

MYRTLE POINT AND ROSEBURG SENIORS PLAY 6 TO 6 GAME

Local Line Vulnerable to
Speedy Coos Foes and
Backfield's Work
Is Doubled.

Roseburg and Myrtle Point high school football teams played a 6 to 6 tie at Myrtle Point yesterday. While the game was very interesting and exciting for the spectators, it was rather a disappointment to the many Roseburg fans present, as the Roseburg players apparently were not up to their usual proficiency.

The Roseburg line, which has been playing a wonderful game so far this season, was very rugged and the hard-hitting Myrtle Point team opened up wide holes through which the ball carriers went off long gains. The Roseburg backfield, however, was playing a brilliant game and was forced to bear the brunt of both the offensive and defensive plays.

The two teams were about evenly matched for weight, but Myrtle Point had the advantage of speed, one of its backfield men, Dwight Bous, being the champion sprinter of Coos county. Bous, Wood and Drullinger, Myrtle Point backs, sifted through the Roseburg line time and again for sensational gains, their speed carrying the Roseburg tacklers in fast zig-zag runs.

Fest and Green made several long gains around and for Roseburg, while Entler, Smith and Zeno carried the ball on several smashing power plays. In the line Gardner and Darby at guards made a good showing.

Roseburg Scores First

The first quarter was an even exchange, neither team being able to obtain an advantage. Near the end of the second quarter Roseburg secured possession of the ball in the center of the field and Fest and Green made long gains around end and off-tackle, carrying the ball to Myrtle Point's 15-yard line. Smith took the ball through center and made a long run for 12 yards to put the ball on the 3-yard line. Entler hit the same spot on the 4th down and the ball barely crossed the line for a touchdown. The kick was blocked.

Spectators were kept wildly excited during the third period as first one team and then the other worked long gains. Myrtle Point pushed Roseburg back to her own 34-yard line early in the quarter, following a series of long gains by Bous and Wood. Roseburg's defense tightened, however, and Entler's punt was intercepted. Bous immediately threw a kick into Myrtle Point's end zone, interpreted a long pass on his own 20-yard line and carried the ball to his own 40-yard marker.

Smith hit off tackle in a smashing drive, broke away from three tacklers and was only dragged down after he had plowed his way for 20 yards. Roseburg, however, lost the ball on downs, and local rooters got an immediate scare when Wood slipped through a big hole off tackle and squirmed through the entire Roseburg team for 30 yards, being dragged down by Entler, who missed his tackle, but grabbed the runner by the belt of his suit, and slowed down his pace until another Roseburg player could make the tackle. Roseburg, however, stopped the advance and punted out of danger.

Sun Is Handicap

In the fourth quarter Roseburg was facing the sun, and Myrtle Point took advantage of that fact to open up a series of forward passes. The defense, blinded by the sun, had much difficulty in breaking up the plays, and some long gains were made. Three passes near the middle of the last period put the ball on Roseburg's 22-yard line, where Drullinger broke through on an off-tackle smash, and with beautiful interference forced a touchdown. The attempted pass to convert was knocked down, tying the score.

Both teams opened up a wild passing attack in the last few minutes of play. Roseburg nearly getting away for another score when Covert took a long pass from Entler on the 20-yard line. The Myrtle Point safety, however, was

a good deal faster than Covert and dragged him down.

Myrtle Point lost a "break" a few minutes later when Entler's attempted pass was intercepted. The receiver had a clear field ahead, but lost his balance and fell just as he started to run. Myrtle Point advanced into Roseburg territory on a series of off-tackle plays and were unleashing a hard drive to the goal when the game ended.

After his first escape, and at other times he said he was put in solitary confinement, which was in a bare room with only a blanket for a bed. At other times, he said, he and two other boys, all of them wearing Oregon hoots, were placed in this place handcuffed together. They had only a mattress to sleep on, he said, and could not sleep because, "when one kid turned over he woke the others up." In the day time, Levey said, they had to work at grubbing stumps. This particular treatment, he said, continued for 17 days and nights.

What we called a full meal, the witness said, was one cup of food, and a cup of milk "if they thought you worked good enough." "To be real dainty," he added, "they sometimes poured the food into a plate to make it look like there was more."

Why He Was Taken Back

Levey admitted that when he was released from the school to work for a man named Cawood in Portland he took one of Cawood's trucks and a load of merchandise out on the McMinnville route with-out Cawood's knowledge. He denied that he intended to steal them.

"When I got to Carlton," he said, "I got a newspaper and read where Mr. Cawood had reported the truck as stolen. I then telephoned him and told him I had the truck. Then I was arrested and put in jail and then taken back to the school."

This was followed, he said, by taking him to Portland to sign a confession, and days of solitary confinement and hard labor with the "boot gang" at the school followed.

He said another boy named Ed die Frank was in the habit of smuggling bread and cookies which he carried to the field. On one occasion, he said, Frank placed two slices of bread in his (Levey's) locker where they were found by "Don" Darling, one of the employees. Darling, Levey testified, said Frank was the boot-leger and I was the peddler, so he gave us a lashing.

Describing one lashing, Levey said he got 20 lashes on the hands and 30 on the feet, so that both his hands and feet were "black and blue and my feet were puffed up."

OREGON LIKELY TO VOTE HEAVILY IN TUESDAY ELECTION

Tri-Cornered Battle For
Governorship Arouses
Interest: 13 Bills
on Ballot.

A very heavy vote throughout the state is indicated for the general election to be held next Tuesday. The issues involved in the race for governor have aroused the interest of voters everywhere, and the campaign has been so hotly contested that it is believed the supporters of each of the several candidates will be out in large numbers to cast their ballots.

Although various state, county and district officers are to be elected, the interest of the voters is largely centered in the contest for governor, candidates having based their campaigns largely upon paramount issues with which the state is vitally concerned.

The state officers to be filled at Tuesday's election include, United States senator, representative in congress, governor, justice of the supreme court, position No. 1; justice of the supreme court, position No. 5; justice of the supreme court, position No. 6; superintendent of public instruction; commissioner bureau of labor, representative to state legislature (two to elect).

Legsdon Unopposed.

Douglas county voters will also vote for a county commissioner, C. E. Legsdon being unopposed. There will also be constables to elect in various precincts, justices of the peace to be chosen in some districts, commissioners chosen for the port of Umpqua and trustees to be named for the highway improvement districts.

In addition to the various offices to be filled, the voters will pass upon thirteen initiative and referendum measures, which have been discussed in the News-Review during the past two weeks.
