The convention opened by singing "America, the Beautiful," followed by an invocation by Rev. H. R. White.

The welcome address was then given by Mrs. P. A. Winchell in behalf of the city of Eugene and the hostess clubs of Eugene; then a response was given by Mrs. W. S. Nicholson of Marshfield.

STOREKEEPER SHOTS 2 JUNCTION CITY YOUTHS

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 1 — Two Junction City boys were in a hospital here today suffering from gun shot wounds received when a Lancaster storekeeper fired in to a group of five boys he said were "fooling around" his store Halloween night. Another boy was hurt.

Arthur Bennison and Clarence Ingram, 20, had bird shot wounds in their heads and bodies. Smith was wounded but did not require hospital treatment.

The storekeeper, whose name, police said, was Chapman, told deputies he had seen the boys and was preparing to frighten them away. He took the shot from a number of shells, intending to leave only the wad. The boys returned, he said, and he "got excited" and loaded the shotgun with "untreated" shells and fired into the group.
