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LOCAL GUARD GETS INSTRUCTIONS ON HANDLING OF GUNS

The regular drill of the local National Guard company was held last night. The attendance at drill is increasing now that the members of the company are not working out of town. Forest service work and the prime harvest have been the biggest causes of poor attendance at the weekly meetings.

The schedule last night included instruction in elementary machine gun drill, nomenclature of the pistol, and technique of machine gun fire. At nine o'clock the company formed for a half hour of close order drill. After every drill the men show improvement in the performance of each movement.

Another activity is the firing of the machine gun with the sub-caliber attachment. The sub-caliber attachment consists of a 22 rifle barrel clamped on a machine gun and so adjusted that when the machine gun is set to fire on the target the attached 22 barrel will hit the same spot. The course of instruction on this, which takes two or three nights to complete, is the same that is fired on the outdoor range at 1000 inches with 30 caliber ammunition. The indoor range is 500 inches. Men who have completed this course have fired on the outdoor range without any error of instruction and qualified as expert gunners.

The idea for this sub-caliber attachment was obtained at Camp Clatsop but has been further developed by Lieutenant Dowker of the local company.

MUSSOLINI AND FASCISTI INDULGE IN WAR GESTURES

ROME, Oct. 28 — Premier Mussolini in exercises celebrating the eighth anniversary of the Fascists' march on Rome pledged his legionaries today to lead the nation in arms again if needed.

While 30 airplanes maneuvered over Rome, the Duce in full uniform of an honorary corporal of fascist militia, addressed a large throng in the Piazza di Siena, on the Pincian hill.

Mussolini spoke briefly, directing his talk mainly to women and blackshirts, among whom were 40 blind. Himself a wounded veteran, the Duce called them "comrades" and added it was eloquent that they already proven in conflict, should feel the need of entering the militia to defend fascist revolution.

"I am sure," the Duce declared, "if events required it you, who already have given so much in yesterday's war would be ready even tomorrow, to march ahead of all the armed nations."

He hearders shouted, "Yes!" "Will you do it?" "Yes!" the throng repeated. "All Italy welcomes your oath and knows you will be faithful to her in every instant of your lives." "Italy and the whole world must take note the fascist regime every year conquers new consciences of upright and valorous men, capable of renewing the gesture by which nations war," the premier continued.
