

VAUDE SUTHERLAND DRAWS \$250 FINE, 60 DAYS IN JAIL

(Associated Press Local Wire)
EUGENE, Nov. 5.—Vaude Sutherland was fined \$250 and sentenced to 60 days in the county jail today when he pleaded guilty to possession of intoxicating liquor, and the case against him was closed by the state. Following the defense plea the district attorney said no other charges would be placed against the youth.
Sutherland was tried twice on charges of felonious sale of liquor and each time the jury disagreed. He was arrested August 23 at Marcola, when county and city officers conducted a raid against him and his father, Harry Sutherland. The elder Sutherland shot and killed Officer Duley, policeman, and Joe Saunders, game warden, and made his escape.

GOV. EMERSON OF WYOMING VICTOR

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Nov. 5.—Frank C. Emerson, republican, was re-elected governor of Wyoming over Leslie A. Miller, democrat, on the basis of complete returns from 601 of the state's 679 precincts. The vote was Emerson 34,891; Miller 23,584.
The vote in the 78 non-reporting precincts is not expected to materially change the standing of Governor Emerson's supporters believe he will have a lead of between 1,000 and 1,500 over Mr. Miller.

by a 700,000 plurality to the reelection so much desired by those who want to see him named president in 1932. Returning James Hamilton Lewis to the senate, it denied with thundering emphasis the senatorial aspirations of Ruth Hanna McCormick.

In republican Connecticut it elevated a democrat, Wilbur M. Cross, to the governorship. In republican Pennsylvania it whittled to slender proportions the lead for Gifford Pinchot, the republican nominee for governor. In republican Idaho it bestowed a democratic governorship on O. Ben Ross, and in Arizona, Colorado, Massachusetts, Nebraska, Minnesota, New Mexico, Ohio and Oklahoma it pushed democrats into the lead, on incomplete returns for governorships now held by republicans.

The senate and house overtures were almost impressive, producing surprises even among those who had foreseen a democratic return of the pendulum after the republican sweep of 1928.
—West Virginia, Oklahoma and Colorado joined Illinois in announcing early the election of democratic senators to succeed republicans. In Ohio, home of the anti-saloon league, Robert J. Bulkley, a democrat who favors repeal of prohibition, was far ahead for the senate in the overnight returns. A democratic repealist, Marcus A. Coolidge, came from behind to win in Massachusetts, and the democratic senatorial nominees in Minnesota, and South Dakota also went out in front during the night.

Allen and Hefflin beaten
In the rock-ribbed republican state of Kansas, Senator Henry J. Allen conceded the election to his democratic opponent, George McGill. Heading the advice of its democratic organization, Alabama was snoring under Senator J. Thomas Hefflin's candidacy for reelection as an independent.

Walsh of Montana, Glass of Virginia, Robinson of Arkansas, Harrison of Mississippi and Norris of Nebraska, were among the senators re-elected. In New Jersey, Dwight W. Morrow had it all his own way from the start.
With the result so finely balanced, it appeared just possible that the full returns from the one state unheard from last night might have to be awaited before the outcome was apparent. Kentucky, which has been a battleground for both senate and house, does not begin to count her ballots until the day following election.

MINNESOTA ELECTS FIRST DEMOCRATIC SENATOR

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 5.—A mounting tide of ballots today swept Elmer Holdale, a Norwegian born democrat, towards victory over Thomas D. Schall, blind republican, for the United States senate.

Election of Floyd B. Olson, farmer-laborite, as governor was conceded early today by his republican opponent, Ray P. Chase. Holdale and Olson profited separately from what appears to have been an unprecedented defection from republican ranks.

Success for Holdale would be the first for a democrat by election since Minnesota began statehood. Present congressional representa-

tatives, nine republicans and one farmer-laborite, led in indecisive returns.

MASSACHUSETTS ELECTS 2 DEMOCRATS AND GOES WET

BOSTON, Nov. 5.—An embattled democratic party that sounded the warring of unemployment and prohibition repeal today was in possession of the governorship and its second United States senatorship in this traditionally republican state.

Returns from yesterday's elections showed that Marcus A. Coolidge, wet democrat, had overwhelmed William M. Butler, friend of former president Calvin Coolidge, and a republican dry, in their contest for United States senator. They also showed Joseph B. Ely, another wet democrat, had dislodged Governor Frank G. Allen, republican dry, from the office he has held for two years.

The state voted to repeal its prohibition enforcement law by a large majority. The republicans held 12 of Massachusetts' 16 seats in the national house of representatives before the election, and returns today, nearly complete, indicated they had retained all their congressional seats, with the possible exception of the ninth district. Incomplete figures left the result in doubt.

The republicans failed, however, to retain a seat in the second district lost in a special election last January.
BULOW RUNNING AHEAD IN SOUTH DAKOTA RACE
SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Nov. 5.—Running ahead of the rest of the democratic ticket, Governor W. J. Bulow today maintained a lead in South Dakota's senatorial contest. Senator W. E. McMaster, incumbent republican, bidding for a second term, was more than 5,000 votes behind Bulow with nearly three fourths of the state's precincts reported.

A republican seemed assured of being seated in the governor's chair, held for two terms by Bulow. Warren E. Green held a lead of more than 10,000 votes over D. A. McCullough, democratic candidate.
SPEAKER LONGWORTH IN LEAD IN OHIO RETURNS
CINCINNATI, Ohio, Nov. 5.—The house of representatives appeared to have retained his seat on the basis of almost complete returns from yesterday's election when he held a lead of 3,045 over his democratic opponent with only eighteen scattered precincts in the county unreported.

DEMOCRAT LEADING IN IDAHO GOVERNOR RACE

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 5.—C. Ben Ross, democrat, for governor, and the balance of the state elective officers republican today appeared to be the outcome of yesterday's election.

Save for governor and lieutenant governorship, virtually all republican candidates had amassed a lead which continued to grow as the ballots poured in.
Senator William E. Borah, seeking reelection, continued to pile up a large lead over Joseph Tyler of Emmett, democratic candidate. Representatives H. A. I. French, first district, and Addison T. Smith, second, also increased their totals over democratic opposition as returns from scattered districts came in.

Whether the democratic governor would have the support of a democratic legislature was in doubt with returns on this portion of the ticket in from less than a third of the counties. No trend was indicated.

Returns of 539 of the 816 precincts in the state gave Ross, mayor of Pocatello, a lead of nearly 10,000 over John McMurray of Oakley, republican, the vote being 32,118 to 42,284.

a close contest with William A. Delzell, democratic opponent. Douglas county contributed 2,000 votes to Hawley's 7,000 majority in the district.

Fisher, Nichols Win
Ben Nichols, republican, Riddle, and Walter Fisher, democrat, of Roseburg, incumbent, were elected from Douglas county to the state legislature in a very close, three-cornered race. Nichols led with 3,194 votes, Fisher being second with 2,352, while Mynatt held a close third with 2,521.

Although Oliver P. Coshaw, associate justice of the state supreme court, the only democrat serving on the supreme bench in Oregon, was defeated in the state, according to present reports, he was given a very fine support in his home county, receiving 3,942 votes as compared with 1,619 for his opponent Campbell.

Douglas county voters approved the repeal of irrigation district interest, the bonus loan amendment, motor vehicle tax, article 1, legislative vacancies, income tax, rogue river closing, lieutenant governor and the water power net form of government, motor vehicle tax bill, article 32, legislators' compensation, circuit judges' bill, and anti-cigarette amendment.

DEMOCRATS LEADING IN EARLY KENTUCKY COUNT

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 5.—First scattering returns from 37 of the 4,156 precincts in Kentucky showed the democrats in the lead for the U. S. senate. Judge M. M. Logan had 3,916 votes for the long term to 2,370 for J. M. Robinson, republican incumbent. Ben Williamson had 3,933 for the short term to 2,345 for Robinson who also seeks the short term.

Scattering returns from the ninth district, 24 of 465 precincts showed Fred Vinson, democrat, defeated in 1928, leading the incumbent, E. R. Kendall, republican, 2,508 to 1,423.

LOUISIANA VOTES BIG SUM AGAINST EXPECTED TAXES

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 5.—By overwhelming majorities, the Louisiana electorate yesterday adopted eight constitutional amendments and elected the two democratic candidates for the house of representatives who had republican opposition.

The other six representatives were re-elected without opposition as also was Governor Huey P. Long, who was elected to the U. S. senate as the successor to Senator Joseph E. Ransdell.

The constitutional amendments included provisions for issuance of \$75,000,000 bonds against anticipated gasoline tax revenues for 25 years for the construction of paved roads and bridges; to authorize New Orleans to issue \$1,500,000 bonds for municipal re-financing, and to issue \$5,000,000 bonds for a new state house.

GIFFORD PINCHOT LEADS HIS COALITION RIVAL

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 5.—Returns from 7,210 out of 8,321 districts in the state with only 16 missing in Philadelphia give Gifford Pinchot (r) a lead over John M. Hemphill, his democratic-liberal party opponent for governor. The total stands: Pinchot 940,885; Hemphill 902,698.

NEGRO CONGRESSMAN HAS SMALL LEAD IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—Oscar de Priest, republican, Chicago's Negro congressman, was leading his opponent by 163 votes today with two thirds of the precincts in the district reported. The vote was: de Priest 13,566; Harry Baker, democrat, 13,403.

ALLEN CONCEDES VICTORY TO MCGILL IN KANSAS

WICHITA, Kans., Nov. 5.—Henry J. Allen, republican, conceded the election of his democratic opponent, George McGill of Wichita, in a statement issued today. They were rivals for the short term senatorship.

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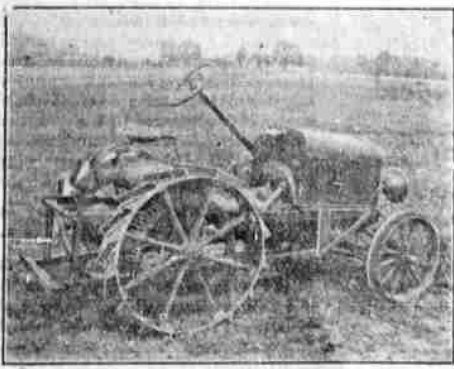
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
