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DRAIN CIVIL WAR
VETERAN DIES AT
AGE OF 87 YEARS

DRAIN, Oct. 30.—Jacob H. Redifer, the last Civil War veteran living in Drain, died Saturday, October 25, at the age of 87 years. He was born in Bath county, Virginia, January 9, 1843. When three years old the family moved to northern Missouri where when he was 11 years old his father died. Following this the care of his mother devolved largely upon him in which struggle he proved himself a dutiful son. When 19 years of age, soon after the breaking out of the Civil war, he enlisted in the service of his country, on August 2, 1862, and served three years, attaining the rank of sergeant in Co. I, 8th Missouri cavalry volunteers. While in active service he received a gunshot wound in one of his shoulders which troubled him somewhat during the remainder of his life. When Mr. Redifer was quite a young man he was converted to Christianity and on leaving for the army his mother gave him a small testament which he carried while in the service and the much worn but highly prized volume is still among his personal effects. He was married March 22, 1872, at Urbana, Mo., to Miss Lydia E. Tedlock, who preceded him in death Jan. 25, 1925. After residing a few years in Kansas Mr. and Mrs. Redifer and children came to Oregon in 1895, first settling near Myrtle Creek. In 1909 the family moved to Roseburg where Mr. Redifer engaged in merchandising and conducting a boarding and rooming house for about four years after which they moved to Drain. To the veteran and his devoted wife were born four sons and two daughters all of whom are living. They are E. W. and A. C. Redifer, of Myrtle Creek, Oregon, R. L. Redifer, of Albany, Oregon, and L. V. Redifer, Flora Sumner and Virgie Craig, of Drain. He is also survived by 13 grand children and two great grand children. He was the last surviving member of a family of eleven children. Mr. Redifer was a lifelong member of the Methodist Episcopal church and lived consistently in the faith until the day of his death. He was also a strong advocate of prohibition of the liquor traffic.
