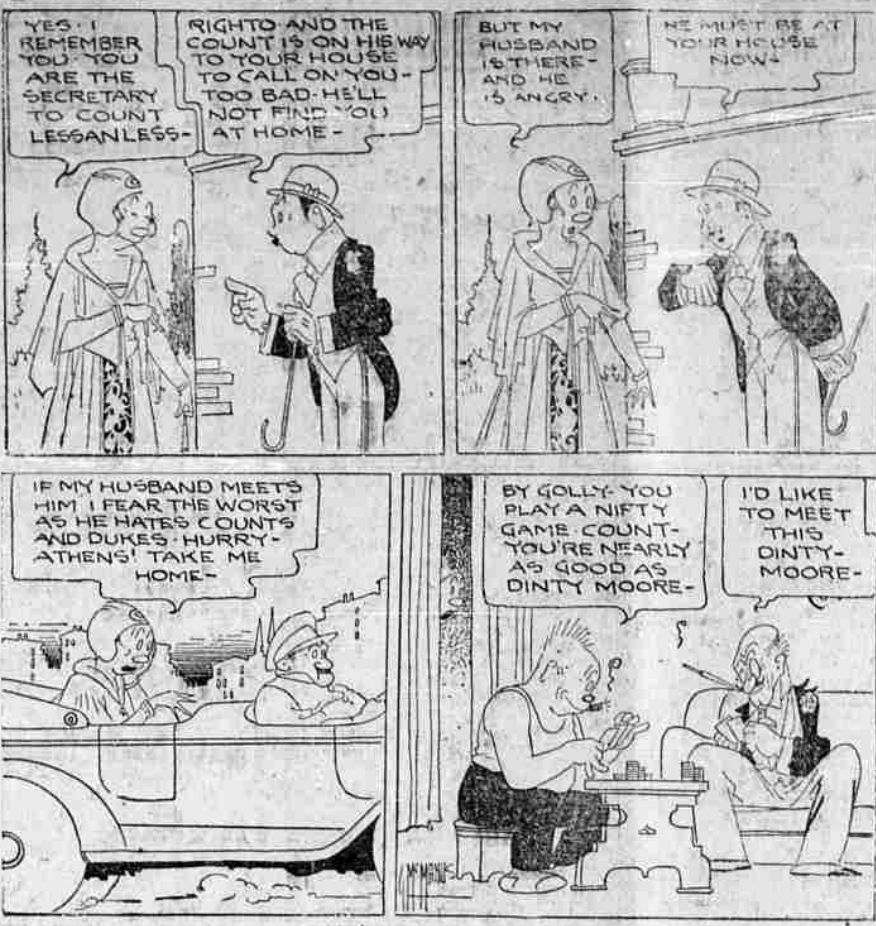

THE idea that a high birth rate is a good thing, while a low birth rate is a bad thing, goes back to the old days of despotic kings who needed plenty of cannon fodder with which to fight their battles.

Like many other ancient ideas, including the theory that the good things of life must be reserved for the favored few, and that the masses must not aspire to happiness and comfort, and a reasonable amount of leisure, it has been discredited by experience.

We are learning that huge populations don't always mean prosperity and happiness. China, for example.

SO don't worry yourself into an early decline over the fact that Oregon has the lowest birth rate in the Union.

We want more population, of course, but don't forget this: We DON'T want any more population than we can find jobs for.

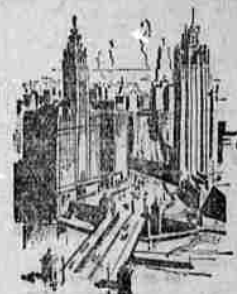
