dinner which leaves one with the over-stuffed, dazed, feeling that makes one a successful hostess. It isn't the table made stiff and unbearably formal with ornate cut glass effects and a battalion of silver that promotes after-dinner mentality. Ah! Better a crust of bread where love is than—oh, who wants a grumpy, straggly haired wife presiding over a feast.

"A pot of Java, waffle jug and those Beanie me, singing in the wilderness! Compared with your piled festive board Nay sister—this is heaven now!"

Which reminds me—just when the cupboard most nearly resembled old Mother Hubbard—who should drop in for dinner but one of the favored few!

And what did I do, my dears? Took inventory. Bought a head of lettuce and a half dozen bananas. My cooler yielded up some leftover waffle batter and mayonnaise, my emergency shelf a small jar of dried beef and a can of peas. I was pronounced. If you please, a most different hostess when in half an hour I served:

Rain Cereals with Creamed Peas
Whole Wheat Bread

Grape Jelly
Head Lettuce Salad with Russian Dressing
Tropical Bananas

Coffee.
Add how! To the leftover waffle batter was added a pinch of baking powder and a small jar of dried beef. This mixture was cooked in the trusty waffle iron about 2 1/2 minutes (did you know waffles keep crisp if placed directly on the rack of the oven slightly pre-heated while another waffle bakes?) Then served on hot plates with creamed peas in the center and a square of butter aloft. Of course a dash of paprika and a spring of parsley does wonders—decoratively speaking.

The dressing for the head lettuce salad was merely catsup added to mayonnaise (we make our own dressings.)

Tropical Bananas
Place bananas cut lengthwise in frying pan with plenty of butter. Brown both sides. Then sprinkle over the bananas about 1 cup of sugar to three or four bananas, and 1-2 teaspoon salt, cook until the sugar is melted. Just before removing from the range pour over the bananas a half cup of thin cream or undiluted evaporated milk. Serve hot. Oh, girls—this is good!

Curried Lamb in Rice Ring

With Hawaiian dressing.
The lamb dish was a meal in itself, the salad served a dual purpose of salad and dessert! Such meals give us culinary-minded individuals a chance for high life. Yes—No?

Curried Lamb in Rice Ring
Fill a ring mold with cooked rice. Place in pan of hot water until ready to serve; turn out and fill with the curried lamb.

Cook until tender, in butter (or substitute) 2 medium sized onions and two apples, both chopped fine. Then add 2 teaspoons or more (depending upon how well you like it) of curry powder, 4 level teaspoons flour, salt, pepper. Brown. Add 2 cups milk or milk and meat stock; when thick, stir in 2 cups cooked lamb, chicken or veal. Garnish the dish with parsley. The curried lamb may be served with little mounds of soaked rice. Gently insinuate the curry and place it with knocking knees but a hospital suite before Friend Hubbard. If you have never tried curry upon him before, P.S.—Don't tell him what it is. Talk about a stock market if it isn't going down—or golf, if it isn't raining.

Pineapple-Carrot Salad
(6 to 8 servings)
Soak in 1 cup cold water

T. gelatin. Add 1 cup boiling water 2-3 cup sugar 1-2 teaspoon salt. Then 1-4 cup mild vinegar or lemon juice.

Allow jelly to thicken somewhat then stir in 1 to 1 1/2 cups very finely shredded raw carrots and 1 cup shredded pineapple. Turn into individual molds or 1 large mold. Serve cold of crisp lettuce leaves. Your electric refrigerator is both a life and a wife-saver.

Hawaiian Dressing
Add 3-4 cup mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing, 1-2 cup drained crushed pineapple and 2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper. Mix. Serve cold with salad.

NATIONAL FUND MAY
AID DOUGLAS WORK

Dr. Estella Ford Warner, of the state board of health and representative of the Commonwealth Fund of New York, has been spending a couple of days in Roseburg investigating the health needs of this county which has applied for assistance from the Commonwealth Fund. The county has agreed to employ a full time health officer, as is required by the foundation as one of the requisites before cooperation is granted. If the county's application is granted, the Commonwealth Fund will match the county's appropriation of \$7,500 annually, which will add two rural nurses and a sanitary officer to the county's health force.
