ADAMS DEFENDS HIMSELF AGAINST EUGENE CHARGES

Avers Motives in Alleged Effort to Sell Water System Distorted in Propaganda.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 31.—The federal trade commission today received from E. J. Adams of the special board of investigation the statement in which he contended charges made against him for alleged attempts to sell the municipal power plant at Eugene, Oregon, to P. W. Chapman & Company, were wholly false and without foundation and fact.

He said the charges made by F. M. Bennett, manager of public relations department of the Eugene water board, and Laurence Todd, Washington representative of the telegraph service of the Soviet Union, were "intrinsically without substance in fact."

In his statement Adams said his "dominating desire was to do bigger things for the people of my home town than I have ever accomplished before—bring about a great industrial development that would give employment, im-

prove business conditions and increase community incomes."

Adams requested the commission to investigate the matter thoroughly and asked both Bennett and Todd to be cited to appear. The commission officials advised that the statement had been received and was being held under advisement for future action.

SEVEN ARRESTED IN LABOR TROUBLE AT SACRAMENTO

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 31.—Unless communists and their followers commit acts of violence, no more arrests will be made in connection with activities against Sacramento employment agencies yesterday which resulted in seven arrests, Chief of Police William N. Hallanan said today.

The seven arrested, including Mike Daniels, communist party organizer, were booked at the city jail on charges of robbery, but Assistant District Attorney Alex Ashon said he believed the charge should be extortion. District Attorney Neil R. McAllister said he might lay the case before the county grand jury tonight.

The trouble started yesterday when groups of unemployed, assertedly led by communist agitators, visited a number of employment agencies and demanded refund of deposits paid by job-seekers. Proprietors of agencies told authorities they refunded money to claimants because of the threatening attitude of the crowd.

TWO OF BANKER GALVA'S KIDNAPERS SOUGHT BY POSSES

KEWANEE, Ill., Oct. 31.—Mystery again clouded the hunt today for the kidnapers of Earl Yocum, Galva banker, as posses patrolled the surrounding country for two alleged plotters still at large. Reliable reports indicated a third suspect had been lodged in the county jail at Cambridge, incommunicado, and that vigilantes had picked up the trail of one man in the nearby hills.

County and Kewanee city officers denied or professed ignorance of the rumors but expressed hope the two men would be under arrest by nightfall. Harry Whiskers and Vernon Ahlgren remained in custody, Ahlgren having confessed his part yesterday, officers said.

State Attorney Charles Melin made a hurried trip today to Geneseo, refusing to reveal his quest.

CLIFFORD CHANGES HIS ALLEGIANCE

MEDFORD, Oct. 31.—Harold Clifford, former state game warden, was in southern Oregon today distributing literature opposing the closing of the Rogue river to commercial fishing. He is said to be employed by the McCleay Estate company, operator of canneries on the lower Rogue.

TWO CONFESS TO MURDERING BANKER

CHICAGO, Oct. 31.—An all night grilling, police said, brought confessions today from John Popone, 22, of Gary, Ind., and Charles Rocco, 23, that they had slain Courtney Merrill, south side banker, during a holdup last Tuesday night.

Merrill, vice president of the Union State bank of South Chicago, was fatally stabbed with a stiletto by one of two bandits who trapped him in a garage at the rear of the bank.

NIGHT WATCHMAN KILLED BY FALL

PENDLETON, Oct. 31.—Edward Strahorn, night watchman for the local flour mill, died last night following a fall down an elevator shaft. The 50-foot fall resulted in broken legs and severe back injury.

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During the same commission hearing which preceded Clifford's dismissal as warden, he was quoted as denying he was working for the McCleay company.
