BISHOP CANNON IN HOSPITAL TO GAIN REST FROM WOES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Bishop James Cannon Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, is undergoing treatment at a local hospital for an acute attack of neuritis and inflammatory arthritis.

The churchman's condition is complicated also by other nervous disorder brought on in considerable measure, attending physicians believe, by the pressure of difficulties which have surrounded him in recent months. One or two months of rest and hospital treatment will be required to restore him to health.

Bishop Cannon has been under special strain since his recent return from Brazil. He hurried back to this country to meet charges filed against him within the church by four ministers. He will defend himself against these later if they are made the basis of a church trial.

Within the last few weeks legal steps have been taken against one of his sons, R. M. Cannon, of California, in connection with financial difficulties. This, the bishop charged, was one of a series of attempts to persecute him and his family.

Soon thereafter the bishop announced he was filing a suit for \$5,000,000 damages against William Randolph Hearst, alleging libel through the publication in some Hearst newspapers of stories dealing with his recent marriage and other matters.

FOREIGN FLASHES

PERIGUEUX, France, Oct. 28.—The Geneva-Jordan express was derailed here today. Eight persons were killed and about thirty injured.

BERLIN, Oct. 29.—One hundred twenty-six thousand metal workers returned peacefully to their tasks this morning after a three weeks strike.

The strike was settled with an agreement between workers and employers negotiated by Herr Stegerwald, minister of labor.

Settlement of the strike removes another cloud from the government's political horizon.

MAGILLIGAN, Northern Ireland, Oct. 29.—The Rev. Hugh Butler, said to be the world's oldest clergyman in point of service and years of life, died today aged 94.

He had been minister of the Magilligan Presbyterian church nearly 75 years.

GOERDITZ, Germany, Oct. 29.—An area of 2,000 square miles in western Silesia has suffered damage estimated at 1,000,000 marks in the floods of the last few days, which today were receding.

McNARY VOWS TO WORK FOR INCREASE IN LUMBER DUTY

PORTLAND, Oct. 29.—Revival of the lumber industry of Oregon and Washington by means of a "protective tariff fully adequate" to cover the difference in production costs existing between American labor and foreign labor, is predicted by Senator Charles L. McNary. Speaking on the lumber industry here last night Col. Alfred E. Clark declared McNary had pledged himself to work for higher lumber tariff.

McNary was quoted as believing the present duty of \$1.00 a thousand, to be increased to \$1.50 as a result of a study of production costs being made by the tariff commission, is only the first step toward achievement of a lumber schedule that will impose a tariff of \$3.00 on Canadian softwood lumber and a still higher duty on imported Russian lumber, as distinguished from Russian lumber produced by either convict or forced labor, or lumber exported for the purpose of dumping it on the American market, all of which is now excluded by law.

One of the greatest values in connection with the duty, even though it may be questioned that the protection is wholly adequate, Col. Clark said, "is that congress has created a precedent by giving some protection, and congress in the future can increase that duty to a point where it will afford complete protection to the lumber industry in Oregon and Washington."

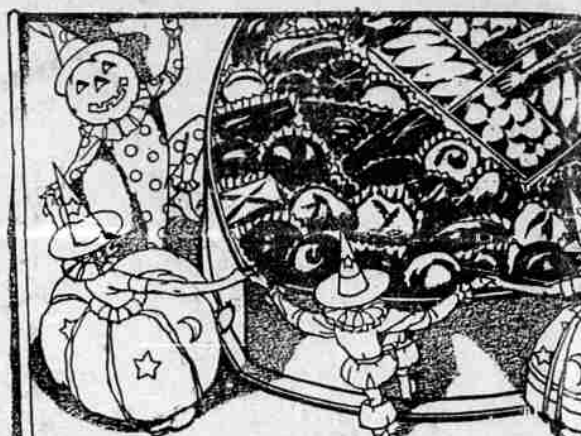
