By Geo. McManus. BUYING OF PRUNES NOW ON INCREASE

(Associated Press Special Wire)
PORTLAND, Oct. 28.—An almost general resumption of buying is seen from orders for prunes being received by distributors in Oregon and Washington, while the volume is by no means extreme it is regarded as significant. Orders are well distributed and are being received from the Atlantic coast and other domestic trade centers as well as from Europe.
The Scandinavian countries and Germany are the best buyers abroad, but some business is again passing with the United Kingdom.
The price list is practically unchanged. Oregon prunes are being listed generally around 1 cent for 30-40s and 51 cents for 40-50s.

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EASTERNERS WANT TURKEYS ON BASIS OF CONSIGNMENT

PORTLAND, Oct. 28.—Although the storage stock is unusually limited and there is practically no likelihood of a South American supply coming to this country, turkey growers of the Pacific northwest seem to be more or less uneasy about the outlook for the present crop. Unwillingness of eastern operators to "make" a price is responsible for most of this concern. Eastern operators are quite willing to take turkeys but they want them on consignment. Very few growers are willing to ship on this basis.

That there has been entirely too much pressure against the turkey market is now generally indicated, growers declare.

Last season the relatively low price was caused mostly by the "bird" stock in storage as well as by arrivals from South America, plus, together with the large output caused more or less confusion in price.

Government reports indicate the 1930 turkey crop for the country as a whole is about three per cent smaller than that of 1929, but larger than either 1928 or 1927.

This report says that in spite of the shortage of feed supplies in some areas the condition of raising turkeys this year is about the same as of the same date last year.

For the country as a whole the proportions of turkeys ready for the Thanksgiving and Christmas markets this year are practically the same as last year.

Oregon has 7 per cent less birds

most active in their demands at present.

Wire inquiry for celery shows some improvement. No immediate price changes are in evidence though.

Supplies of northwestern cranberries are less than last year's. As a year ago, at this time, eastern and Wisconsin supplies are being held for sale.

Potatoes declined again at northwestern shipping districts yesterday. Idaho buyers were offered only \$1.00 per cwt. for No. 1 tubers. Local (Portland) No. 1 Burbanks are selling as low as \$1.25 per cwt. Although many growers are holding for \$2.50.
