

U. S. AND PRIVATE INDUSTRIES OPEN JOBS TO WORKERS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—The navy department announced today that the bureau of yards and docks would undertake construction of public works and utilities aggregating \$14,000,000 as part of contracts for the projects could be let.

The program for the construction of those works was authorized by congress last May 14. The department announced that contracts at every had been placed by the bureau totaling \$2,900,000.

Reports from industrial areas that employees are responding to the efforts of the president's emergency committee for employment to keep men on the job during the winter months were made public today by Chairman Woods.

Meanwhile, the interstate commerce commission, for the first time, set aside its regulations on railroad accounting to enable the Chicago & Northwestern railroad to spend half a million dollars in unemployment relief.

A report from Fred C. Croxson, Columbus, Ohio, a regional advisor on the president's relief committee, said employees in many plants in large Ohio cities had been given assurance that their jobs would be secure throughout the winter.

Taken as indication of the response in eastern sections, a letter from Nathan M. Ohrbach, employer of New York and Newark, said a plan had been adopted for a staggered system which will provide employment for many persons without reducing wages.

The plan provides that 1,250 persons will receive one half day off each week without reducing wages. This means that the workers as a whole will be beneficiaries of 1,250 half days or 625 days of additional freedom each week. Extra employees will be hired to fill this gap.

Woods also received assurance from the A. S. Beck Shoe corporation of New York, which operates nine factories and 100 retail stores, that it would keep its full personnel throughout the winter.

SENIORS TO PLAY AT MYRTLE POINT

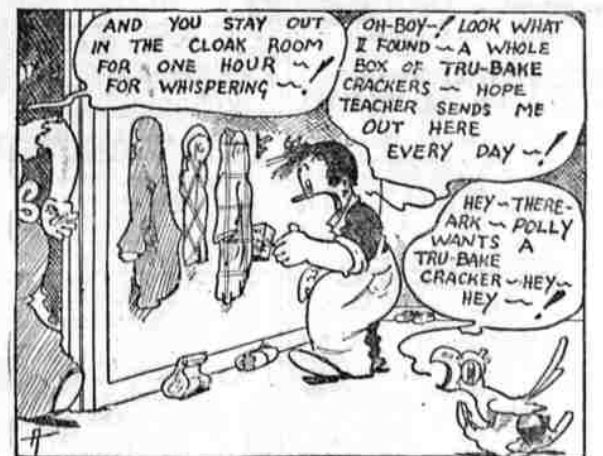
