these policies of his into execution.

Power "Trust" Scored

Mr. Meier praised Roseburg very highly for its campaign for the national soldiers' home, and promised to use his every influence in assisting in that effort.

The major portion of his talk related to the power issue. He declared that he stands for the interests of the people and for the interest and preservation of the water power resources of Oregon. He maintained that the so-called power trust has forced itself into the state government until it has gained control of important officials and departments and can manipulate the legislature. Its work, he insisted, has even extended into the schools.

Commission Assailed

He attacked the public service commission, declaring that the public service commission law has no place in Oregon.

"The public service commission," he said, "was created to regulate the public utilities. Instead of that, however, the power trust is regulating the regulators. The power companies are permitted to place fictitious values on their properties, and are assured by law of earnings upon these inflated values. They bond their physical properties for full value, then place a great value upon the water that belongs to the state, and upon this fictitious valuation provide a basis for their rates to consumers."

Mr. Meier quoted figures intended to support these contentions. He pledged himself to a business administration and declared in favor of free text books in public schools, the continuation of the state road program and a tax program that will result in a lower tax burden.

His audience received his ad-

dress in a very enthusiastic manner.

Foster Butler, county manager, presided over the meeting and the first speaker introduced was George W. Joseph, son of the deceased Republican nominee. Mr. Joseph made an appeal for Meier's candidacy, emphasizing the close association that existed between Meier and Joseph, and his own desire to see his father's ideals carried into effect. He recited some of Meier's personal history, dealing chiefly with his constructive work of a civic, charitable and patriotic nature for Portland and the state at large.

Slush Fund Alleged

Kenneth G. Harlan, utility rate expert, spoke at considerable length upon the grange power bill, declaring that the power companies are spending hundreds of thousands of dollars to defeat this measure. His principal thought was that the commission, while crying about increased taxation, are worried chiefly about the effects of competition. He declared that if the taxes paid by our power companies in Douglas county were eliminated, that the additional cost to the average taxpayer would be only 34 cents.

"The farmer and merchant," he stated, "pay their taxes out of their income. If they have a profit then the tax comes out of the profit, but if there is a loss, the tax must be paid regardless of such loss. The utilities, on the other hand, are assured a definite rate of income above all expenses."

He detailed methods of construction of public owned utilities by the issue of bonds, stating that this can be done without any cost to the taxpayers.

"It may never be necessary," he said, "to construct a single public owned plant in Oregon, but the fact that the people have this right will act as a club over the utilities to prevent continuation of excessive rates."

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the present instance, however, special considerations have thrust the Hoover policies into the spotlight. The business situation, and what the president did and did not do about it, have formed the arrow-head of the democratic attack. Prohibition has contributed its share to the dispute, and the republican tariff bill became a law just in time to carry its special load of controversy to the political stump.

Opposing Claims

No responsible party leader denies, however, that on the basis of all these issues jumbled together, the democrats have made a really serious bid for control of the next house of representatives. Even when they speak privately, the democratic politicians insist they expect a majority. The republicans basing opinions on a different set of reports from the field, insist privately while their margin of control will be reduced materially, the majority will remain republican.

If the most earnest professions on both sides are to be taken at face value, this is one campaign where only a count of the ballots can deliver a reliable verdict. The senate is quite another proposition. Only one-third of its membership comes up for election in 1930, and many of the states electing provide no possibility of a turnover. In the limited field remaining, republicans and democrats agree the republican majority will be reduced, but only an epochal democratic landslide could insure democratic control.

Insurgents Hold Power

Into all of these mathematical calculations enter eventually the unknown quantity known as "X." It stands for the western independents, that group within the party which has stood so often against the major policies of President Hoover. What comfort can Mr. Hoover expect, the republicans ask themselves, from republican majorities in senate and house so slender as to give the independents the balance of power.

On this question, directly, the independents themselves are not speaking for publication. It is a part of the day's news, however, that Senator Norris, after remaining silent through most of the campaign, has left Idaho to speak in Nebraska for Senator Norris, who bolted Hoover in 1928.

cated that part of the amount was still due.

KEWANEE, Ill., Oct. 29.—Officers were believed closing in early today on three members of the kidnapping gang which abducted and held for ransom, Earl L. Youm, wealthy Galva, Ill., banker. The trio eluded capture last night when they fled from what officers believed was the final pay off of a \$10,000 ransom. Three highway policemen surprised the men but they fled at the officers' approach.

One shot was fired by the highway police to halt the "extortionists' car, believed the same in which Youm was carried off Saturday night to be held for four days. The kidnappers fired once in return and finally crashed their machine through a farm fence four miles from the start of chase. They fled afoot and although additional forces were hastily summoned from Kewanee, their trail was lost.

Airplane Aids in Search

Police and volunteers from all towns in this section of the state were called out to patrol roads and a daybreak airplane took off from Kewanee airport to scout for the kidnappers, believed still in the vicinity where they left their car. It is a farming country but wooded in spots.

The abandoned car bore an Iowa license, and, according to a highway officer at Princeton, was seen early yesterday morning passing through that town followed by the car of Andrew Anderson, cashier of Youm's bank.

Part of Ransom Blocked
A tip from an undisclosed source to Sheriff Charles Nash of Henry county, now leading the pursuit, revealed the final installment of the ransom, reported to be \$50.

000, was to have been paid last night. Officers said it was not handed over before surprise and flight of the extortionists.

Meanwhile vigilantes armed with rifles and shotguns guarded the Youm estate at Galva with orders to shoot to kill anyone who tried to break through the lines and get to the house.

This order followed a telephone call to the Youm home last night in which the banker was reported to have been threatened with bombing unless an additional installment of \$10,000 ransom were paid immediately.
