

PRISONER OBTAINS LIQUOR AND GETS EXTRA SENTENCE

Kenneth Wolfe, serving a term of 18 months in the county jail for stealing gasoline at Lillard, received an additional 6 months' sentence this morning after pleading guilty to the possession of liquor.

Wolfe has been working with a group of trustees in the construction of sidewalks and curbs at the courthouse yard. When the trustees were taken into the jail yesterday evening, the deputy sheriff noticed a suspicious bulge in Wolfe's neck. Upon investigation, they found that he was carrying a bottle of liquor.

He admitted that a friend had left the bottle for him. Wolfe said he was unable to force the name of the friend from him.

He was arraigned this morning before Justice of the Peace Hon. H. H. and entered a plea of guilty. His new sentence will start after the expiration of his present term. This is his third conviction in the local court, having been brought in previous to the theft complaint on a charge of drunkenness, for which he served 15 days.

BOND ISSUE URGED FOR SOLDIERS HOME

In the interest of a large vote for the city bond issue designed to take care of the expense of buying land and access thereto for the proposed branch of the national veterans' home here, several scores of local business and professional men joined today in the publication of a page advertisement on another page of this newspaper.

The advantages which will follow the passage of the bond measure are itemized and other facts cited. The measure will appear on the general election ballot with other city, state and county measures, together with candidates.

he committee. Now it is an individual proposition. If Roseburg shows a united and unanimous stand upon this project, it will undoubtedly carry much weight with the committee in the selection of this site. If we are divided, then, naturally, the committee will not be so quick to select Roseburg for this institution.

"We must get out the biggest vote it is possible to secure and the bigger the vote in favor of the bond issue, the more weight it will carry."

Bonds Only Contingent
The meeting was opened up for a general discussion of the amount, and several of the points were explained.

It was stated that some people have the idea that if the bonds are voted and the soldiers' home is placed in some other locality, that the council can use the money for some other purpose. It was explained that this is entirely in error. The bonds cannot be sold until after the home is authorized for Roseburg and the site selected and the money can be used for no other purpose than the acquisition of the land and the construction of such roads, bridges or other means of access that may be required.

It was also reported that some people believe that the full amount will be used regardless of the cost of the site. This also was shown to be untrue, as the council is authorized to issue only such amount of bonds as may be needed to pay the actual cost of acquiring the property and pay for the roads and bridges. If this does not absorb the full amount authorized, then the council cannot issue any more bonds and cannot spend any of the money for any other purpose than that specifically designated.

Barrier Against Wastage
Another point developed was the inclusion in the amendment of the right of eminent domain, a feature which must be passed upon by the legislature, a legislative act being necessary before the council's authority can become operative. The condemnation clause, it was stated, gives the city complete protection in purchasing the land. Through the legal procedure provided in such cases the city can buy the land for its actual value and cannot be forced to pay an excessive price, thereby assuring that there can be no waste of funds.

City Offered Big Bargain
Dr. George E. Houck developed the interesting point that this pro-

posed bond issue is the only one with possibly one exception, that promises any direct financial return. Other bond issues have been authorized for general improvements, such as streets, sewers, library, city hall, fire truck, etc., projects necessary in themselves but having no direct financial return involved. The one possible exception is the aviation field bond issue, which may in the future result in some receipts to the city.

The soldiers' home issue, however, promises immediate financial returns at a rate of many hundreds to one. Roseburg would invest a maximum of \$125,000, possibly less. This investment assures the immediate release of \$2,000,000 federal money in a construction program, or an expenditure of \$16 for every \$1 invested by Roseburg.

Good Returns Figured
The government pays a cash bonus to soldiers of \$50 per month. The Roseburg home will be built for a maximum of 4,500 men. Figuring, however, a basis of \$40 monthly pension and a population of 3,000, the monthly income will be \$120,000 or an amount equal to the bond issue released in Roseburg every month of \$14,000,000 every year, more than 19 times the amount of the bonds. These calculations, Dr. Houck explained, do not take into consideration the salary paid the seven or eight hundred employees.

Practically all of the pension money received will be expended in Roseburg, as the men receive their food and clothing.

"The cities of Oregon," Dr. Houck declared, "are spending thousands of dollars to bring new settlers into the state. Here we have an opportunity to bring 3,000 men at a cost of slightly more than \$41.50 each, not counting the families that will take up their residence here also to be near the soldiers. Through our chamber of commerce we are receiving several hundred dollars for every family we locate on some chicken ranch in the county and we consider it a good investment. Here are men who will have an annual net income of \$480 each, which is considerably more than that of the average family where children, food, rent and other living expenses are deducted, and we can secure them at a cost of \$41 each. Certainly it is a worthwhile investment."

Maximum Vote Sought
The Kiwanis club considered various ways of getting out a life vote on this issue. It was voted to employ a telephone operator to call every home in the city having a telephone connection and urge the residents to vote. The members of the club agreed to visit their cars at the district of voters who would transportation to the polls and who would with be credited out through the chamber of commerce. Roseburg merchants were requested to carry a line in their place of business in the newspaper calling attention to the bond issue, and asking for a favorable vote. The attention of the press, however, was also called to the fact that the money received as a result of the bond issue would be placed in the hands of the citizens, and might be overlooked. Notice was given by the club to be sure that they vote on the proposition.

incorporated cities and towns along with other territory and the territory within such districts is not required to be contiguous or adjacent, and important questions arise as to just what the smallest portion of the amendment might be.

A noticeable feature of the proposed amendment is that it does not limit the taxes which could be levied or the amount of bond issues. In this respect the proposed amendment departs widely from the present policy which limits the taxing powers of local taxing districts and also limits the extent of their bond issues. Again, it appears that the board of five directors of any such district may levy a tax or issue bonds without the vote of the people in the district. It is provided that the legislative assembly shall and the people may provide any legislation that may be necessary, in addition to existing laws, to carry out the provisions of the amendment. However, it is safe to say, these districts being created by the constitution, the legislature would not have the right to restrict their powers, however. It might legislate as to details concerning the exercise of those powers.

The purpose of the amendment appears to be good but it has the appearance of having been very loosely drawn, as it seems to leave the door open for the wasting of large sums of money and placing great burdens upon the taxpayers. It appears that constitutional limitations as to the creation of districts would not apply to these districts, and the limit would be the sky.

WEATHERLY GIVEN ONE YEAR WHILE PAL IS PAROLED

Norris Weatherly and Ernest Higginbotham, accused of burglary at the Roseburg Freyer garage in Scottsburg, August 9, were sentenced to one year each in the state penitentiary today. Higginbotham was granted a parole, in custody of Edwin Grubbe of Elkhart, but Weatherly, Judge Hamilton, stated, will have to serve his time.

Weatherly and Higginbotham were arrested last night by Stinson, speaking from his home here over a network of New York state broadcasting stations. He urged the election of a republican congress to give full support to President Hoover for the remainder of his term.

Judge Hamilton, however, stated that he had made a very careful investigation of the case and that from all the information he had been able to receive he had convinced himself that Weatherly was entitled to punishment. He stated that Weatherly had borne a poor reputation for several years, and that he had seemed to be the leader and had influenced Higginbotham in the commission of the crimes.

In view of this circumstance he declined to show leniency to Weatherly.
