Returns from 2484 precincts out of 3402 gave Hardy 131,831 against 185,399 for Raymond I. Turney, municipal judge and former newspaperman.

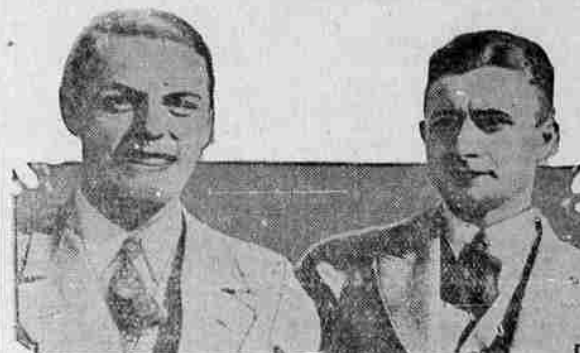

S. P. FILES BRIEF ON RAILWAY PLANS

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 5—The Southern Pacific has filed a brief with the interstate commerce commission supporting its proposal to buy the Valley & Siletz road in Polk and Benton counties, word received here today said. The document also related the proposal of the Oregon electric, linked with the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific, to take over the independent system.
The Oregon Electric plan, it is stated, would necessitate building a 2 1/4 mile branch. The Southern Pacific is shown as already linked with the Valley & Siletz at Independence, and willing to take it

over on outright purchase without claim to excess earnings.
