

COUGARS EXPECT TOUGH GAME BUT SURE OF TRIUMPH

Conference Leaders Ready
to Face Oregon Staters,
Who Are in Perfect
Trim for Battle.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 31 — On the trail of the Oregon State Beavers a pack of Washington State Cougars, 35 strong, stalked into Portland today for the football argument with Oregon State college here tomorrow.

Conquerors of California and Southern California, the Cougars were confident of hurdling the powerful Orange team in their march to a conference championship. But not one member of the squad, from Coach Hollingsworth down to the water boy, would voice that confidence. Hollingsworth said simply his team "is ready for a tough battle."

The Oregon Staters will reach Portland tonight. They are expecting Washington State to resort to the same diversified assault that proved so successful against California and U. S. C.

Every player making the trip is in excellent shape. One member of the regulars, Arnold Soley, full-back and letterman, was left at home to nurse an injured neck.

Prospects of good weather inspired new attacks on the ticket office today and a big crowd was expected. The weather forecast read: "Fair tonight and Saturday."

O. S. C. In Good Shape
CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 31 — Oregon State's football team is "physically trim and ready mentally to make it plenty tough for the cougars" in the coast conference game at Portland Saturday.

This was the assurance of Coach Paul J. Schissler who leaves tonight with his men for Portland where they will await the game with Washington State.

The Orangemen are optimistic and determined. They have lost to Washington State in the past two years and have prepared to give their best to break this series of defeats and to break the Cougars' series of victories this season.

The forward wall of the Orange squad will be composed of veterans: Sand McGilray and Bill McKallip, ends; Kent and Miller, guards; Cox and Thompson, guards; and Hammer center. In the backfield probably will be Hal Moo, right half; Cecil Sherwood, left half; Ralph Buerke, quarter; and Frank Little, full.

Special trains and busses will carry approximately 2500 Oregon State students and supporters to Portland today. A great pre-game demonstration has been planned for tonight and Saturday.

**SHARKEY OFFERED
CHANCE AT STRIB**

CHICAGO, Oct. 31 — Jack Sharkey, the Boston heavyweight, today had an offer of \$60,000 for a 10-round bout with young Stribling in the Chicago stadium January 8.

The offer was despatched to the Boston gambler last night, after Stribling had agreed to gamble and accept a small percentage, with a \$60,000 guarantee going to Sharkey. The Georgia heavyweight is confident he can knock Sharkey out and thus leap into the spot for a championship fight with Max Schmeling.

Stribling, knockout conqueror of Ito Von Porat, will appear in the stadium December 12, with Paulino Uzcudun as his probable opponent.
