First Annual Meeting of County P.-T. A. Held Last Saturday

The first annual meeting of the County Parent-Teacher association convened in the music room of the junior high school at 11:30 a. m. on Saturday, October 25th, with Mrs. J. C. Leedy, president, presiding. After a short business session, the meeting adjourned for a 12 o'clock luncheon at the Palace cafe which was greatly enjoyed by all delegates present.

After the luncheon Mrs. Homer Grow favored the association with a whistling solo.

A most interesting discourse was given by Mrs. Chas. Heinline of the Heinline school of music and art, accentuating the value and need of music in the public schools. Mrs. Heinline stressed the emotional and spiritual education of children as well as their mental and physical training. In her opinion, a child is not fully educated unless he has had emotional and spiritual training.

At some length, Mrs. Heinline outlined the progress of music in our public schools and particularly mentioned the success of free piano class instruction offered by the Portland public schools.

In behalf of the public school children and their future welfare, Mrs. Heinline pleaded with the delegates present to require free piano class instruction in the Roseburg public schools, thereby affording musical education of children financially unable to obtain this training outside the public schools and to those whose musical training would otherwise be neglected or ignored.

Immediately after Mrs. Heinline's address, delegates reconvened in the music room of the Roseburg junior high school with President Mrs. J. C. Leedy, presiding. A whistling duet rendered by Mrs. Homer Grow and Mrs. Louis Kohlhaugen was enjoyed by all present.

A report from each of the following parents and teachers' associations was read by the respective delegates: Mrs. Louis Kohlhaugen—Fullerton Assn. Mrs. Ferguson—Days Creek Assn. Supt. E. S. Hall—Rose Assn. Mrs. P. W. Beckley—Snick Assn. Mrs. Leo A. Wells—Fullerton Assn. Mrs. Fleck—Glide Assn. Mrs. Harvey—Edenlower Assn. Mrs. Earl Agee—Green Assn. Mrs. Colter—Myrtle Creek Assn. Mrs. Lawrence—Riddle Assn. Mrs. J. C. Leedy—Junior high Assn.

Mrs. John E. Runyan, president of the Douglas County Health association, then spoke on public health welfare, and the need of a dental clinic, provided by the county in the court house, where one-half day each week one of the local dentists of the city donates his services to needy children, who must first receive the endorsement of the Parents and Teachers' association in the district from which they come.

For the past four years, Mrs. Runyan and other members of the Douglas County Health association have valiantly labored to establish the free dental clinic, now a reality. The funds for the upkeep of the clinic are in part provided by the county, in part by the sale of Christmas seals, and in part from donations received from local service clubs, lodges and individuals.

It is the hope and the aim of the Douglas County Health association to establish during the coming year, a full time health unit, requiring the full time services of a doctor, two nurses, and an office assistant.

The benefits to be derived from the establishment of such a health unit are: The general examination of all school children. To see that the health of the public and especially school children is protected by proper sanitation. To make examinations of tubercular patients. To quarantine all communicable diseases. To provide service in all social diseases. To care for any indigent cases. The work of the association has
