LOCAL SOCIETY TO SPONSOR CHAMBER MUSIC PLANNED

Formation of a Chamber Music society to sponsor a local appearance of the Neah-Kah-Nie string quartette in Roseburg November 24 is being sponsored by Mrs. C. S. Heinline, assisted by other music instructors and music lovers of the city. This quartette appeared in Roseburg at Mrs. Heinline's home last year, and was greatly appreciated.

The plan is to create a society of from 100 to 200 members, each of whom will pay a membership fee, which will entitle them to bring a specified number of guests to the concert. These details will depend largely upon the number of members secured in the society, which will sponsor it. It is expected several music events, but particularly the string quartette.

This organization, which is composed of Susie Fennell Pipes, first violin; Hubert Sorenson, second violin; Alexander Vdovin, viola, and Michel Penha, violoncello, is one of the very few groups in this country which, through endowment, is able to devote itself exclusively to the preparation and performance of chamber music.

The endowment is provided by a wealthy woman of Los Angeles, who has provided funds to support several such organizations. The members of the quartette spend their entire summers and early fall at Neah-Kah-Nie, Oregon, in strict adherence to a rigid program of practice and rehearsal in preparation for their concert season.

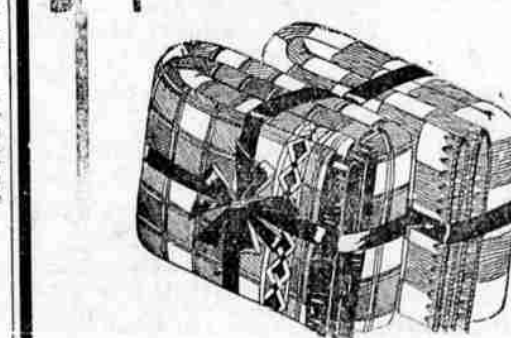
