NEW TRIAL ASKED FOR ROBT. DUNCAN, RADIO "WILDCAT"

PORTLAND, Nov. 3 — Declaring if Robert Gordon Duncan made untrue statements in his radio addresses over KVEP, the proper recourse was through the state law governing slander and libel, J. A. Jeffrey pleaded for a new trial for his client in federal court here today.

The matter was taken under advisement. Duncan was convicted at Medford, on one of five counts contained in an indictment charging violation of the federal radio act by broadcast of obscene, indecent and profane language. Maximum penalty is \$5000 fine and five years imprisonment.

Jeffrey said the radio commission's act in revoking the license of the station was sufficient pre-emption by the government. He said his affidavit of prejudice filed against Judges Bean and McNary should have been upheld, and as a third cause, that allegations in the count on which Duncan was convicted do not constitute a crime.

U. S. Attorney Neuner, protesting the new trial, explained that the arguments set forth by Jeffrey were all settled by Judge Kavanaugh, who dismissed a demurrer to the indictment before the trial.
