THE earliest newspapers always
printed a sign at the top of the
first page of every issue depicting
the points of the compass. The let-
ter N, for north, was placed at the
top. Below it appeared a "plus"
sign. At the right, E, for east. At
the left, W, for west, while below
the letter S indicated south. Later
the "plus" sign was dropped and the
letters "N.E.W.S." appeared,
implying that the information
printed came from the four cor-
ners of the globe. And so we got
the word "news," meaning the very
latest information on any subject.

TUNNEY TESTIFIES IN O'MARA SUIT TO GRAB \$500,000

(Associated Press Special Wire)

NEW YORK, Nov. 6 — A con-
tract dated Jan. 29, 1926, and signed
by the late Tix Rickard and
Billy Gibson, whereby Gene Tun-
ney was to fight Jack Dempsey in
Jersey City the following Sept. 16
was read today to the jury in an
amphitheater where Timothy J.
Mara is suing the former heavy-
weight champion for \$500,000 for
alleged breach of contract.
The contract was dated two
months before Mara, according to
his own testimony, entered into an
agreement to help Tunney get a
match with Dempsey. The Mara-
Tunney agreement, on which Mara
bases his suit in part, was signed
April 3, 1926. Mara testified that
so far as he knew Tunney had no
contract with Rickard at that time
for a fight with Dempsey.
Tunney continued on the stand
today his story of his relations
with Rickard before the fight at
Philadelphia in September, 1926,
when he won the championship.
Tunney began his account yes-
terday as his own first defense
witness after Justice Hatfield had
dismissed a motion to throw the
case out of court.

SEARCH FOR LOST FLIERS ABANDONED

ATLIN, B. C., Nov. 6 — Believ-
ing Captain E. J. A. Burke and his
two companions, lost in northern
British Columbia since October 11,
never would be found alive. Pilot
Frank Barbaud and his copilot,
Alonso Cope, Alaska fliers, were
to give up the search here today
and continue to Anchorage, Alas-
ka.

Three other fliers, Captain Pat
Renahan and two companions,
Vancouver, B. C., were being
sought along the coast line south
of Prince Rupert, B. C., where
they dropped from sight while fly-
ing northward to join in the Burke
search. They last were seen at
Dundee, flying northward, eight
days ago.

A plane search by Pilot Ansel
Reckmann, Seattle, and two com-
panions yesterday failed to reveal
any trace of them. Another party
in a fisheries boat was searching
the coast line for the missing
fliers.

pearances.

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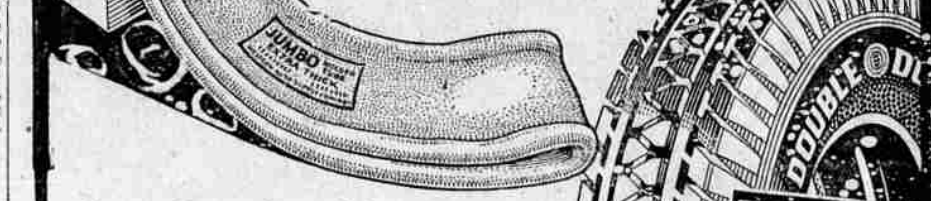
