A commission at Ponta Grossa today presented their commitments to Vargas in the name of the government junta.

Spain Lodges Protest
MADRID, Oct. 27.—The Spanish government today instructed its minister at Rio de Janeiro to file with the Brazilian government formal protest in the case of the German steamer Baden, fired on in Rio harbor, when 27 Spanish citizens were killed and 29 injured. More than 15 of the latter are in a serious condition.

26 Slain on Ship
HAMBURG, Oct. 27.—The Hamburg American line today received from the captain of their ship, the Baden, which was homeward by a Brazilian fort as he left Rio de Janeiro harbor for Buenos Aires Friday. The message said: "The Baden, leaving port, saluted all men-of-war and ports by lowering her flag. Had harbor master's special permit to depart. Passing Fort Santa Cruz, blew whistle. HUSKIES DEFEAT BEARS, TROJANS WALLOP STANFORD

Oregon Trims Idaho While
Statens Down Pacific;
Willamette Blanks
Puget Sound.

O. S. C. Doped for Defeat in
Struggle With Cougars;
Kittzmiller Leading
Coast Scorers.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 27.—This bustling center of football activity was enshrouded in gloom today but in the north and down in the south jubilant followers of the Huskies continued to make merry following a Saturday of great gridiron thrills and spills.

On the same afternoon, but a thousand miles apart, Stanford and California, coast conference nonarchs in many seasons of the past, were unceremoniously dumped into the "has been" class. Stanford, losing 11-13 to Southern California, ended its week-end season of football competition with a year's competition with Trojans. It made three successive annual victories for Southern California.

California's Bears, their ears pinned down 13-0, at Seattle, by Washington's Huskies, decided Coach Jimmy Friesen must of been foolish when he said his "cougars were 'not so hot' as football players. The result sent California's hopes for even a conference title the stumbling as they now have lost two games.

Next Program
Next week-end Stanford and California will face conference opponents more near their own size, as former meeting the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins Friday night, and California taking on Montana at Berkeley, Saturday.

Washington State, fresh from its latest conference triumph, a 61-0 beating administered Montana, will continue in stride and attempt to put away Oregon State in a game at Portland. Undisputedly the class of the conference, with earlier victories over California and southern California, on consecutive week-ends, Washington State is expected to have no difficulty in disposing of its next opponent in the championship race.

Oregon, the only other undefeated conference team, will rest up next Saturday after trouncing Idaho, 26-0 last week.

Southern California, Washington and Idaho will go in for non-conference opposition next week-end. The first named meeting Denver, University at Los Angeles; Washington brushing up its plays against the College of Puget Sound and Idaho tackling Gonzaga.

O. S. C. Easy Victor
CORVALLIS, Oct. 27.—Preliminary to its third important conference game at Portland Saturday against the undefeated Washington State eleven, Oregon State, in a Saturday night game, romped over Pacific university's team to win 57 to 0. Nine touchdowns and three converted kicks counted for Oregon State's score.

The game in Portland this week will be the 20th meeting of the two teams since 1923. The Cougars, who have taken the last two games in a row, are given an edge over the Grangemen in the hope. Of the 19 games, Oregon State has won from Washington State times, while the 1923 contest was a tie.

SALEM, Oct. 27.—Undeclared in its race for the northwest conference title, Willamette university Saturday gained a 21 to 0 victory over College of Puget Sound by slow steady playing in the ninth annual homecoming game.

**INJURIES TAKE TOLL OF
SOME LEADING PLAYERS**

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Three stars of the eastern football firmament were carried out of the field Saturday with injuries somewhat more serious than the ordinary jolts of the game, and two of them today were on the road to recovery.

Albie Booth, little Yale ace who lasted only one play against Army, was described as doing well, although he remained in the college infirmary and may stay there a few days longer. His injuries were described as blows on the head, mouth and back, otherwise a good shaking up from a hard tackle and the pile-up that followed. Yale

officials expressed the belief that Booth would be able to play against Dartmouth next Saturday. Jim Murphy of Fordham suffered a slight concussion when tackled hard by a couple of New York university players but was unable to be up and around yesterday.

Charley Devens of Harvard got a broken leg in the Dartmouth game and will be out for the season.

Stan Udinsky of Dartmouth suffered a knee injury that may cause him trouble for a week or two.

Two Amherst players were hurt in the Wesleyan game and are in the hospital, apparently through with football for the year. George Cadigan, star back, is temporarily paralyzed in both legs and Lyman Westfall, guard, suffered a broken leg. George Munger of Pennsylvania received a jolt similar to the ones that put Booth and Murphy out and was taken to a hospital for rest and observation.

Roberts Tops Scorers
Jack Roberts, Georgia fullback, scored one touchdown against Auburn Saturday and by it held his lead in the national individual football scoring race against the assault of Macaluso of Colgate who tallied 28 points against Penn State. Roberts has scored 72 points and Macaluso 70.

constitution. The first offered was very brief. As the "constitution" now stands, authority is given the legislature to create an indebtedness not exceeding 3 per cent of the assessed valuation of all property in the state, for the purpose of creating a fund to be loaned or paid to those who have served in the army, navy or marine corps, particularly to residents of the state of Oregon who served in the World war, or for a period of not less than ninety days in the Spanish-American war between February 14, 1898 and August 7, 1899.

To receive the bonus payment or loan, the beneficiary must have been a resident of Oregon at the time of entering into the service. The issuance of the bonds of the state is authorized, in order to create the necessary fund, 3 per cent of the assessed valuation of the state would now amount to about \$22,500,000.00. The amount of the loan authorized for each soldier who does not elect to take cash payment is fixed at \$4,000.00, to be secured by a mortgage on real estate. According to the Oregon Blue Book for 1929-1930 the amount of these bonds now outstanding is \$27,500,000.00.

The amendment of these constitutional provisions, now about to be voted on, would make the following changes:

1. The amount of state indebtedness is to be increased to 4 per cent of the assessed valuation, which would increase the limit of the bond issue to about \$45,000,000.00, or an increase of from twelve to thirteen millions.
2. The requirement of ninety days' service by Spanish-American war veterans is to be omitted.
3. The period of enlistment of Spanish-American war veterans is changed to the dates between February 14, 1898 and July 4, 1902, this extension of the period operating to include those who served in the Philippine insurrection and the Boxer rebellion in China.
4. The amount of the real estate loan to a veteran is reduced to \$3,000.00.
5. The requirement that the veteran must have been a resident of Oregon at the time he entered the service is done away with. Instead, the requirement proposed in the provision is that the veteran who was not a resident of Oregon at the time of entering the service must have been an actual and bona fide resident and inhabitant of the state of Oregon for a continuous period of not less than 10 years immediately prior to the time of making application for the loan privilege. (This provision does not apply to the cash bonus, only to loans.) Those who borrow under this provision must pay a rate of interest on their loans which shall exceed by one-half of one per cent the rate of interest paid by the state upon its bonds. The proviso applies to any person otherwise qualified, and therefore both Spanish-American and World war veterans are eligible to its benefits.

cists with 50,000 young fascists, 50,000 standard bearers of 5,000 combat groups would gather in the capital and that other great meetings would be held in Milan, Perugia and Naples.

The Duce charged Giovanni Giurati, whom he recently appointed to succeed Augusto Turati as secretary of the fascist party, with the "purification" of Italian fascism, saying, "You must be lenient only to the black shirts whose service antedates 1922."

While the Duce was speaking in the palace a large crowd gathered, filling the square and shouting for him. He appeared on a balcony and responded with the Roman salute.

War Bogy Stressed
The premier, referring to the attitude of Italy's neighbors in the last four years, said: "These (moral war activities)

were made against Italy well in advance of my speeches at Leghorn, Florence and Milan. Here, "the Duce" indicated documents, "a list of batteries, poised, forts constructed and armaments pre-disposed and consigned. Could I fail to sound the alarm to the Italian people in the face of this?" "Naturally, those from whom the mask was torn will attempt to invert the situation and represent Italy once more as the sole peril to European peace, the sole nation of wolves amid herds of peaceful lambs. This game is childish. Fascist Italy is arming, relatively speaking, because all are arming. She will disarm if all disarm.

For Defense Only
"Let it be clear, at any rate, that we are arming ourselves materially and spiritually to defend ourselves — not to attack. Fascist Italy never will take the initiative of war."

"Our very policy of revision of treaties, which does not date from yesterday, but was pronounced from June, 1928, is directed toward avoiding war, toward effecting the immense economy of avoidance of war. Revision of peace treaties is not of prevalently Italian interest but is European and world wide. The possibility of such revision under the very part of the league of nations is not absurd or unattainable. The only thing absurd about it is the pretext of immobility of treaties."

"Who is violating the pact of the league of nations? Those who, at Geneva, have created and wish perpetually to maintain two categories of state — the armed and the unarmed. What moral party can exist between one nation that is armed and another that is not? "By 1950 Europe will be on its last legs — will be decrepit. The only country of young men will be Italy. It is only towards the east that we can direct our peaceful expansion. You therefore understand our friendships and alliances."

Spurs His Aide
The Duce turned during his address to Giovanni Giurati, the newly appointed fascist party secretary, saying, "You have the job of routing out the enemy amongst us, the ballast that is slowing up our march. There are people who can betray us, and who, in secret, do betray us. It is better to have them in the face than on the flanks. They are not today a danger but are certainly a hindrance and, in certain cases, can become a menace."

"Fascism is an army on the march. Its well being, therefore, must be guaranteed by methods of safety. The masons, who are sleeping, may awaken. By eliminating them we can be sure they will sleep forever."

British foreign office.
Ambassador Dawes deposited America's ratification in person. Prime Minister MacDonald and Arthur Henderson were present at the ceremony for Great Britain.

and Ambassador Matsudaira for Japan.

The French and Italian ambassadors witnessed the ceremony but did not sit at the table with the other envoys.

Prime Minister MacDonald welcomed them and said he hoped the time soon would come when their status would enable them fully to join in the provisions of the treaty.

Irish Free State was not represented because the dail had not yet ratified the pact.

The British ratification and that of all the dominions was signed by the king with the pledge the monarch "ensages and promises his royal word to give effect to the treaty."

U. S. Bars Secrets
All of the representatives signed a declaration saying they had met and had deposited ratifications "of the treaty for the limitation and the reduction of naval armament," signed in London on April 22, 1930.

The declaration of adherence to the naval treaty, also signed by Ambassador Dawes, contained the reservation of the United States senate that no secret agreements were involved in any way in connection with the London treaty.

Hoover Felicities
WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—President Hoover asserted today as the London naval treaty became binding upon the United States, Great Britain and Japan that it was "fair to all and dangerous to none," and substituted mutual trust, good will and confidence for suspicion among nations.

"It is a pleasure to felicitate the peoples of Great Britain and Japan and the people of this country, upon the conclusion of a sound and reasonable agreement between them, fair to all and dangerous to none, which has been accepted by each nation as affording adequate protection and which substitutes for suspicion and competition mutual trust, good will and confidence," President Hoover said.

At the same time he expressed a hope France and Italy would eventually reach an agreement and become full partners in the treaty.

"They have been making active efforts within the last few months," the executive said, "to arrive at a complete understanding. The people of Great Britain, Japan and the United States and indeed the peoples of the whole world, have watched these efforts and confidently hope that patience and good-will may yet lead to a solution."

Mr. Hoover's address took six minutes to deliver and was transmitted by radio to every section of the world, along with those of the representatives of the other two governments.
